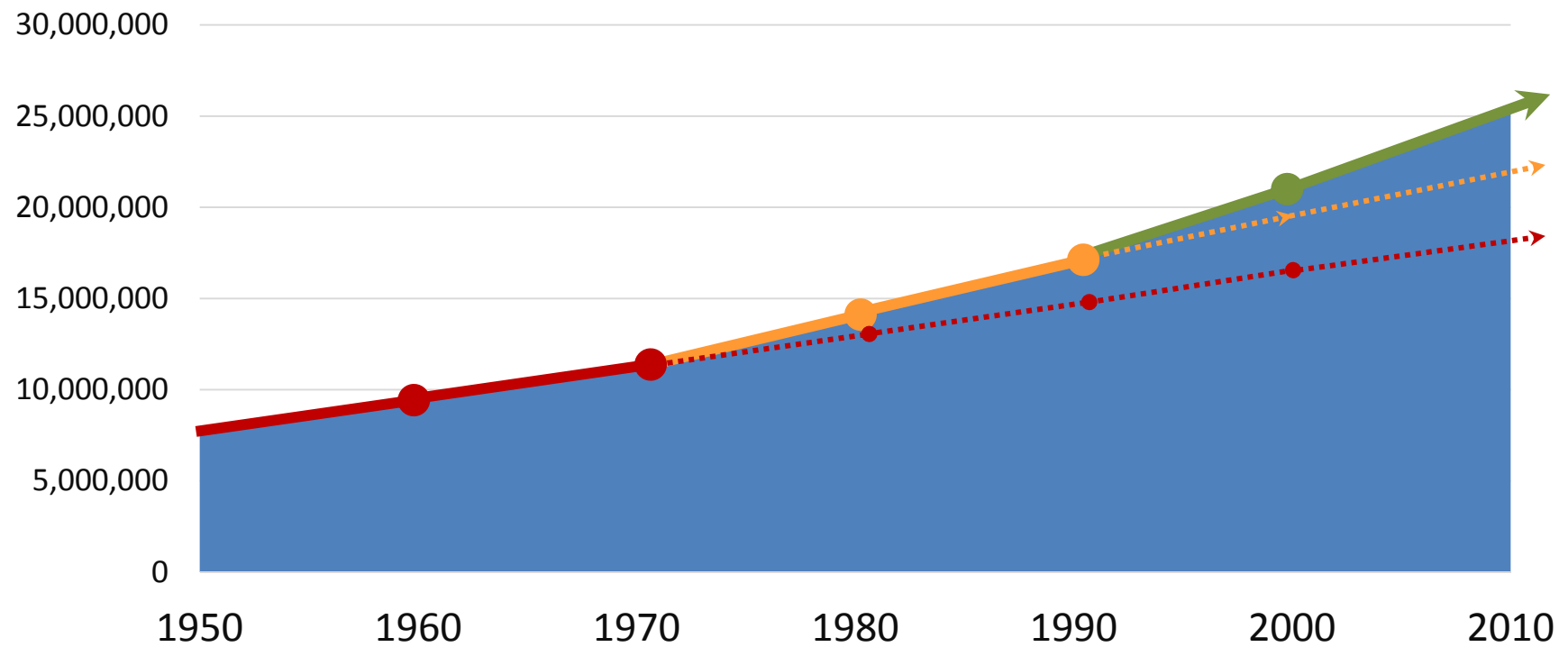
Total Population and Components of Population Change in Texas, 1950-2014



