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

Texas Health and Human Services



Texas Health and Human Services (HHS) oversees the operation of the health and human services system through strategic direction, program oversight, and direct administration of certain programs.

HHS oversees:

- Eligibility Determination
- Licensing and Regulatory
- System Planning & Evaluation
- Policy Development & Rule-Making

- Ombudsman Services
- Aging Programs

We envision a Texas that empowers everyone to age well with dignity and purpose.






DEMOGRAPHIC OVERVIEW OF TEXAS

Demographic Overview of Texas






2023 American Community Survey 5-Year Data—60 Years and Over

FEDERAL AND STATE POLICIES AND PROGRAMS

Aging Texas Well (ATW)




- Created in 1997 by the Texas State
 Unit on Aging and formalized in 2005
 through Executive Order R.P.42, the
 Aging Texas Well (ATW) initiative
 supports efforts to prepare for aging
 across all levels of society.
- HHSC is charged with leading the ATW initiative, including analysis of state readiness, local community preparedness, and aging policy issues and trends.



Aging Texas Well Strategic Plan



- ATW Strategic Plan: Created in line with <u>Executive Order R.P. 42</u> and submitted biennially to report on its implementation to the Governor and Legislature
- Guided by six key mandates
- Cross-sector coordination and planning
 - > Health care
 - Long-term care
 - Community-based services
 - State government



Aging Texas Well Advisory Committee (ATWAC)



ATWAC provides
 guidance and
 recommendations to
 HHSC and state
 leadership on aging related issues, including
 the Aging Texas Well
 initiative and Strategic
 Plan



Statewide Interagency Aging Services Coordinating Council (SIASCC)



- SIASCC was created through <u>H.B.</u>
 728, passed by the 88th Legislature.
- The SIASCC purpose is to ensure a strategic, statewide approach to interagency aging services
- SIASCC is charged with:
 - Developing a five-year Strategic Plan
 - Submitting a coordinated Statewide Interagency Aging Services Expenditure Proposal biannually.
 - Publishing an updated inventory of state-funded interagency aging programs and services annually.



Area Agencies on Aging



The 28 Area Agencies on Aging (AAA) provide services to help people 60 years of age and older. Their family members and caregivers receive information and assistance needed in locating and accessing community services.

Services include:

- Home-delivered meals
- Congregate meals
- Benefits counseling
- Case management

- In-home services
- Long-term care Ombudsman
- Preventive health



Area Agencies on Aging Cont.



During **FY24**, **Texas AAAs** provided support for the following programs and services:

- Approximately 9.6 million homedelivered meals for 58,133 participants
- Approximately 3.8 million congregate meals for 58,437 participants
- Case management services for 18,414 older adults
- Case management services for 5,881 family caregivers



Federal and State Programs



Means-tested programs

- Medicaid/STAR+PLUS
- HHSC Community Care Services

Veterans Administration

- Provides both means-tested and non-means tested
- Programs for those with service connection



PRIORITIES FOR SUPPORTING OLDER ADULTS AND FAMILY CAREGIVERS IN TEXAS

Priorities to Support Older Adults and Family Caregivers in Texas





- Protection from scams and fraud
- Prevention of elder abuse and neglect
- Affordable and quality longterm care options



Priorities identified to support family caregivers in Texas from the SPoA include:

- Affordable caregiving help at home
- Better access to information and support for caregivers
- More caregiver respite so caregivers can take a break from their responsibilities



THE VALUE OF AGING: ECONOMIC AND SOCIAL BENEFITS

Benefits of the Aging Population



- Disposable wealth:
 People 65 years of age and older control 40% of nation's disposable wealth
- Workforce participation: 40.3% of Texans 55 years of age and older are employed, with unemployment rates that have declined since 2020
- Civic engagement: 24.9%
 of older Texans volunteer
 (with those aged 75 years
 of age and older
 volunteering 100
 hours/year, on average)




NAVIGATING CHALLENGES AND OPPORTUNITIES IN AGING

Challenges and Opportunities



- Decreasing life expectancy
 - Currently 78.5 years for Texans
- Promoting healthy lifestyles and compressing morbidity
- Improving coordination between providers and removing siloes of care.
- Providing more robust support to unpaid family caregivers
 - Who deliver nearly 80% of all in-home long-term care




