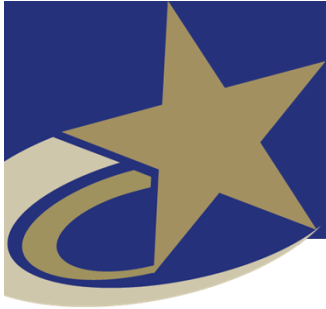

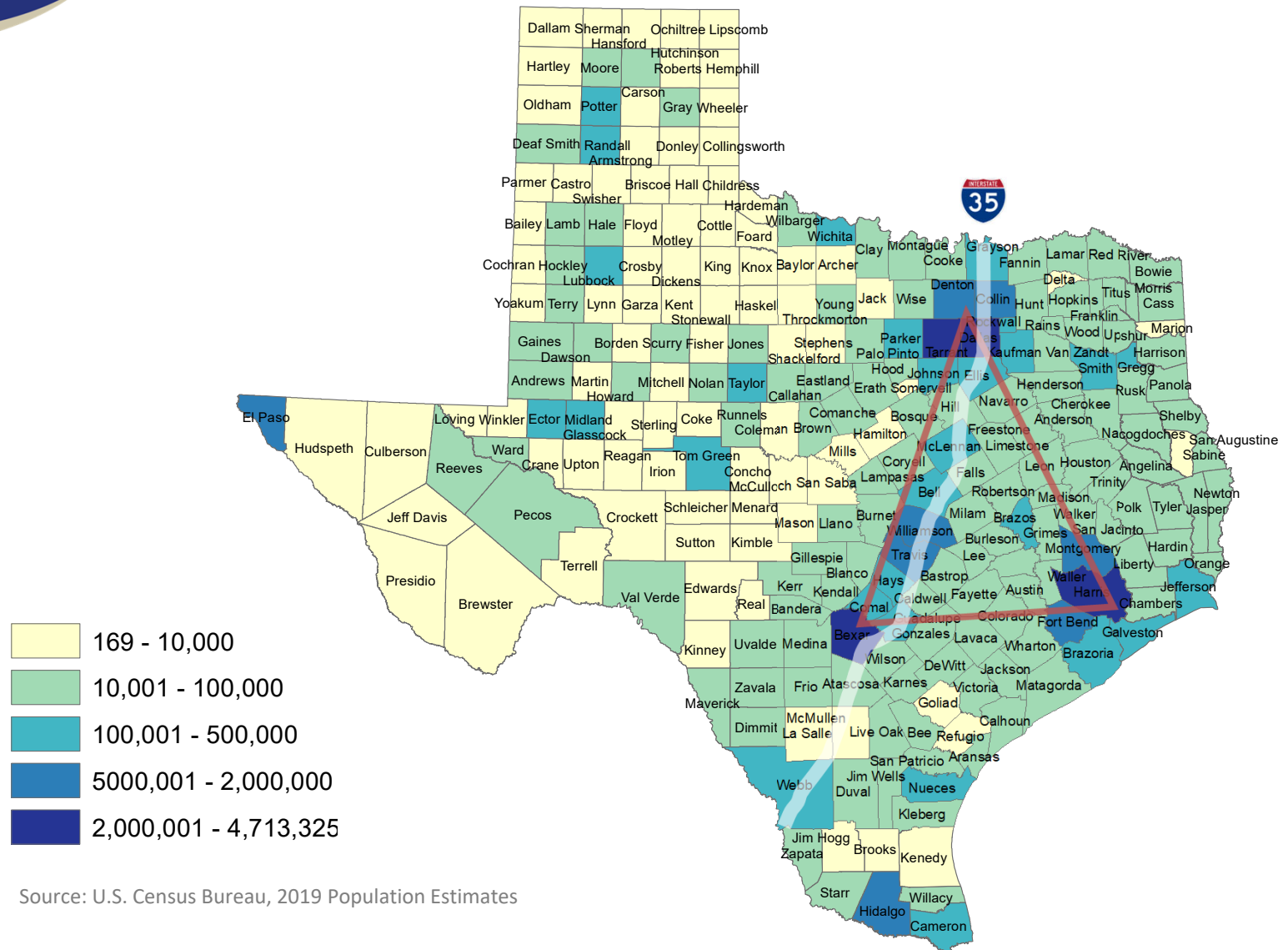


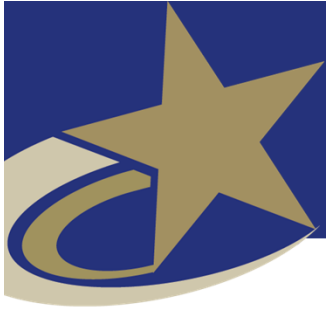
Estimated Population Change, Texas Counties, 2010 to 2019