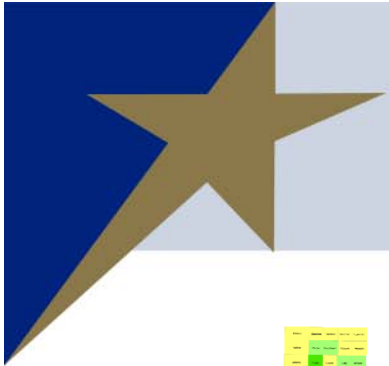

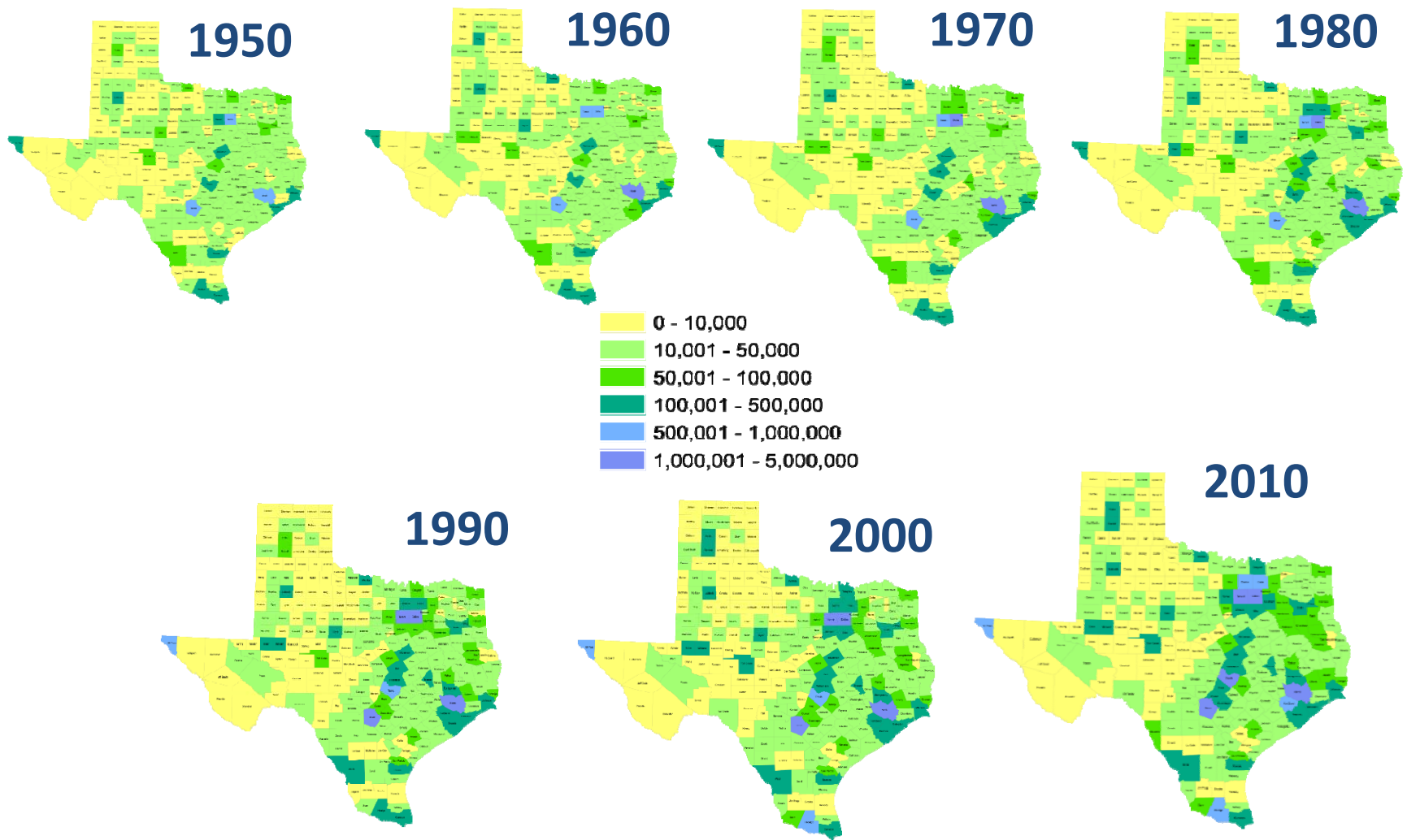
Population Growth, Texas, 1950-2010



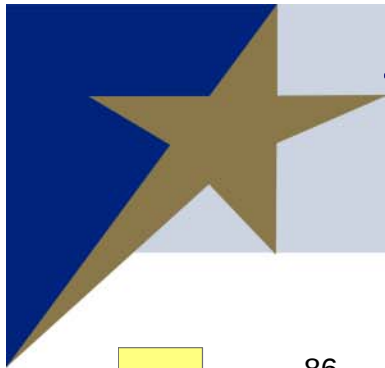

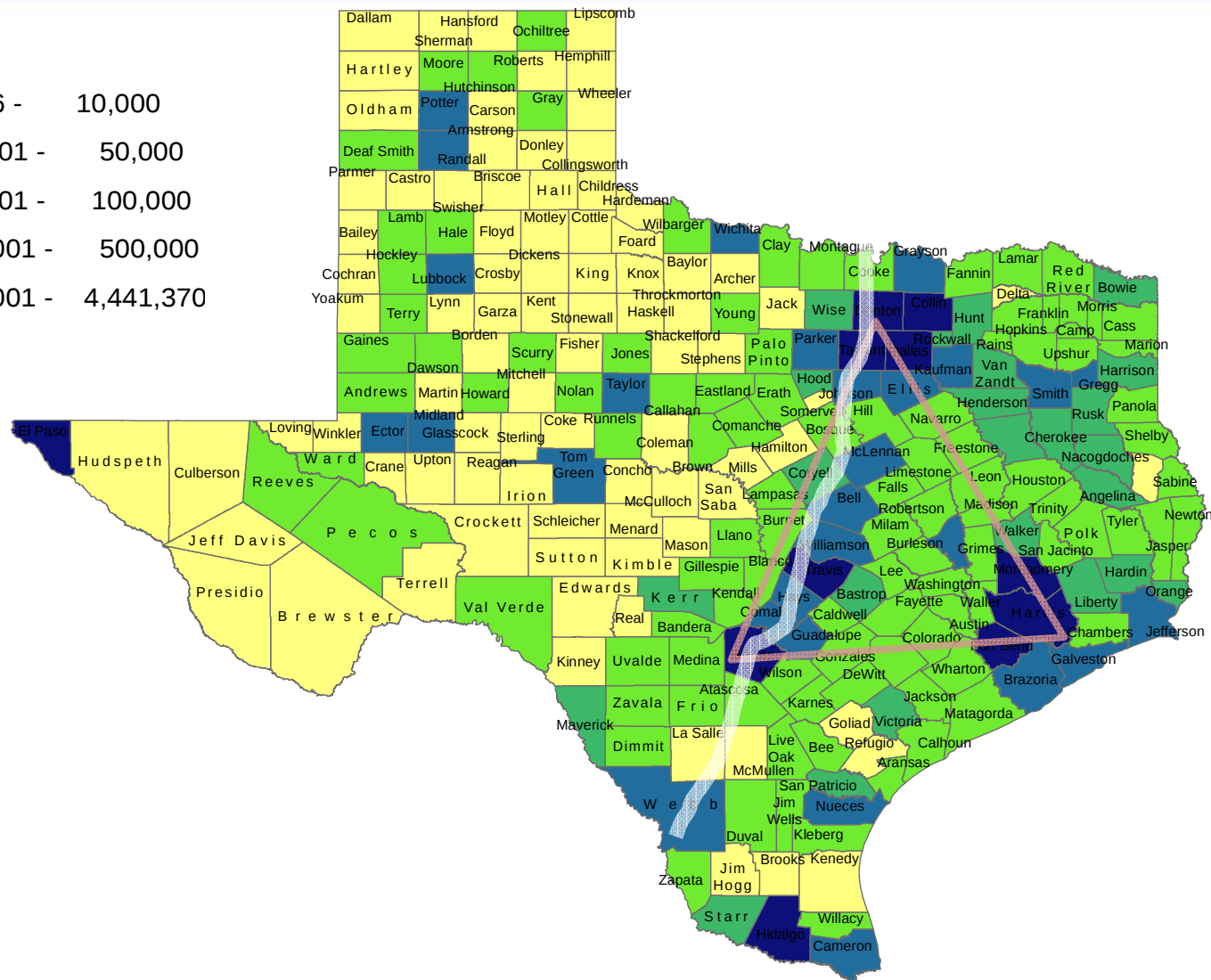
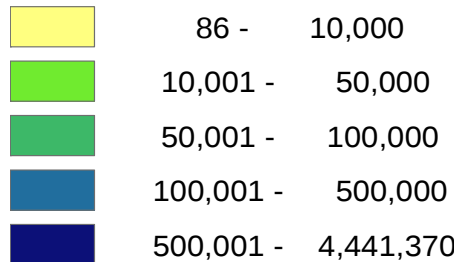
Historic County Population, Texas



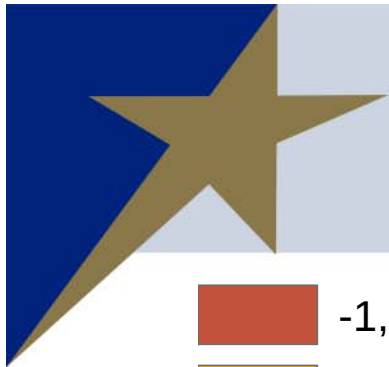

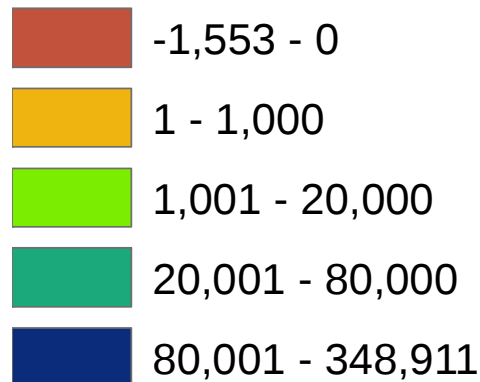
Total Estimated Population by County, Texas, 2014



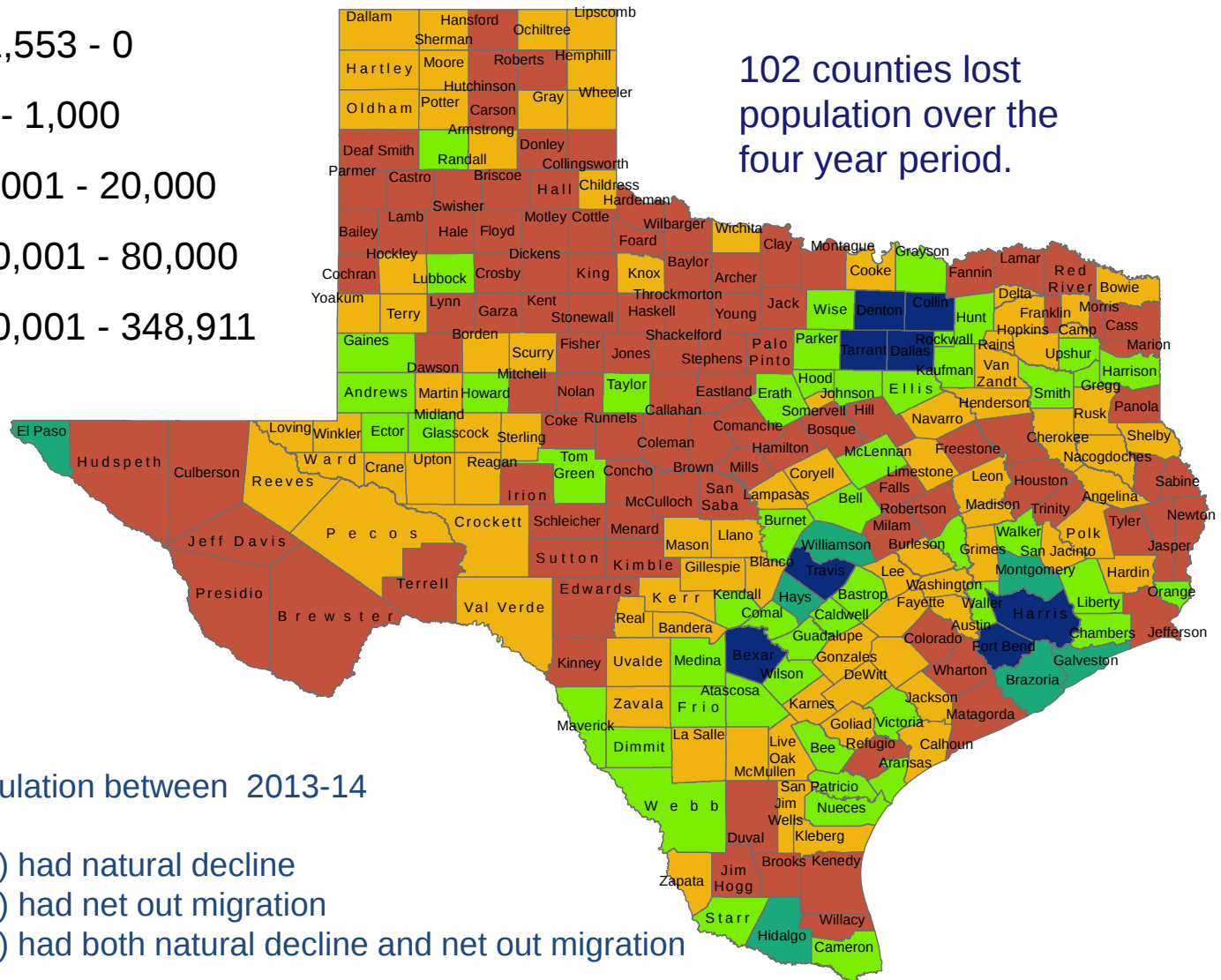

95 counties lost population between 2013-14

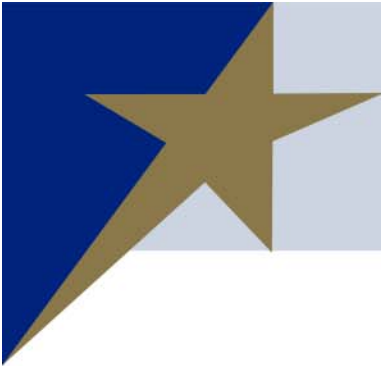

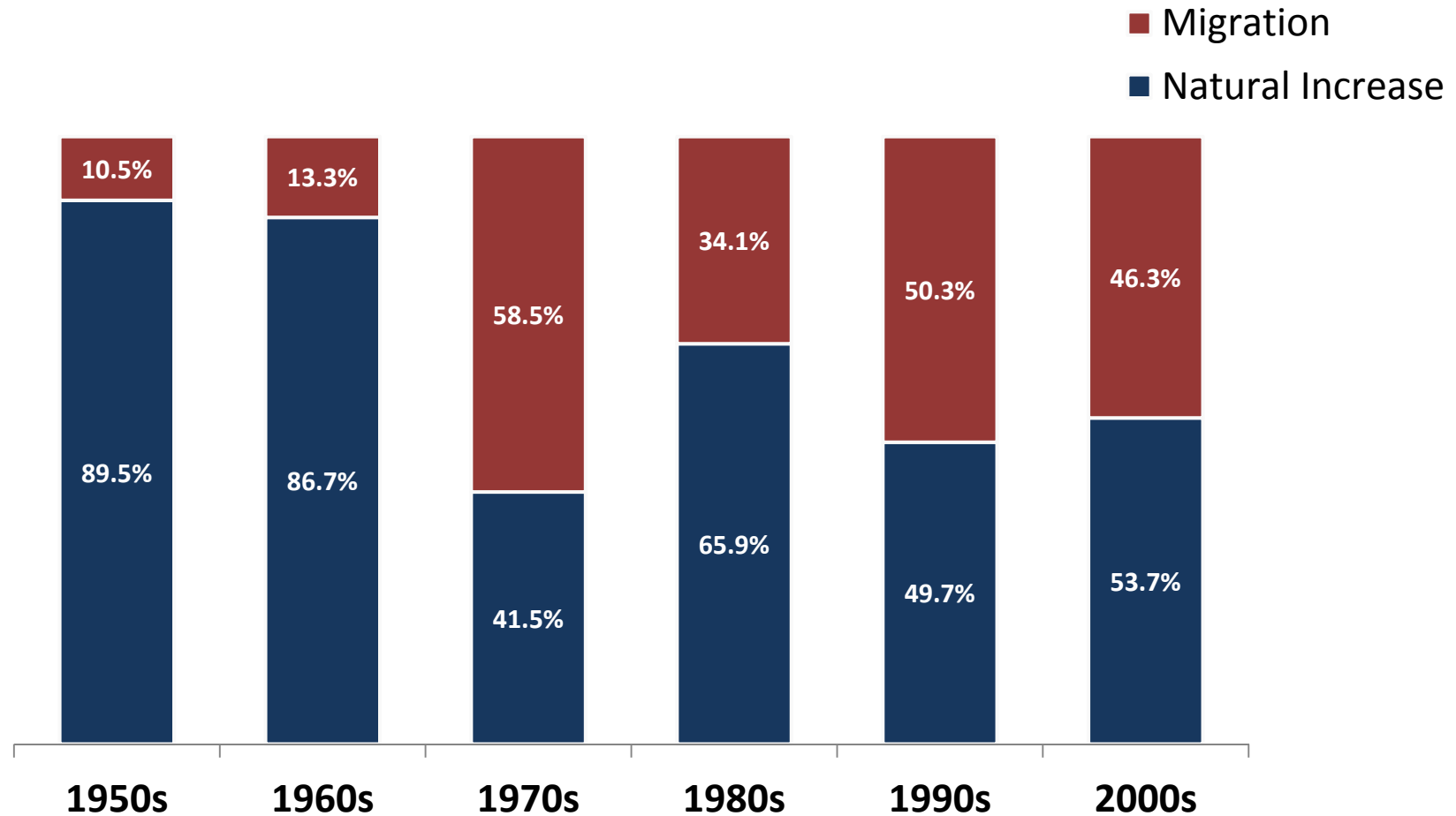

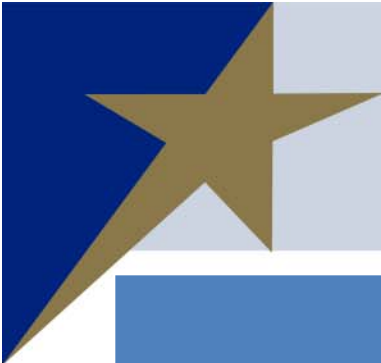