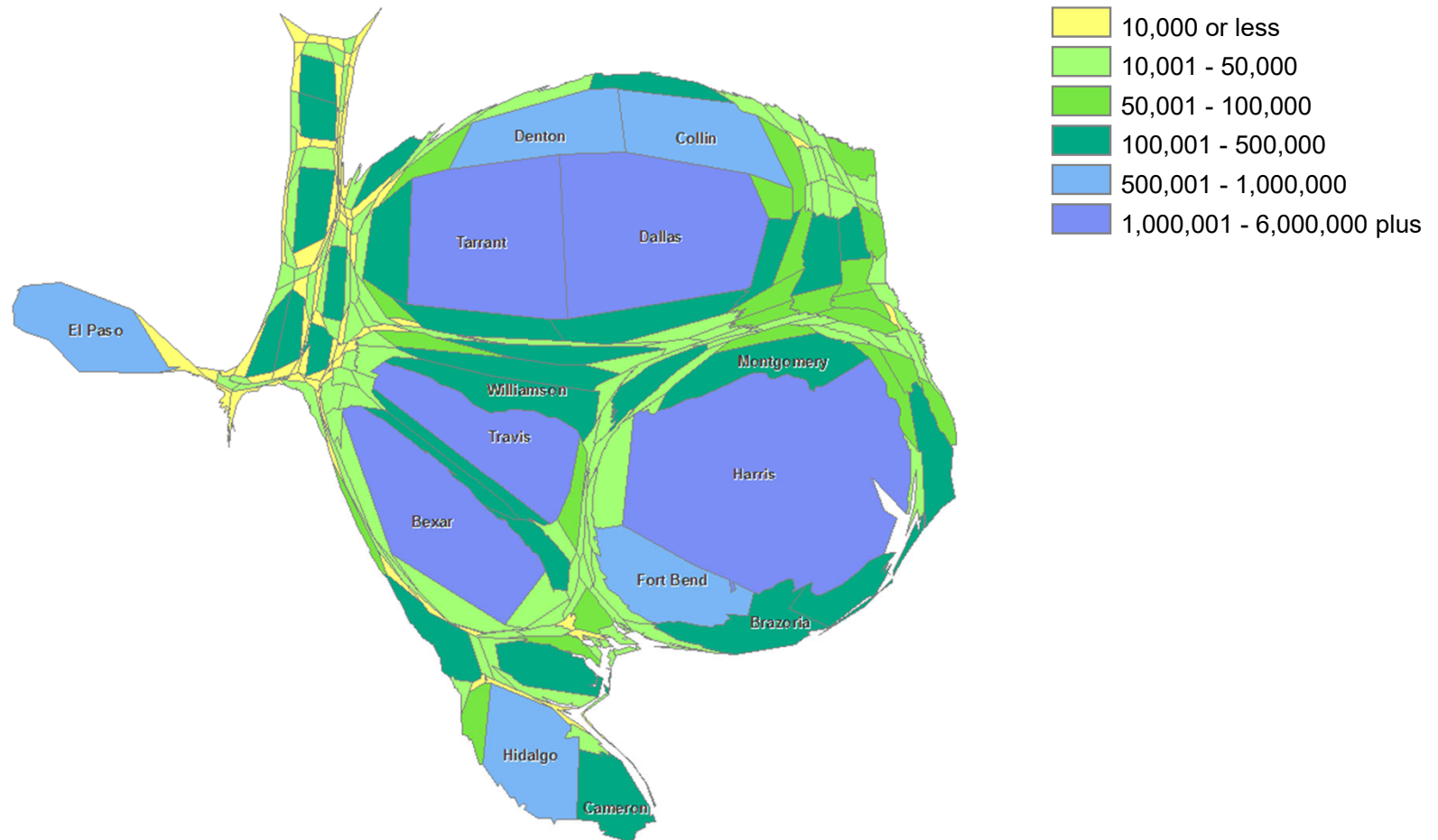


Total Estimated Population by County, Texas, 2019



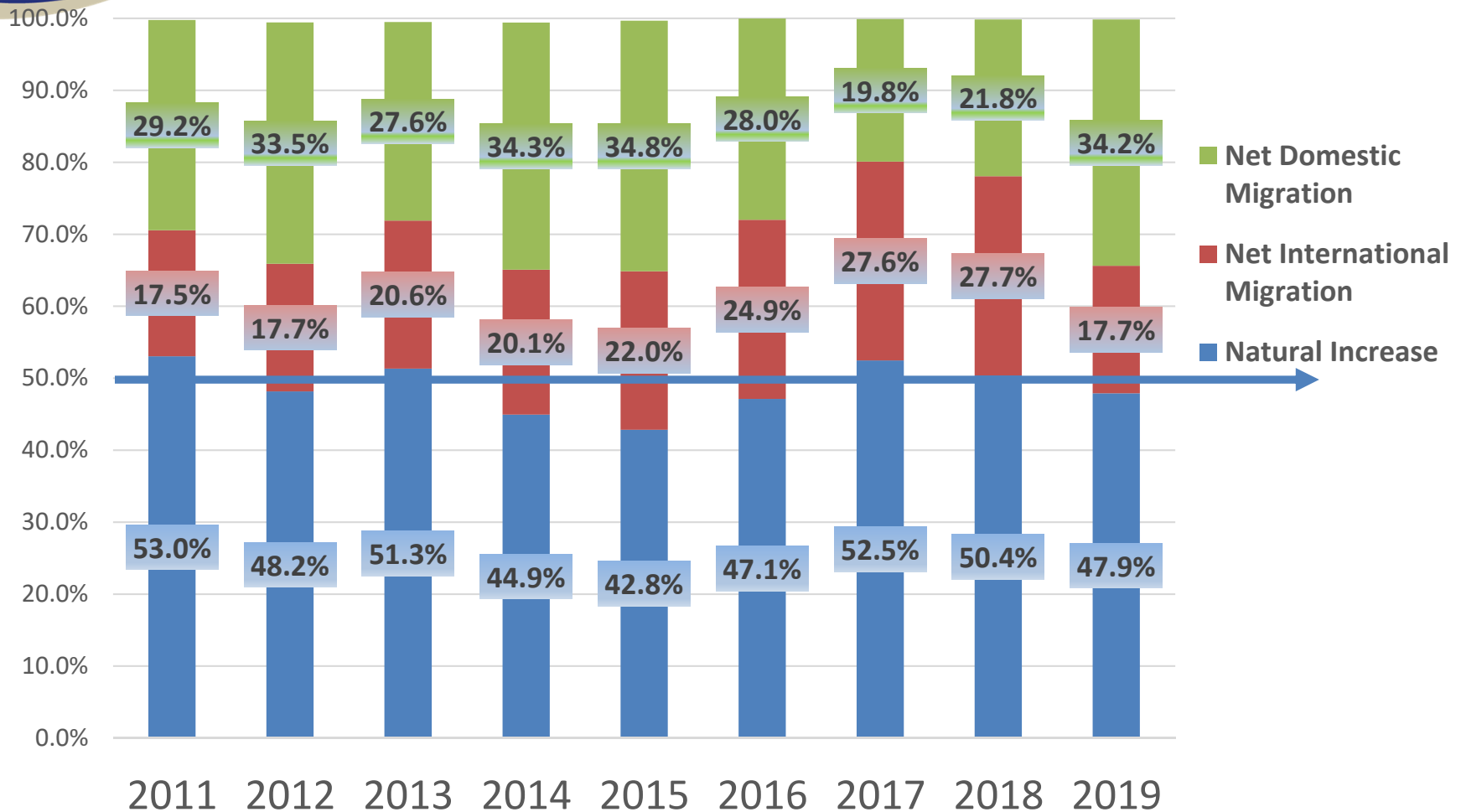

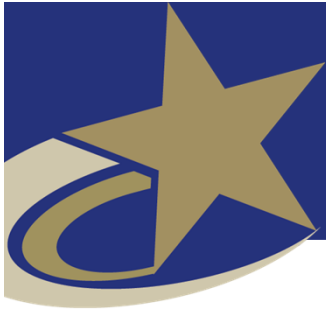




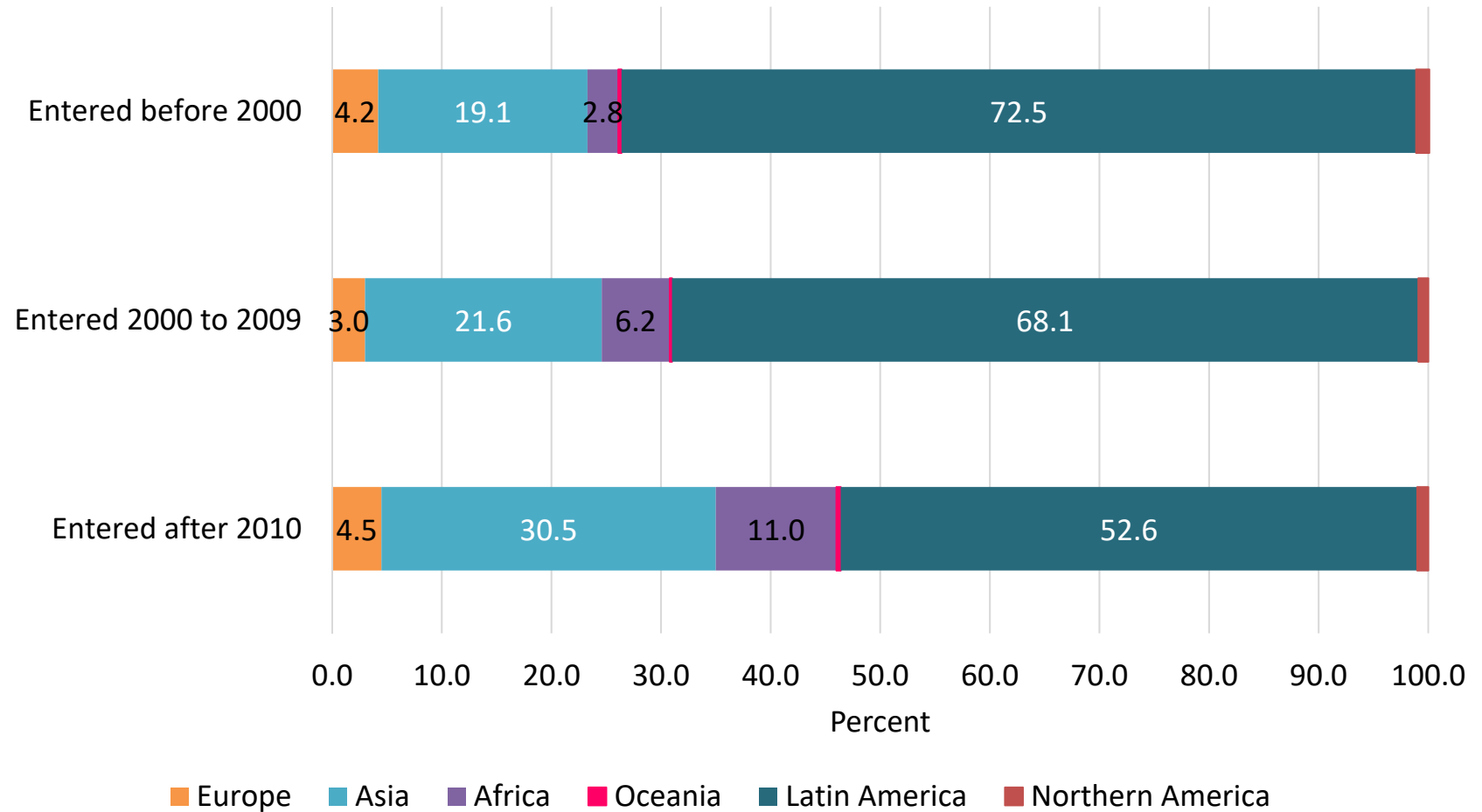
What is driving Texas Population Growth? Components of Change

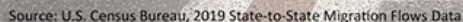
Period of Entry by Area of Birth for Foreign Born Population in Texas

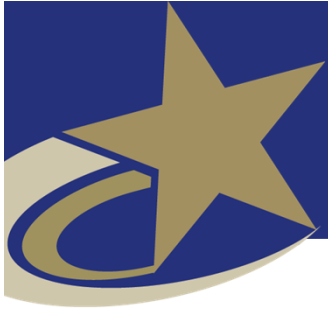

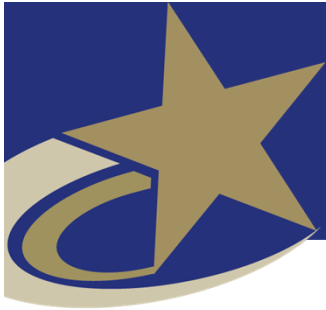
Percent of Net Migration Flows to Texas, 2019