Components of Population Change by Percent in Texas, 1950-2010

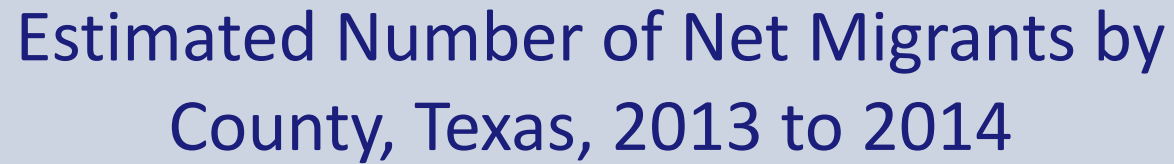

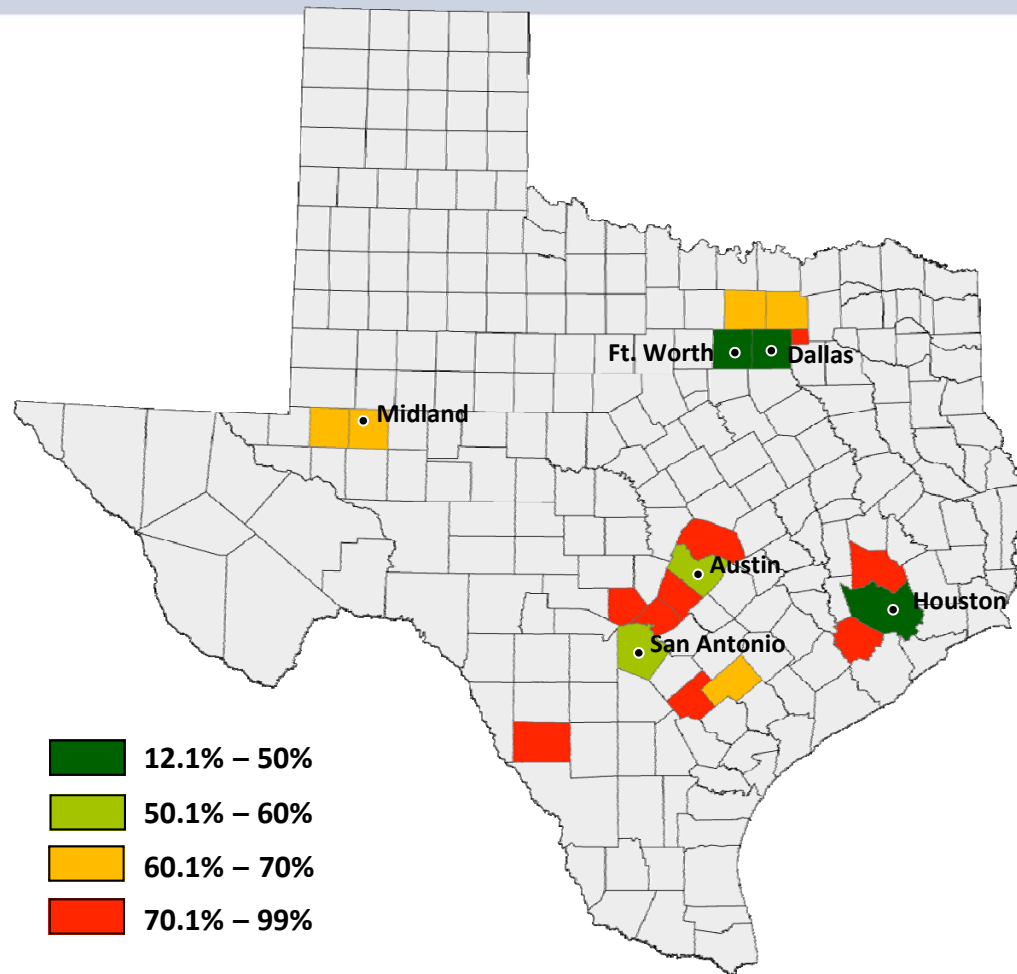

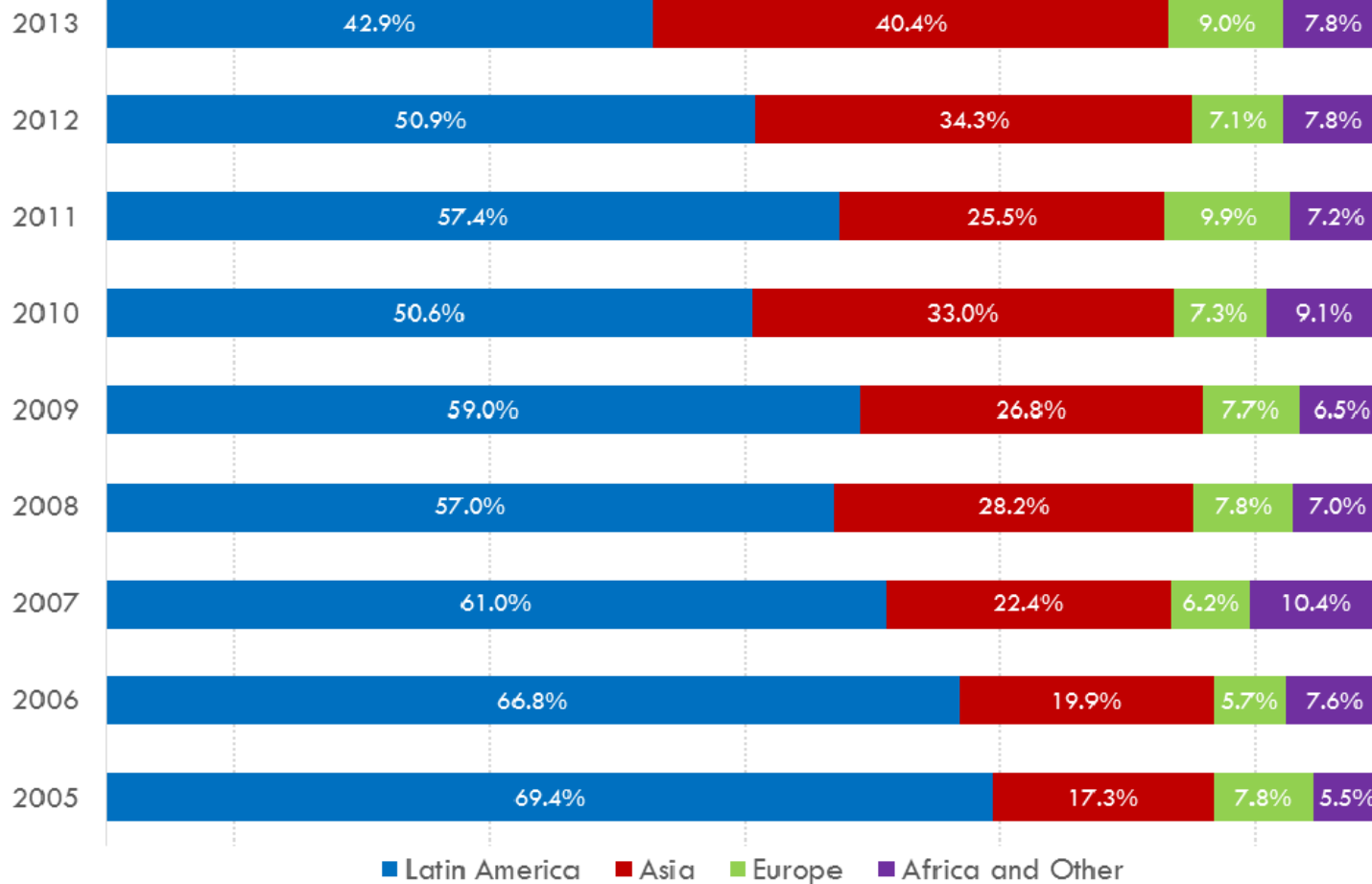

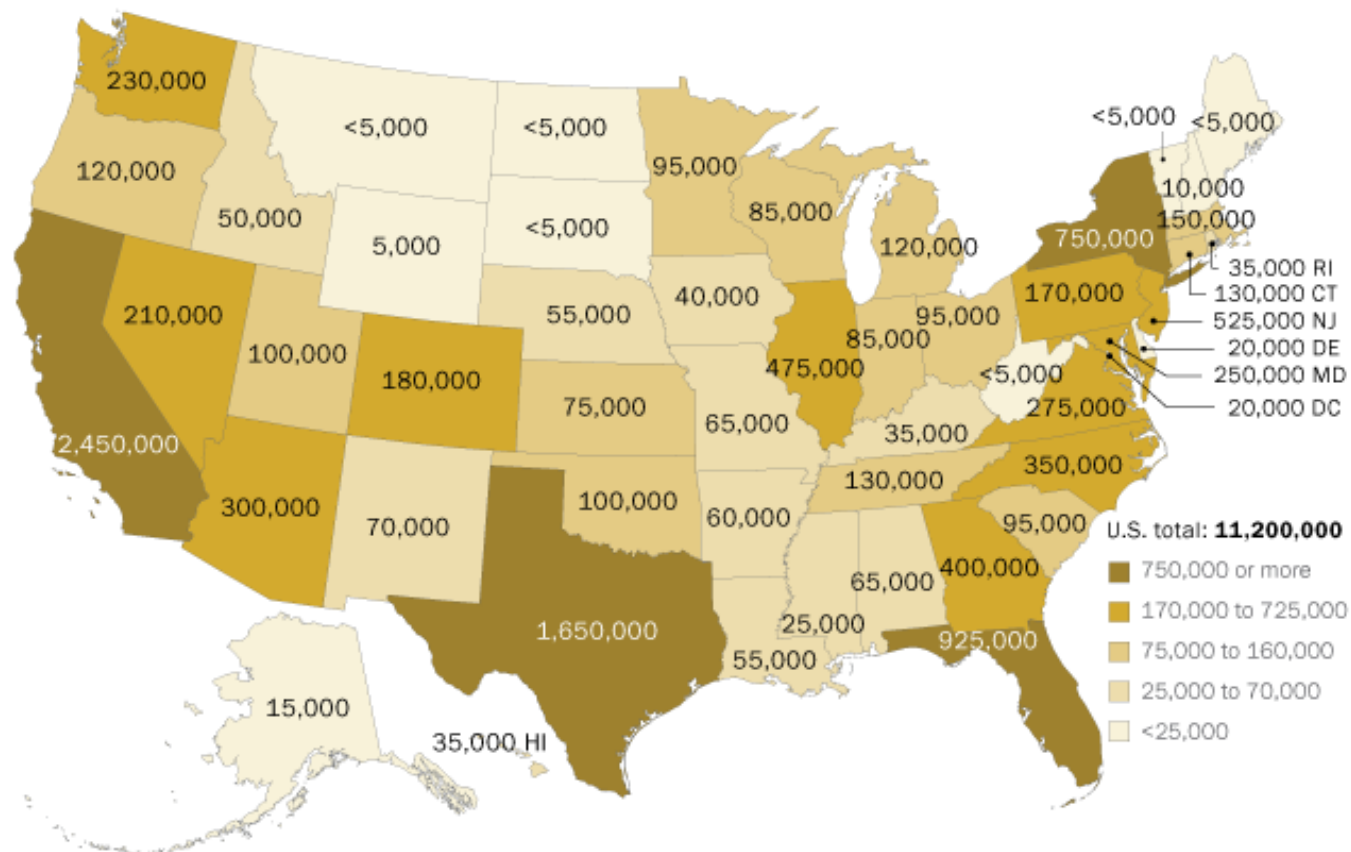


Annual Shares of Recent Non-Citizen Immigrants to Texas by World Area of Birth, 2005-2013

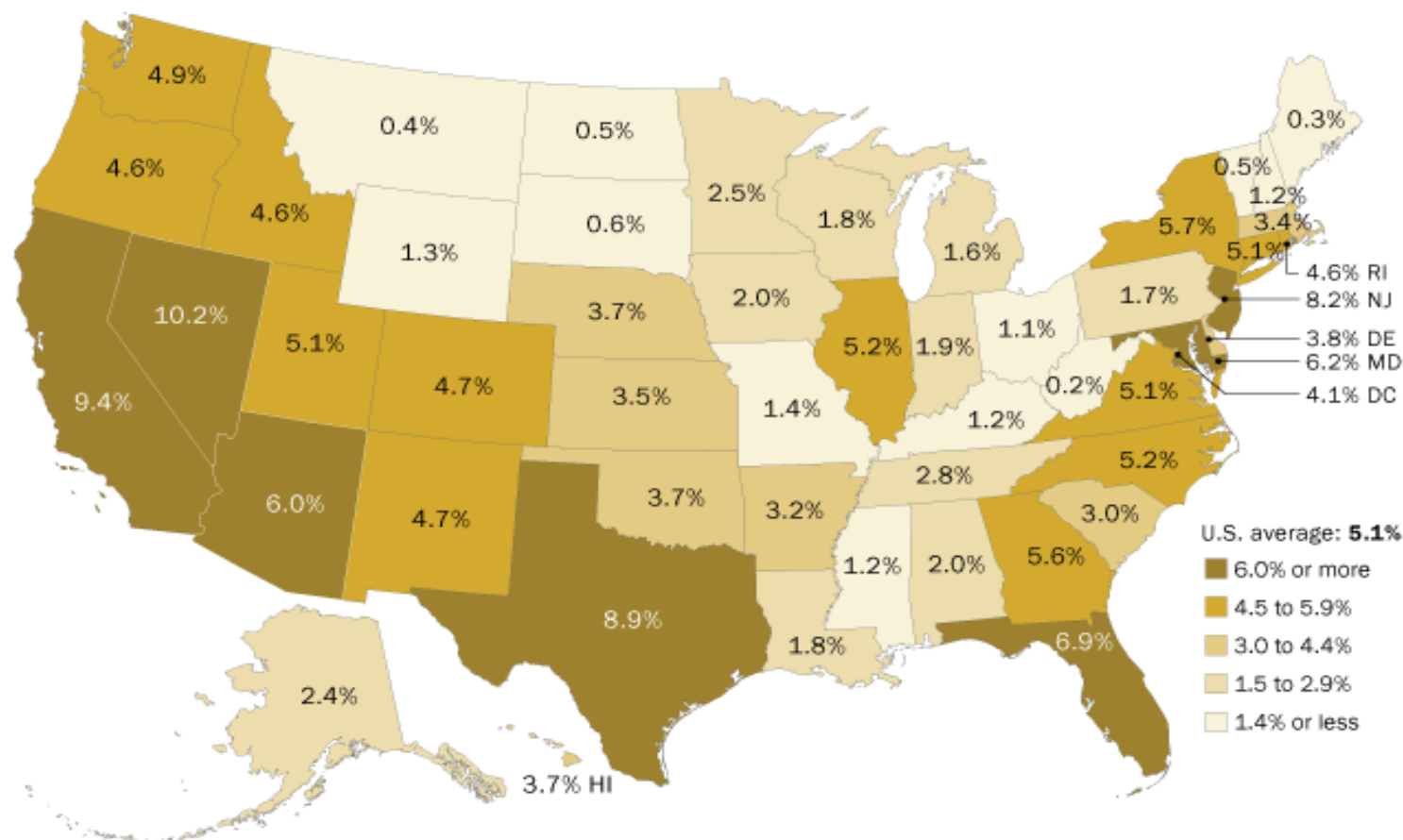
Unauthorized Immigrant Population, by State, 2012

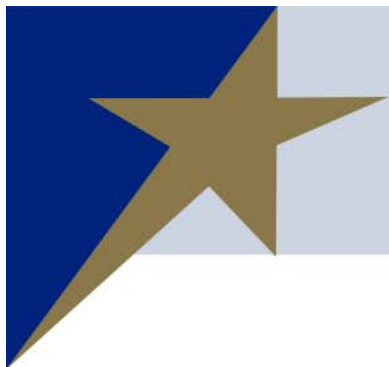
Unauthorized Immigrants as Share of Labor Force, by State, 2012