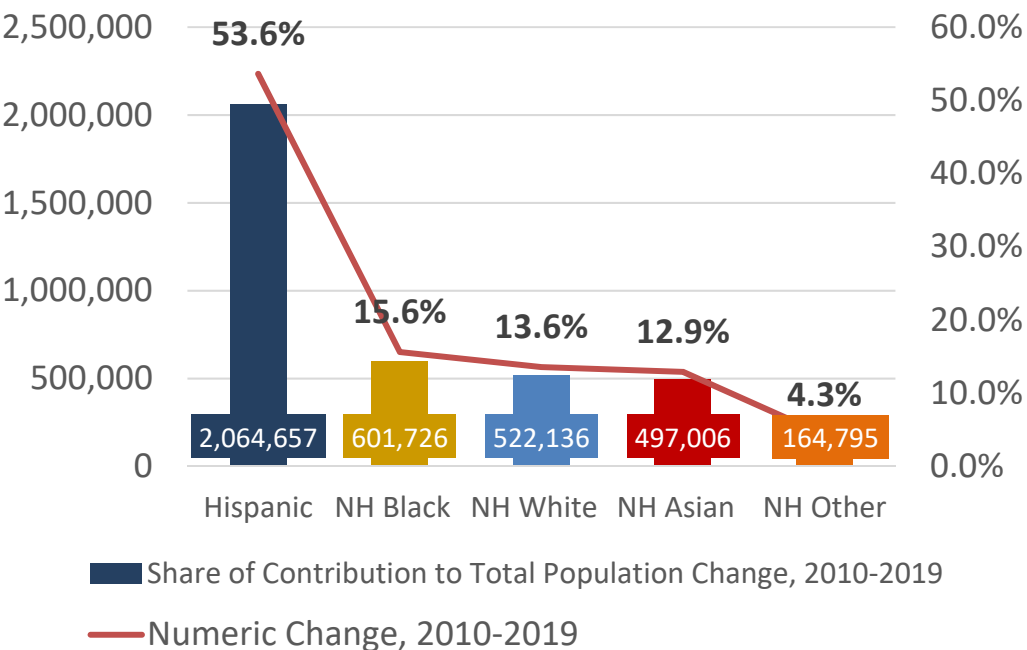
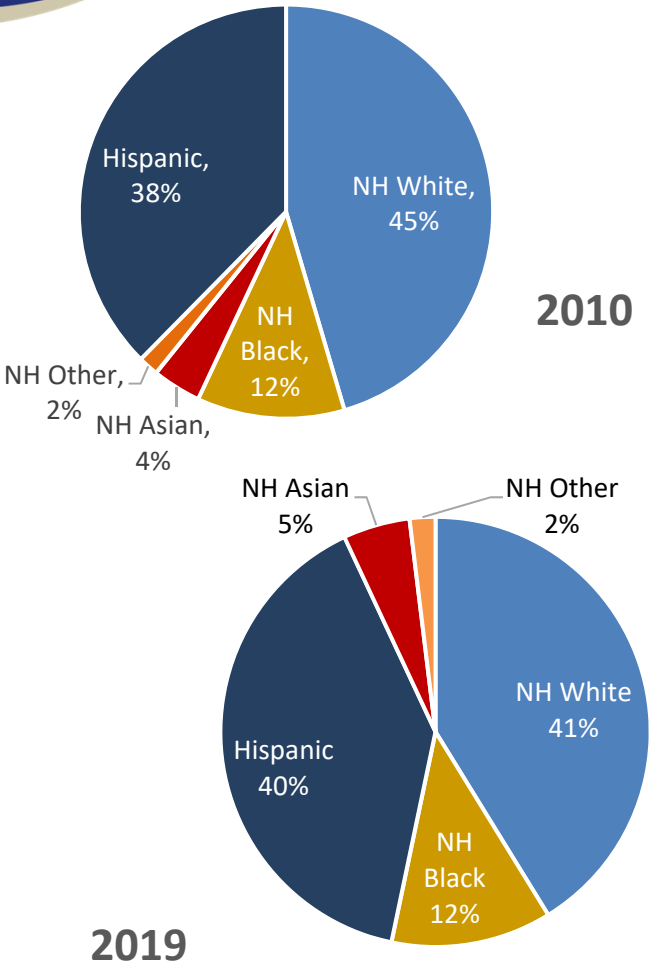