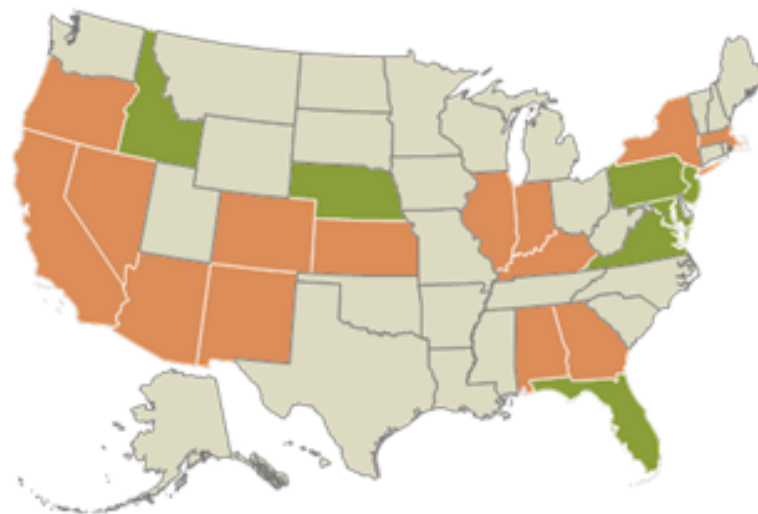

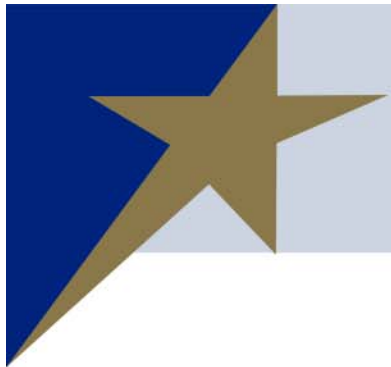

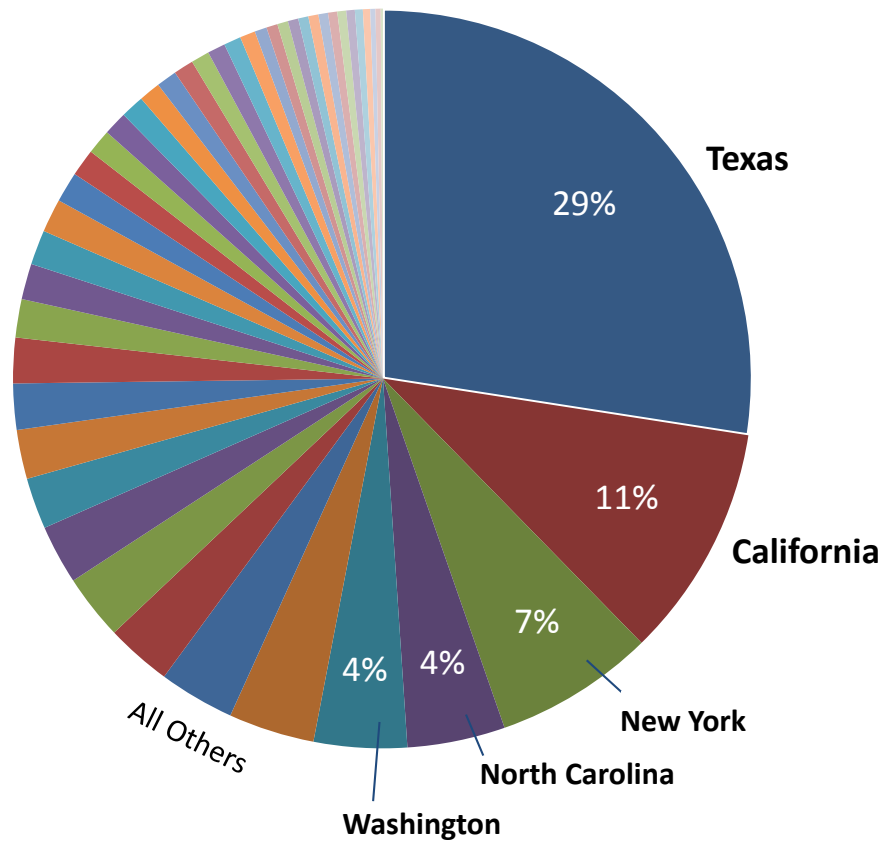
Texas Leads U.S. Job Growth, 2004-2014

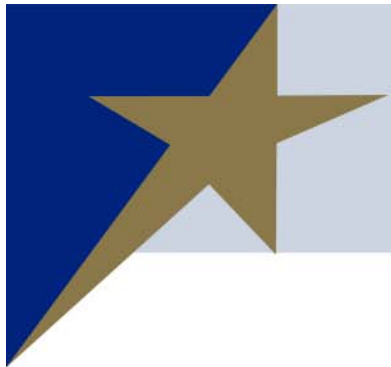




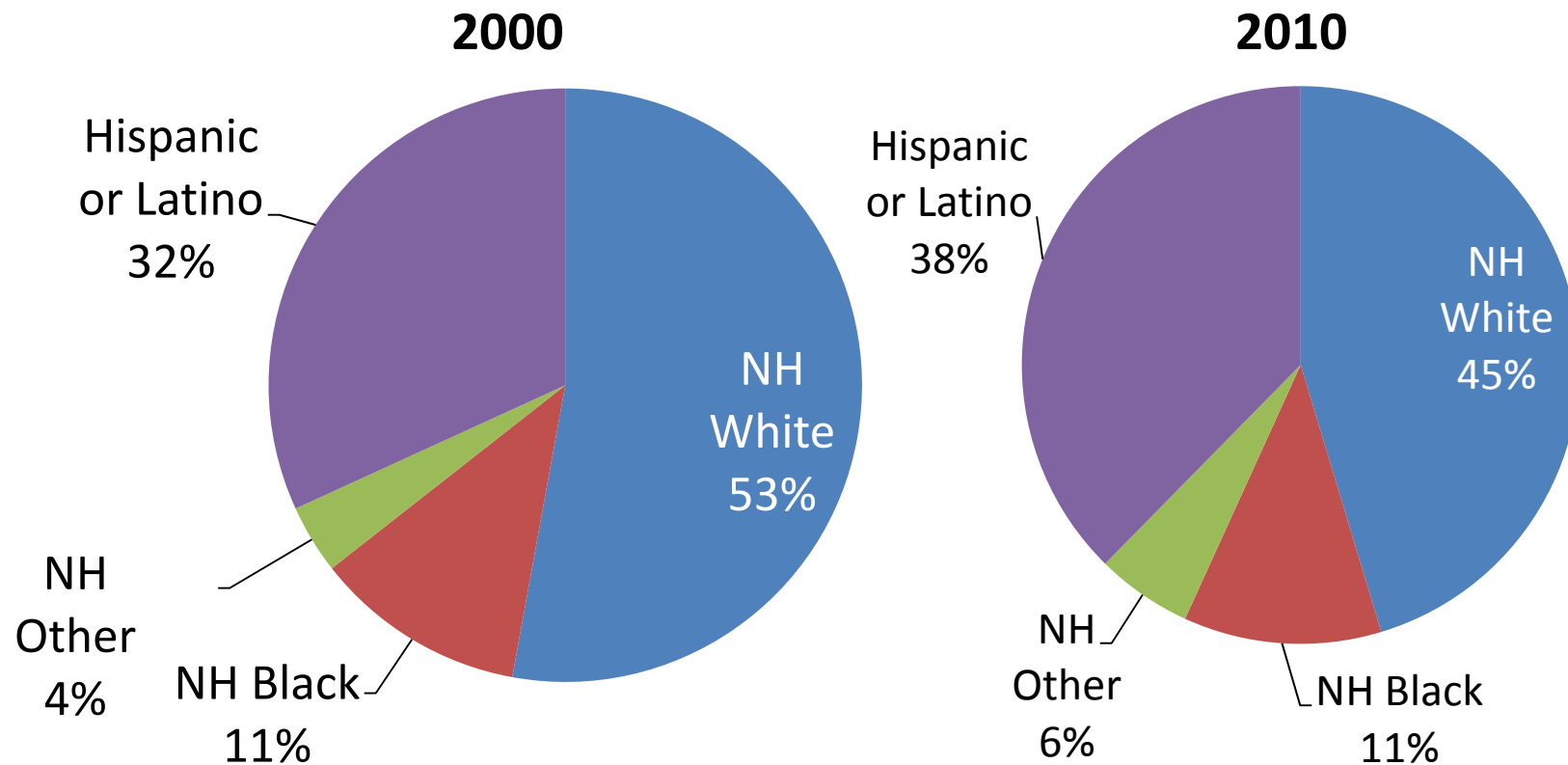

State

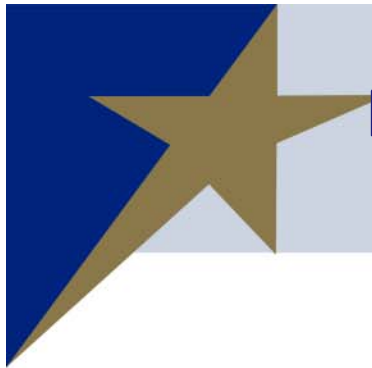




Texas Racial and Ethnic Composition, 2000 and 2010

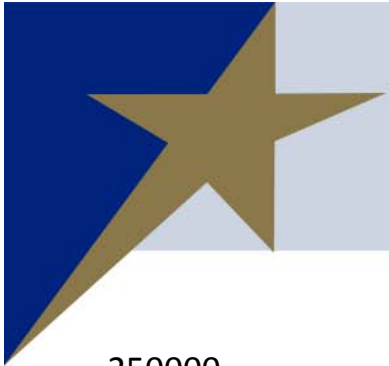

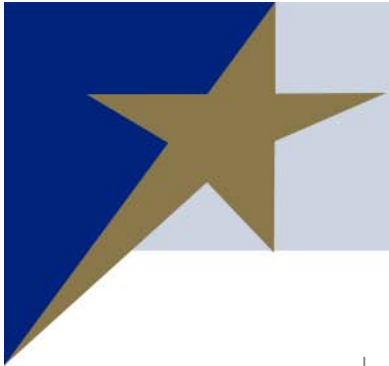

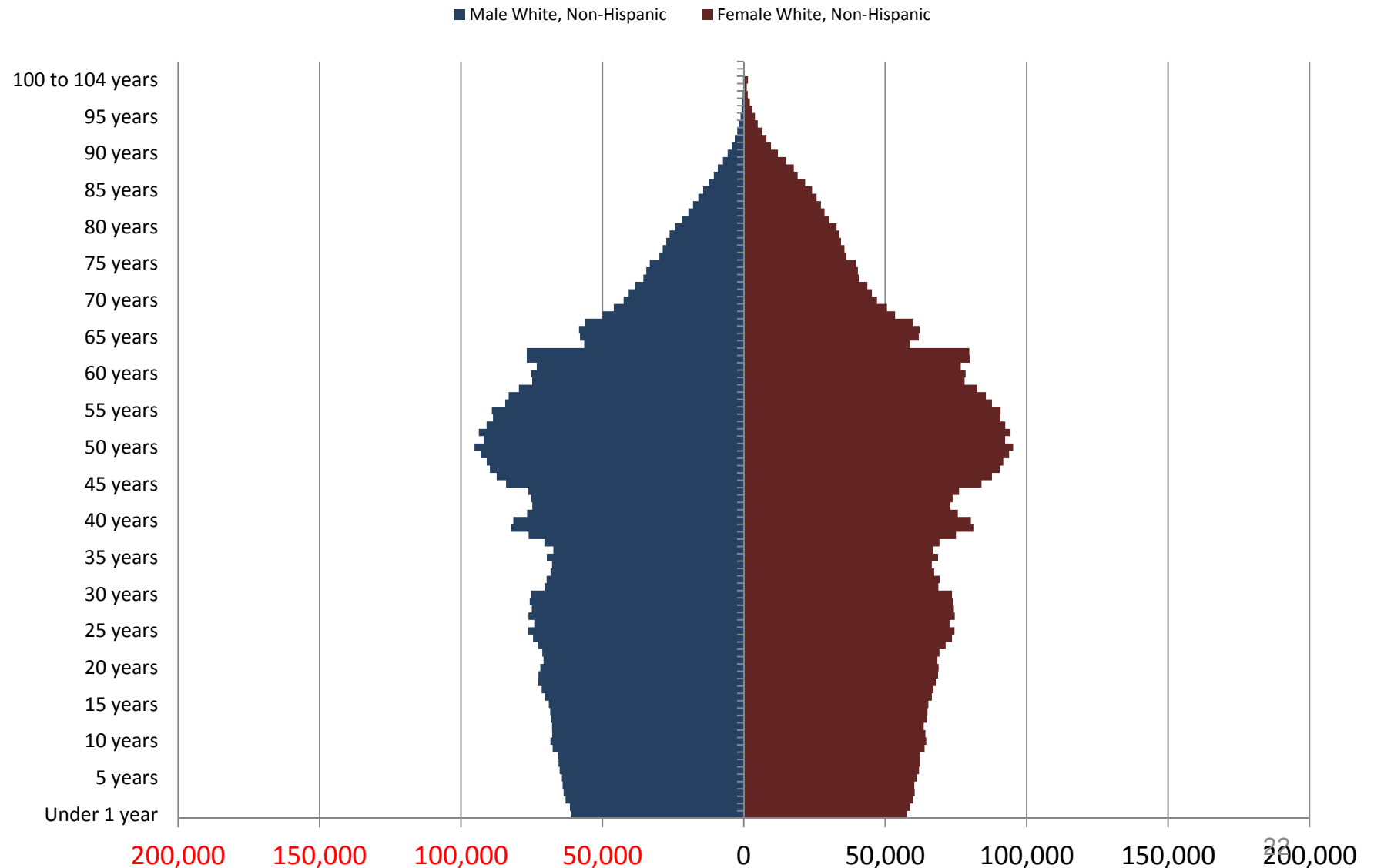
Texas White (non-Hispanic) and Hispanic Populations by Age, 2010