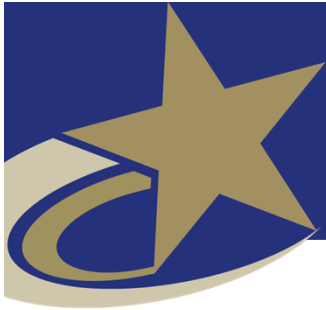


Race/Ethnicity Composition, Texas, 2010-2019

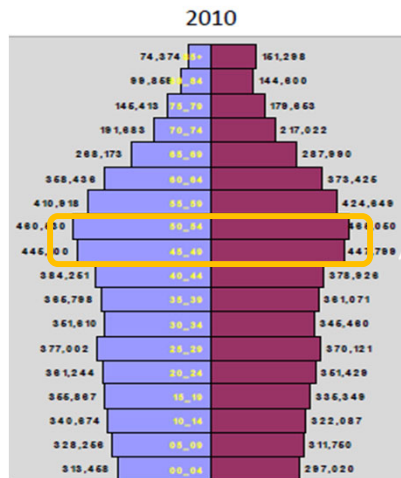

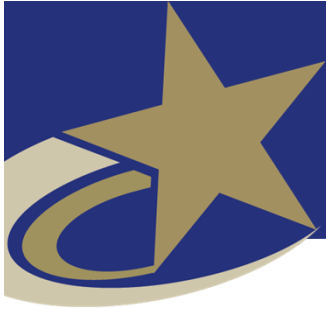


Birth Rates by Race/Ethnicity, Texas, 2006-2018



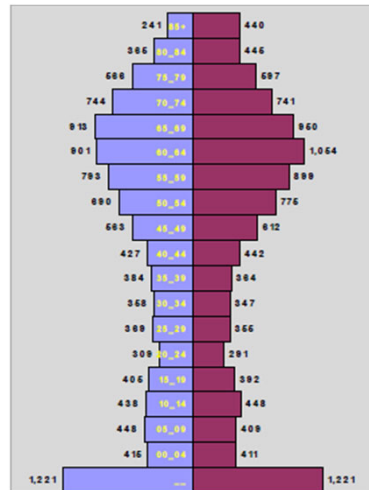

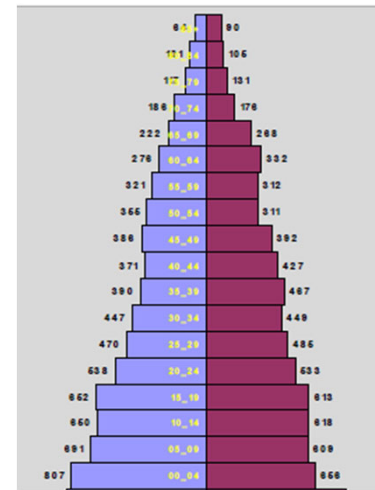


Population Pyramids for Selected Counties in Texas

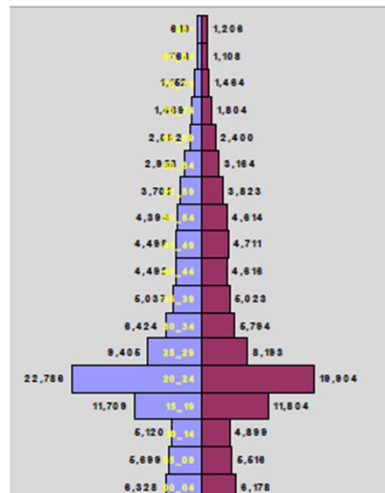

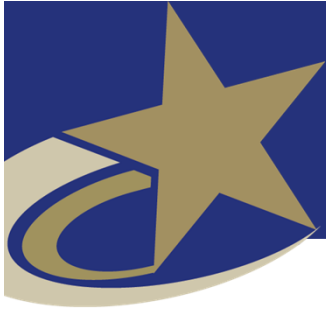

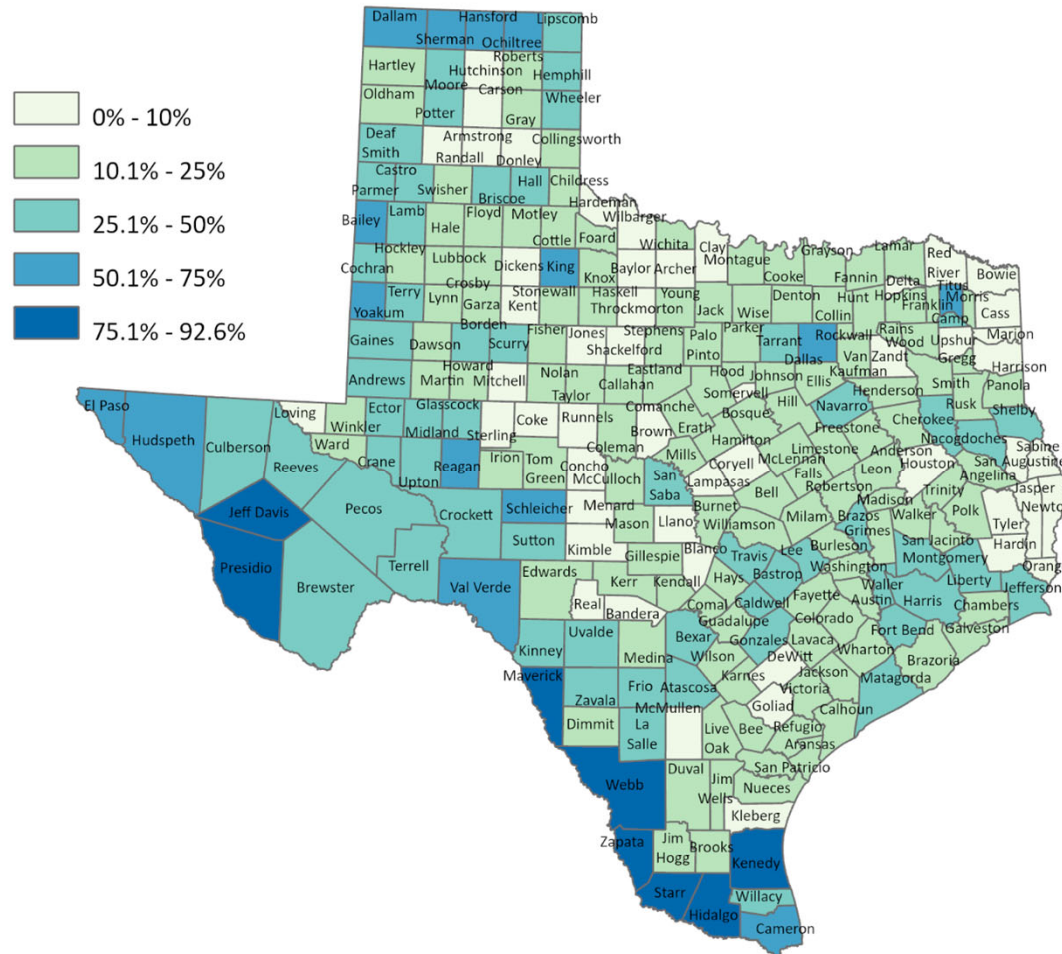

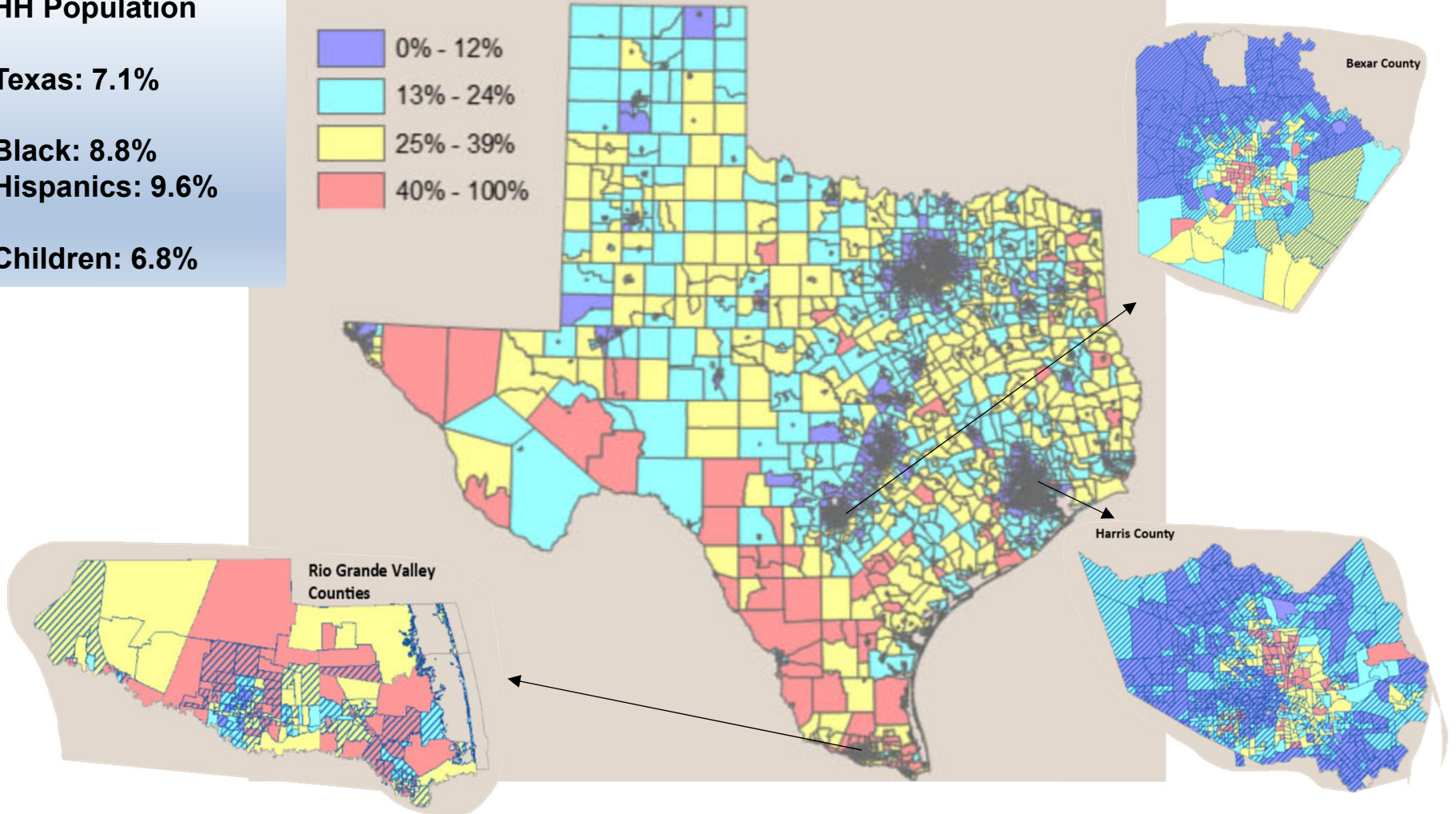

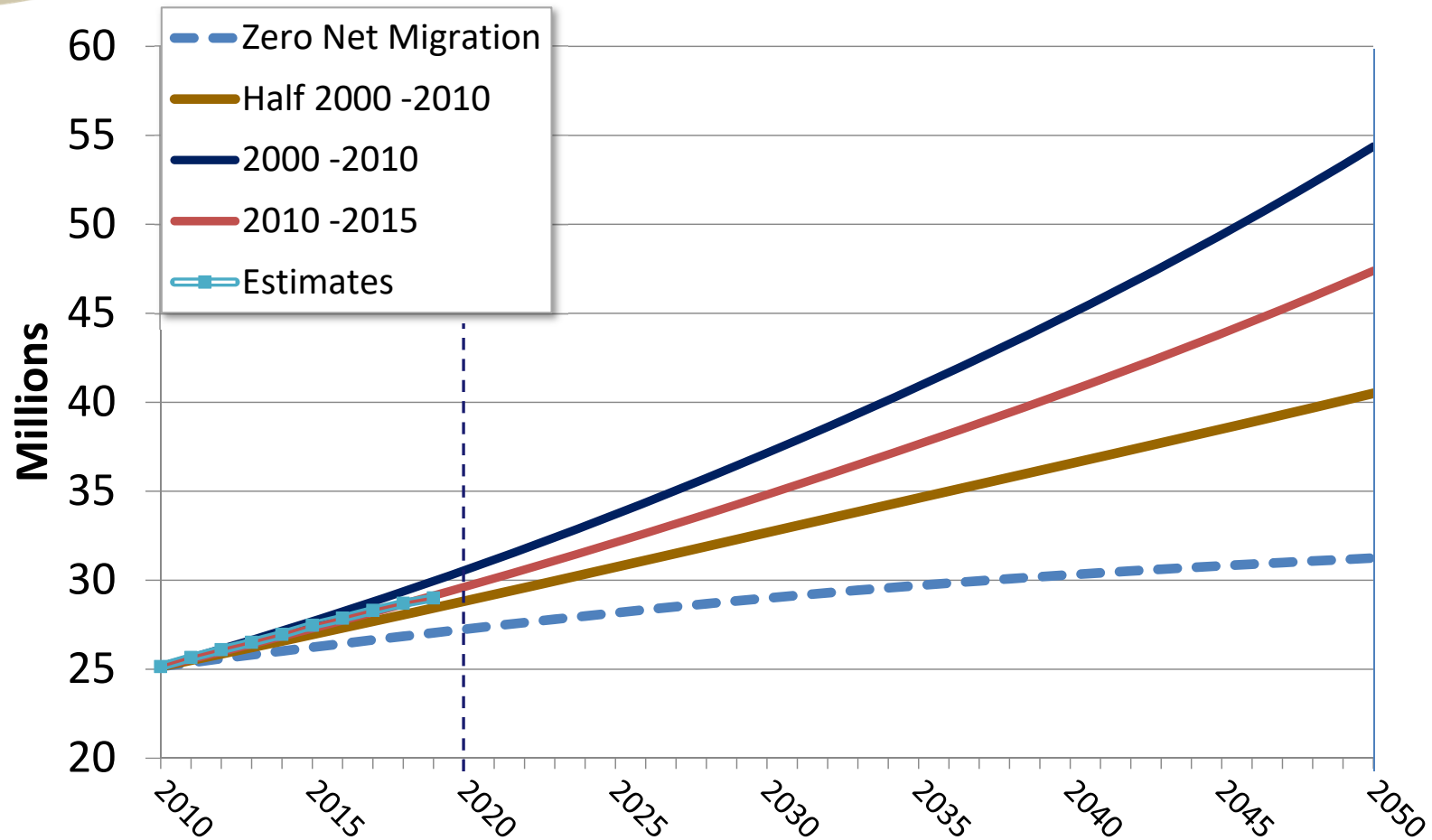

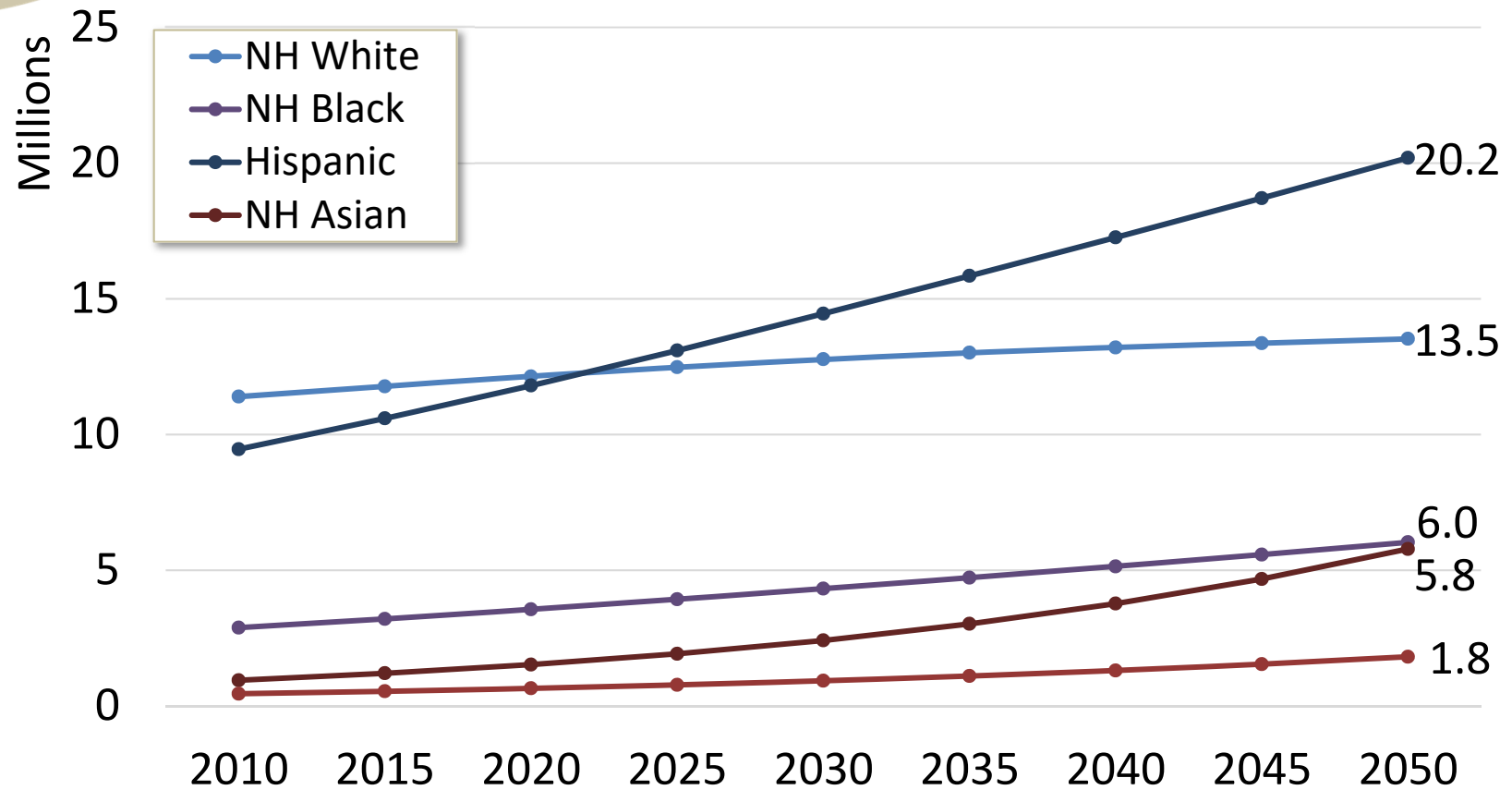
Projected Population Growth in Texas, 2010-2050

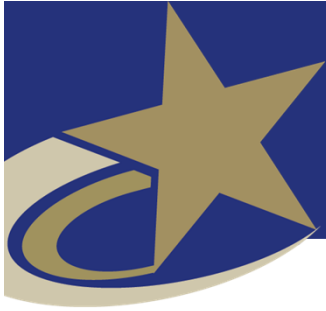

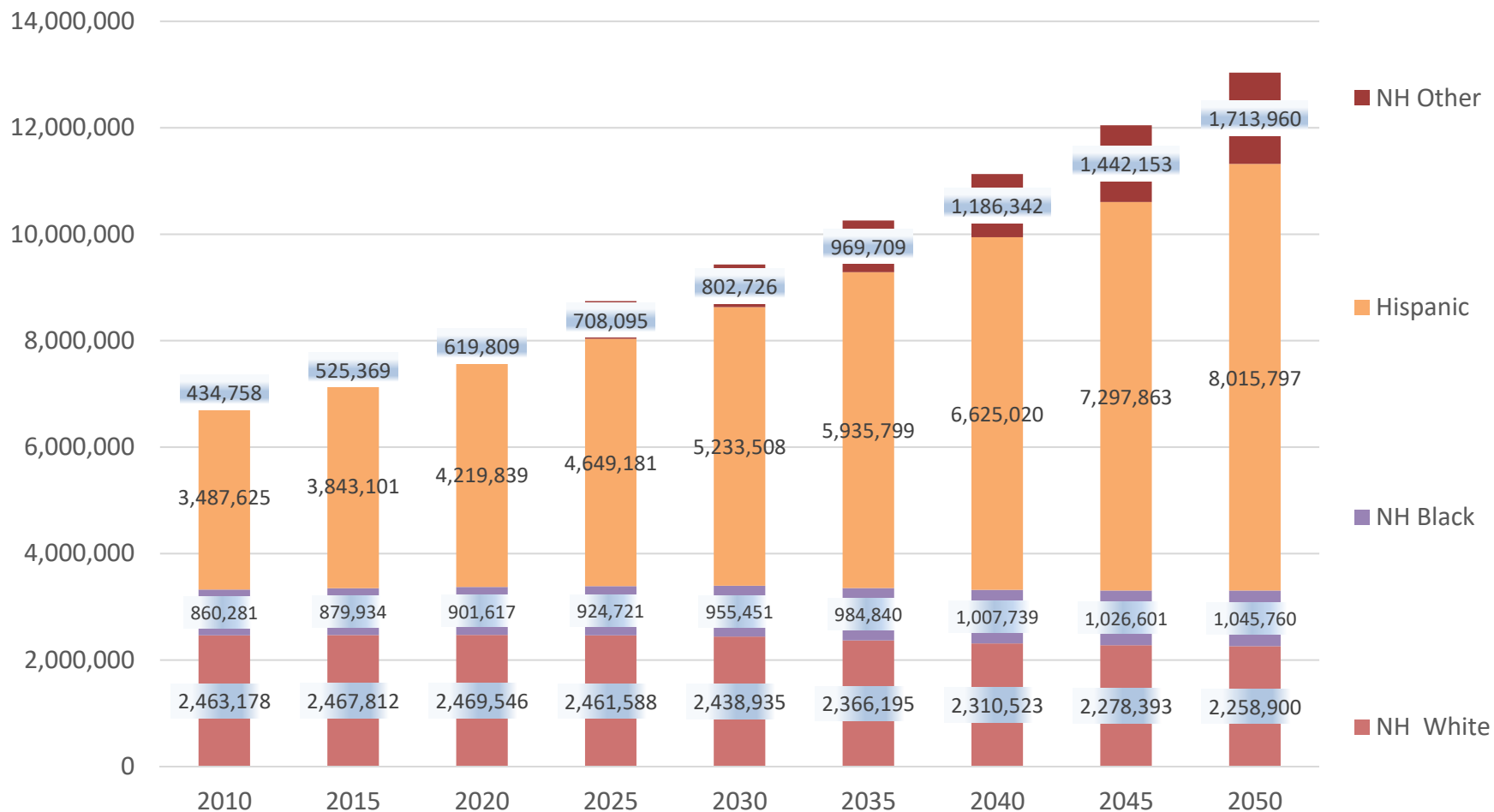

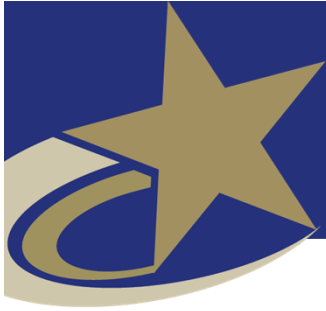


Projected Population of Persons Aged 0-18 Years by Race and Ethnicity, Texas 2010-2050

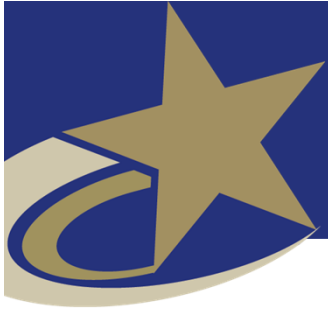

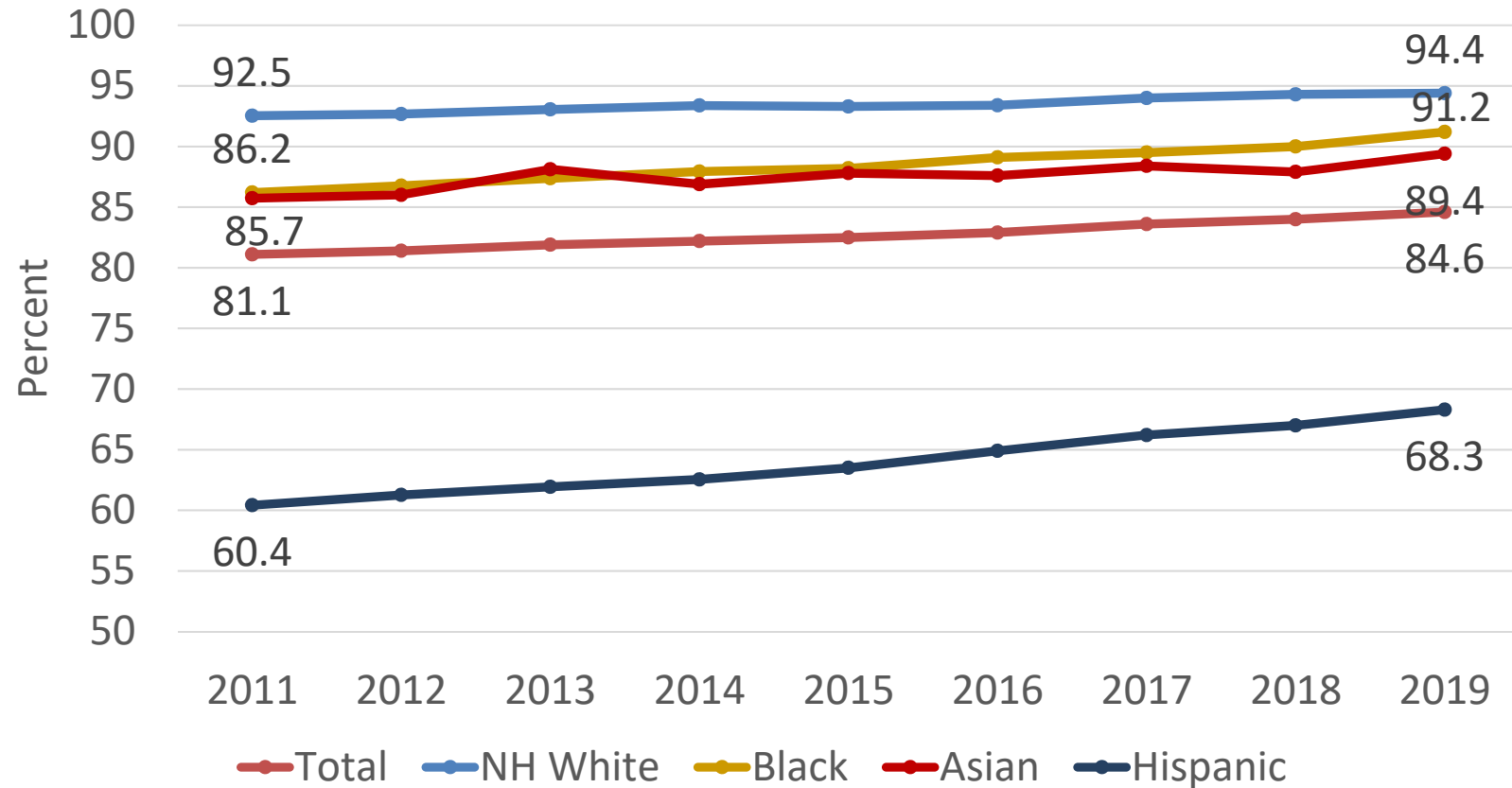
Enrollment for Instructional Programs by Race/Ethnicity,



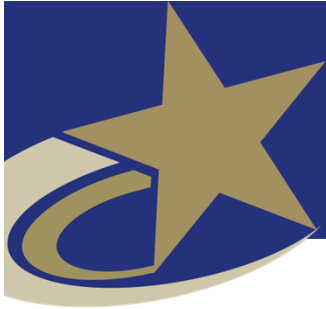

Population growth and diversity bring both challenges and opportunities to school education

- School enrollment will continue to grow as the population increases.
- The growth will not be even, with urban core and suburban ring counties growing most while many rural counties continue to lose population.
- School population will continue to diversify with the increase in the share of almost all the non-white population. The demand for public education and special instructional programs will likely grow.
- Children in poverty and those who do not speak English at home most substantial in the urban core counties and in the lower RGV.
- The key to children's well-being in Texas is to continue on the path of improved education, closing the substantial divide among race/ethnic groups and across different regions of Texas.

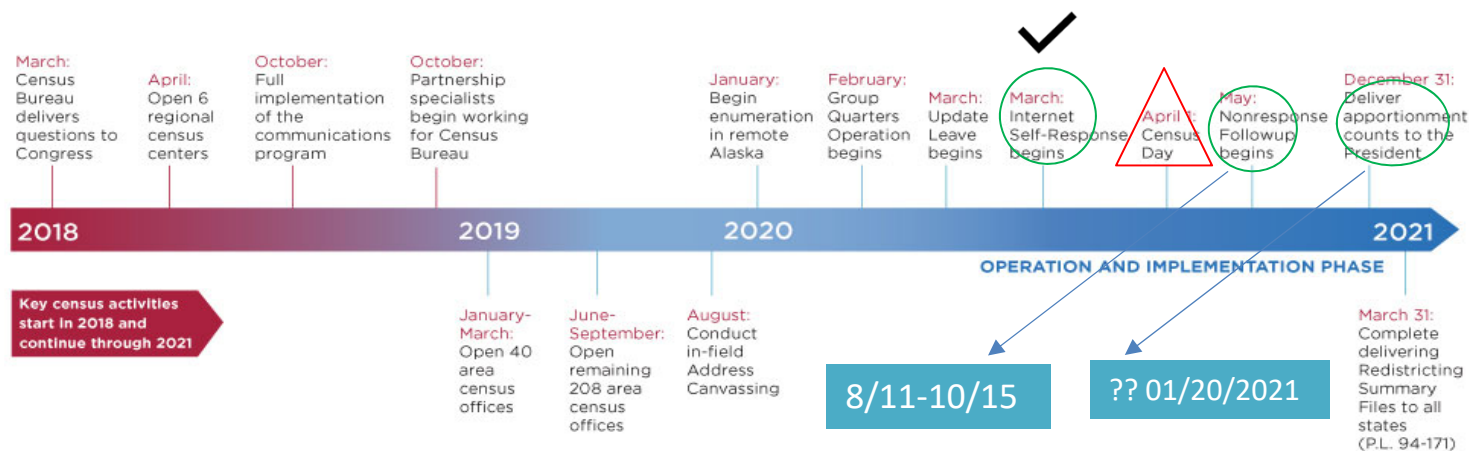




The 2020 Census – Impacted by the Pandemic

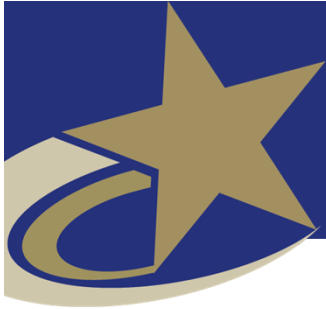
Road to the 2020 Census

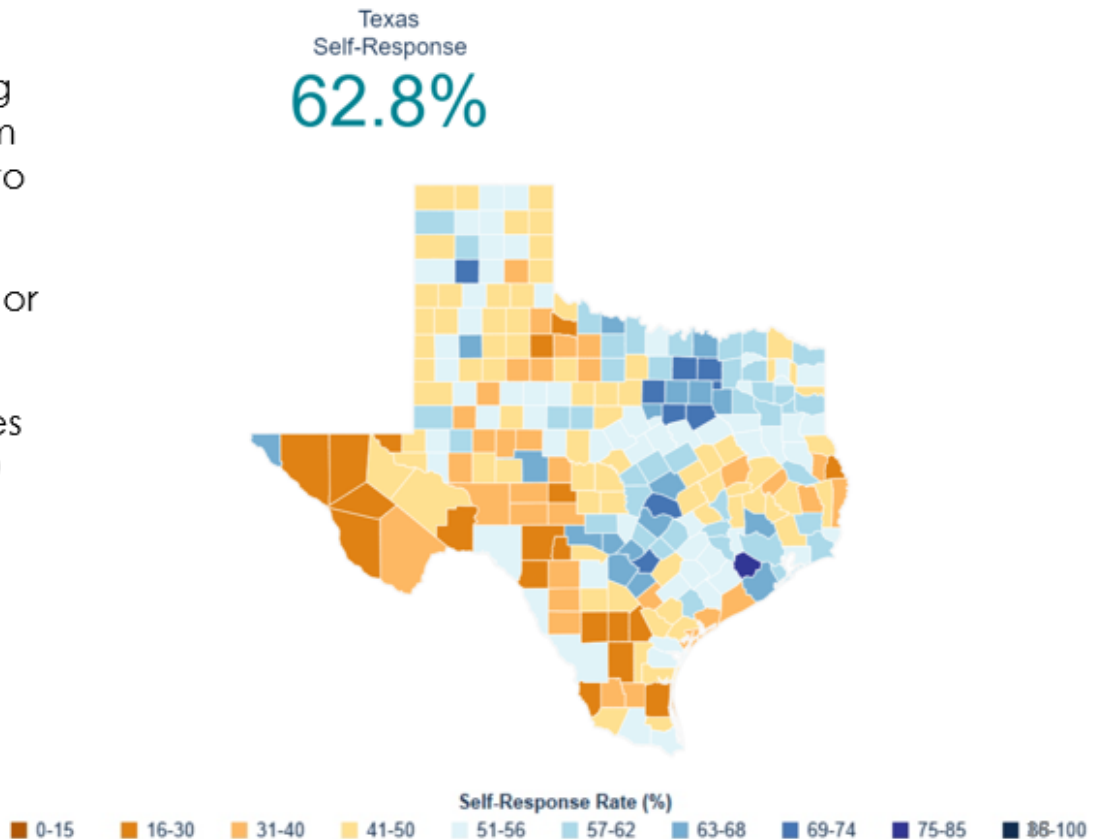

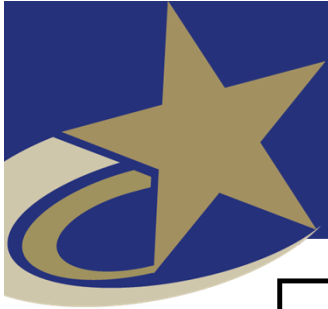
Self-Response Rates among Texas Counties ranged from 75.8% in Fort Bend County to 18.6% in Edwards County.

Undercount of Children under 5

Census 2010 missed **more than 400,000** very young Latino children.

This is a uniquely high “undercount” rate. In 2010, the net undercount rate for very young Latino children was **7.1 percent**, compared to **4.3 percent** for non-Latinos.

The 2020 *Demographic Analysis* was released 12/14, an independent analysis to help evaluate the quality of the Census

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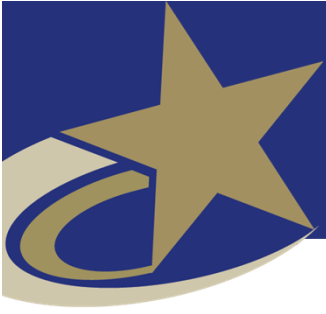

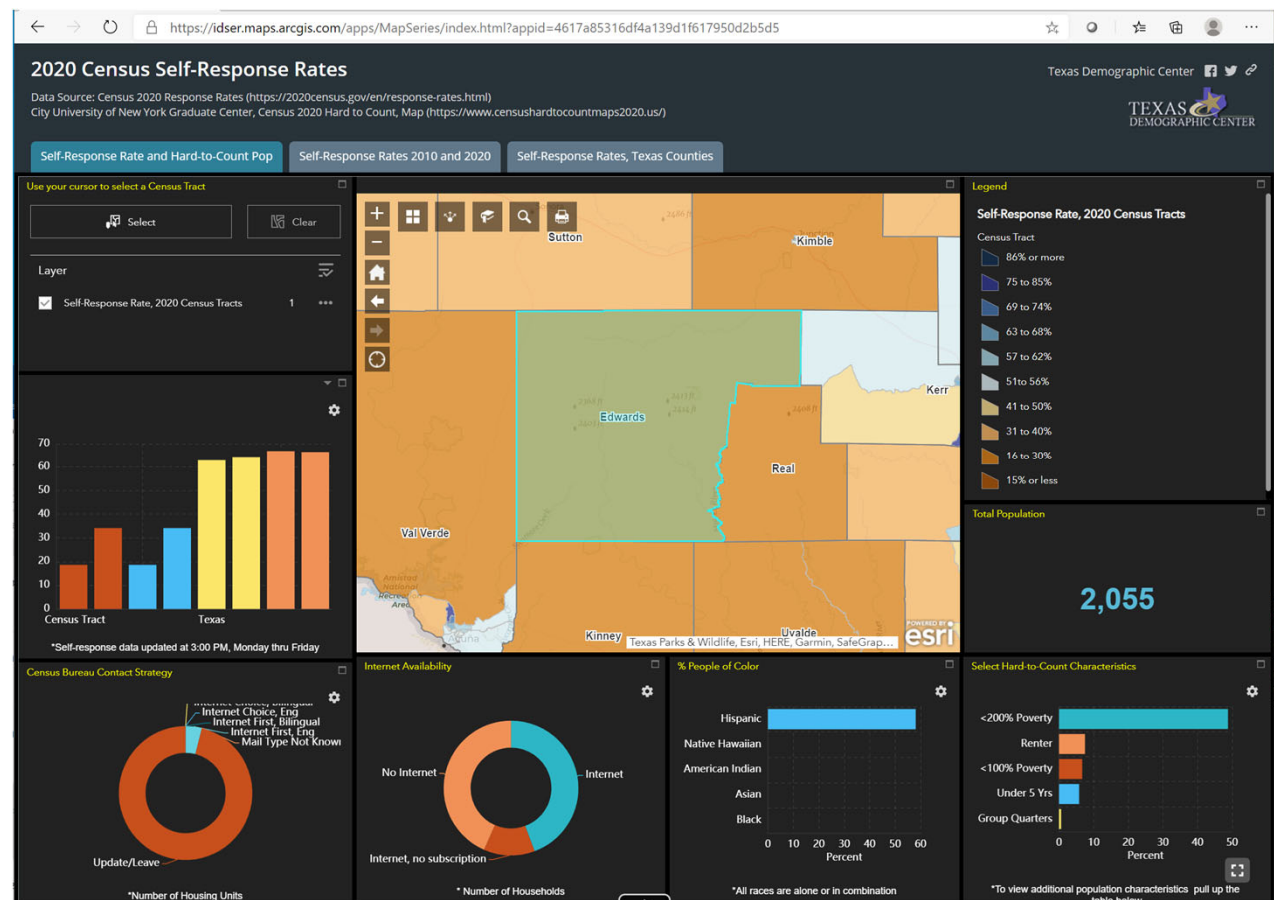

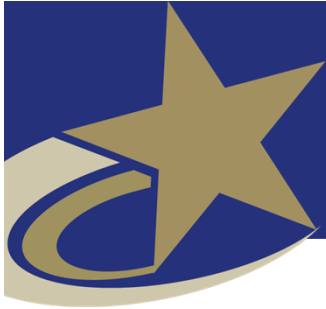


Self-response Rates and Hard-to-Count Population in Edwards County

Self-response rate to the 2020 Census is under 20% in **Edwards** county. Data of the census tract in Edwards show less than 50% of households living under 200% poverty, fewer than half having internet subscription, and more than 50% of the population being Hispanic, among other “hard-to-count” characteristics.

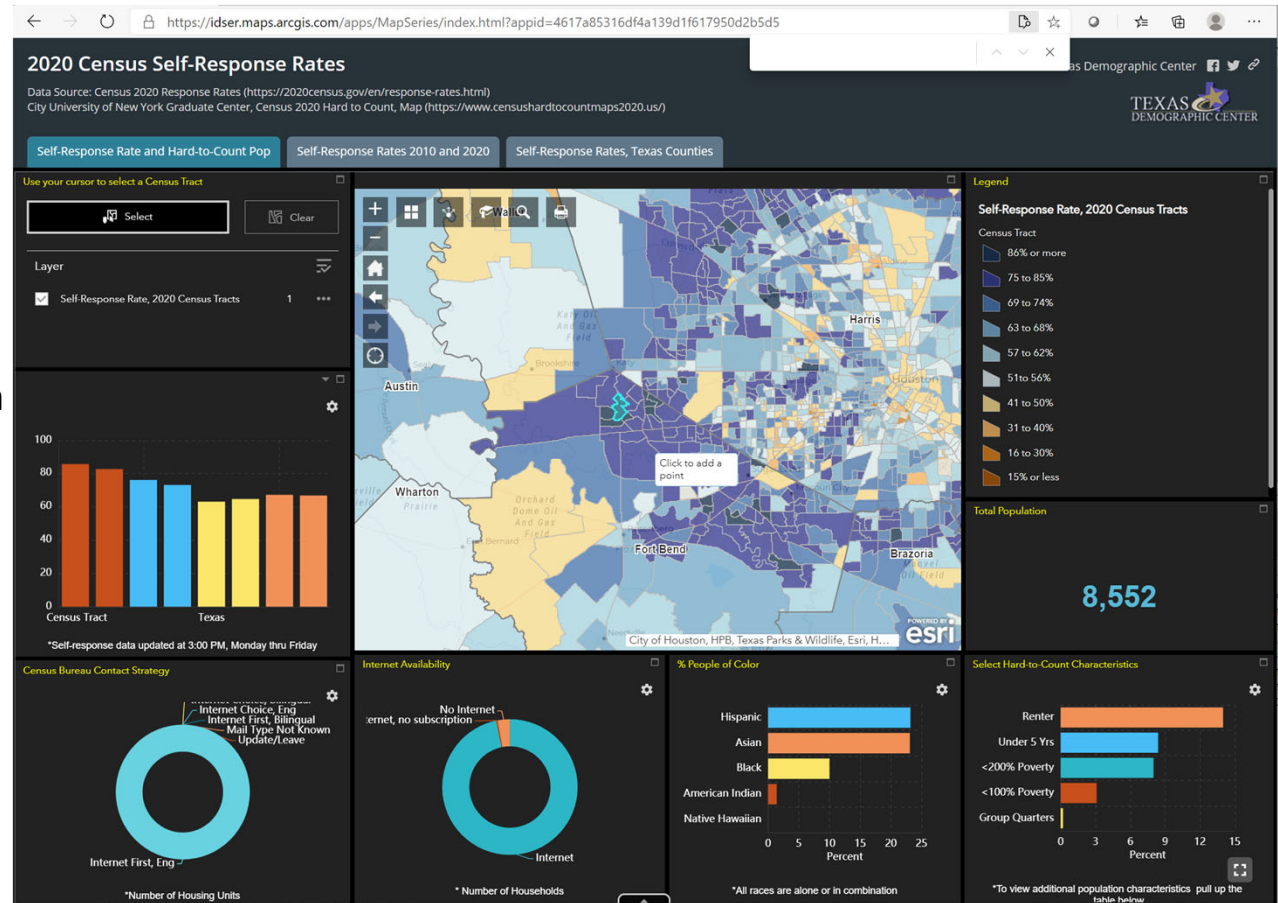




Self-response Rates and Hard-to-Count Population in Fort Bend County

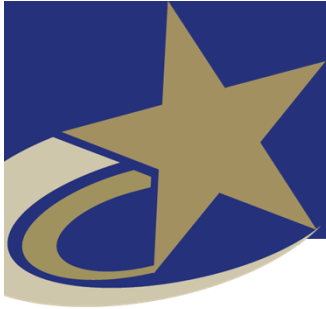

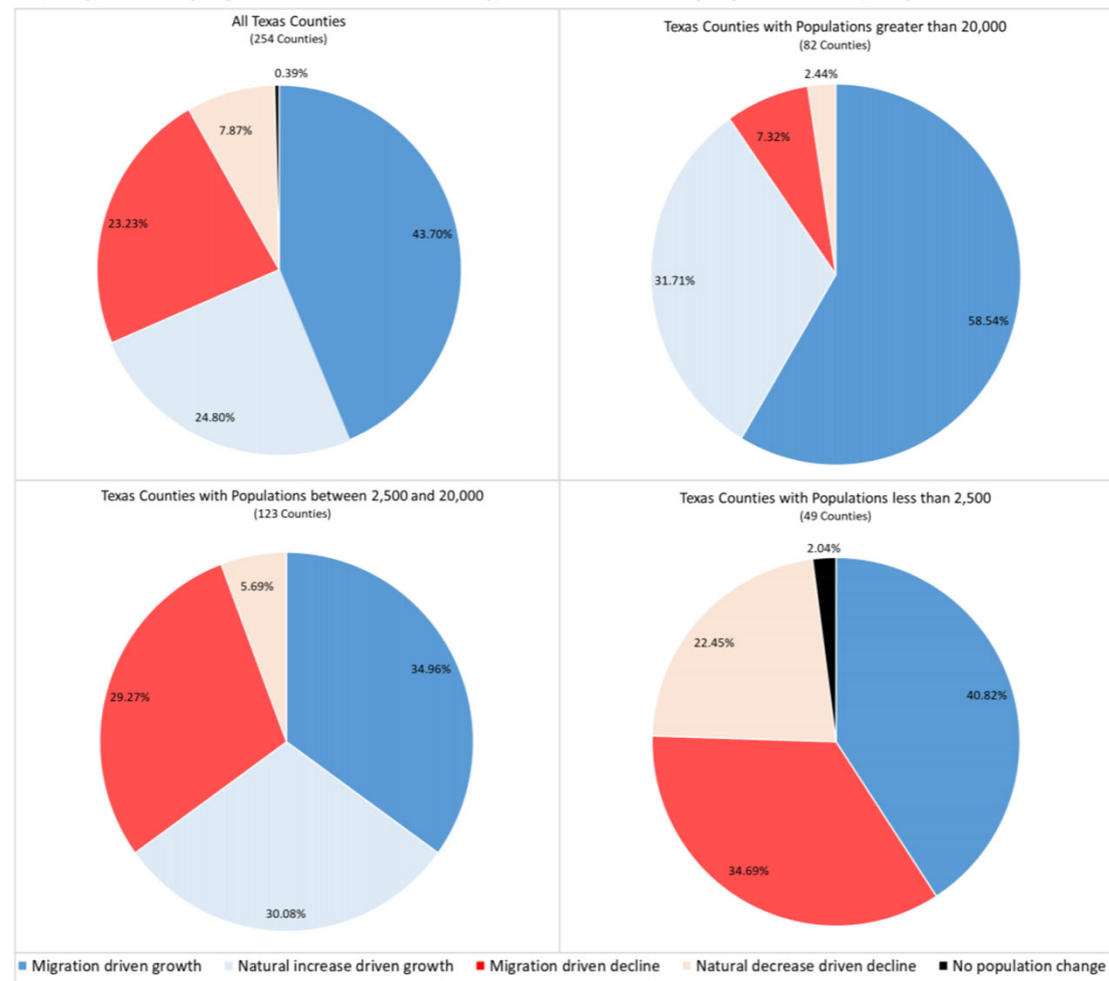

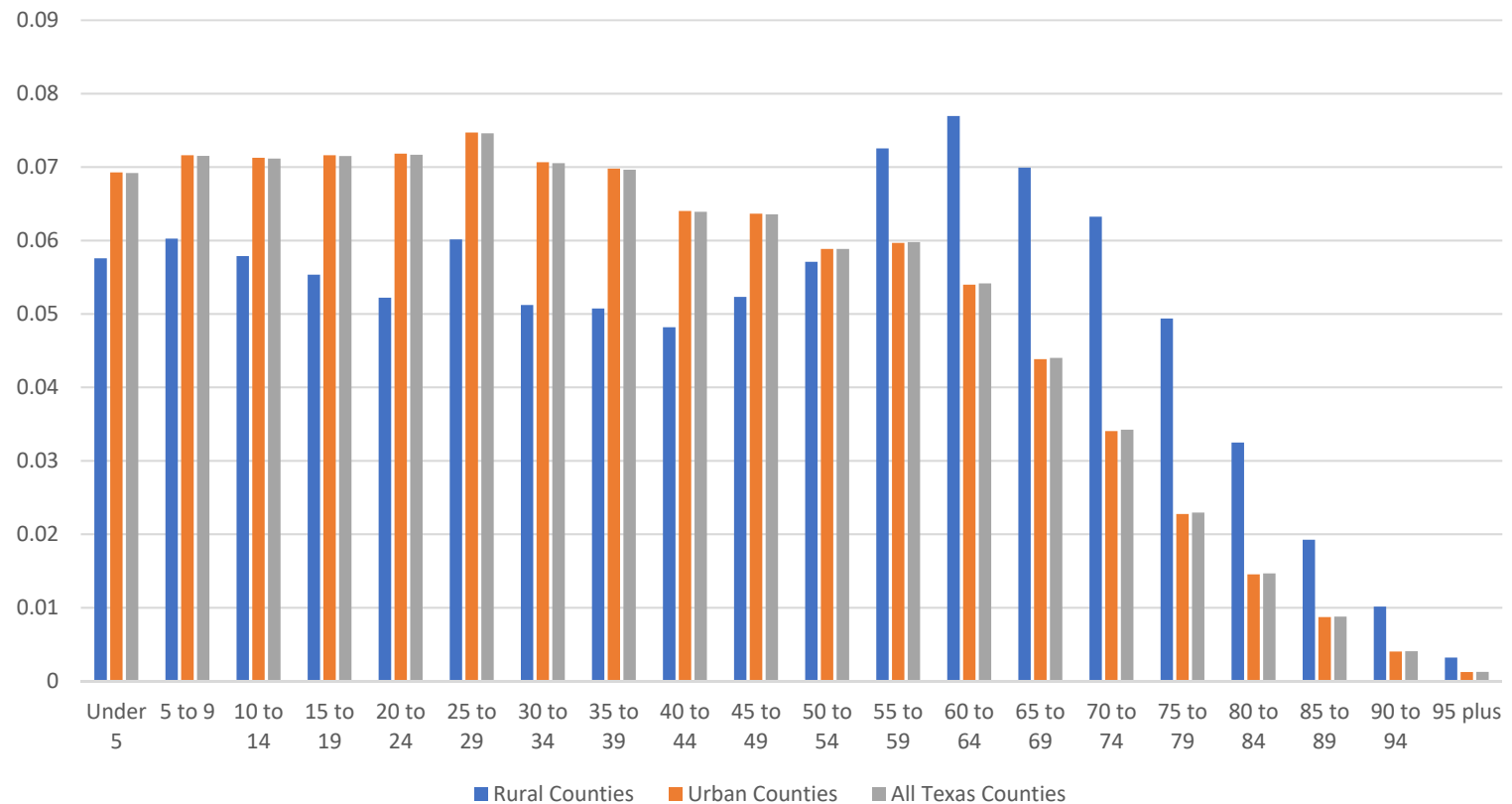