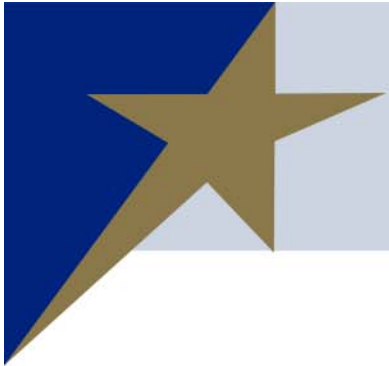

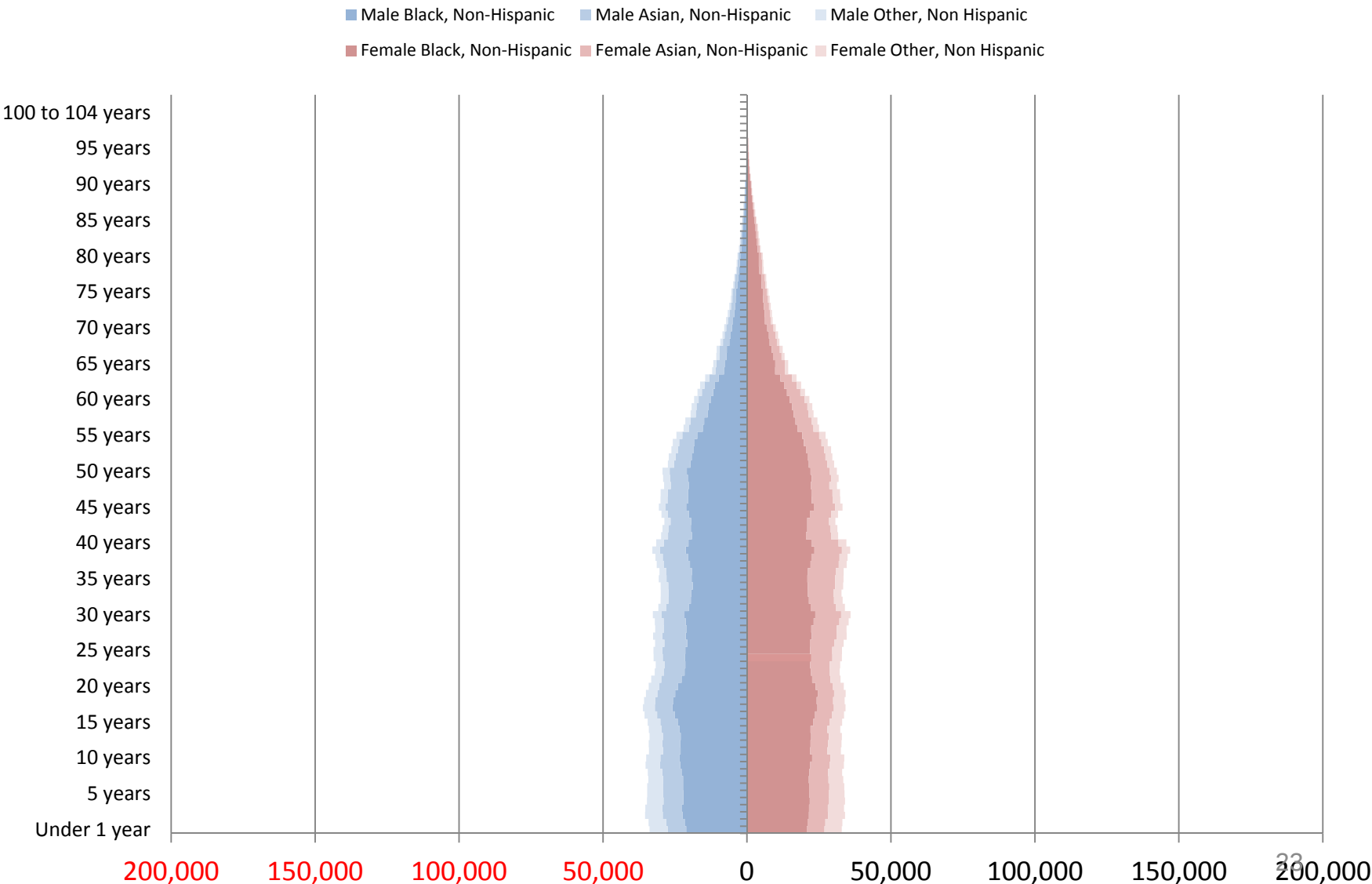
Texas Population Pyramid by Race/Ethnicity, 2010



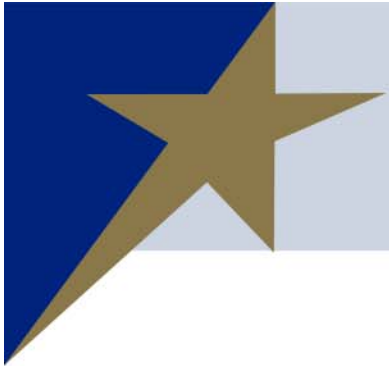

Texas Population Pyramid by Race/Ethnicity, 2010

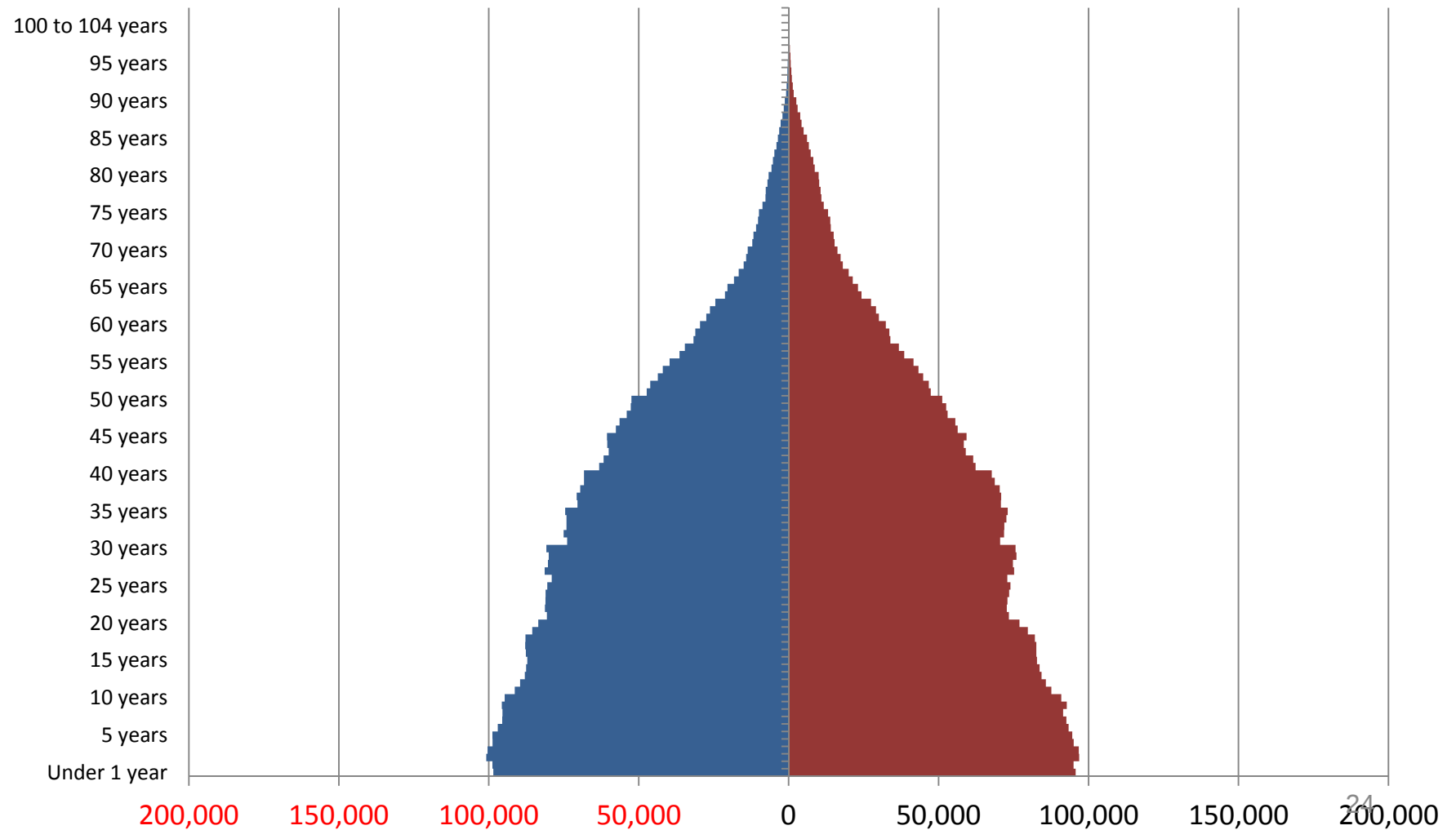

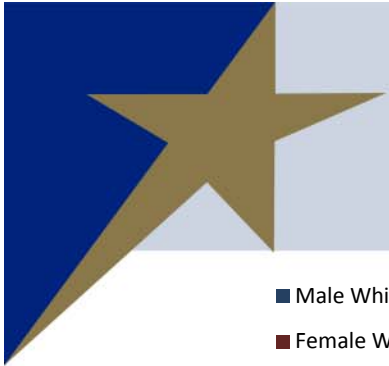


Texas Population Pyramid by Race/Ethnicity, 2010

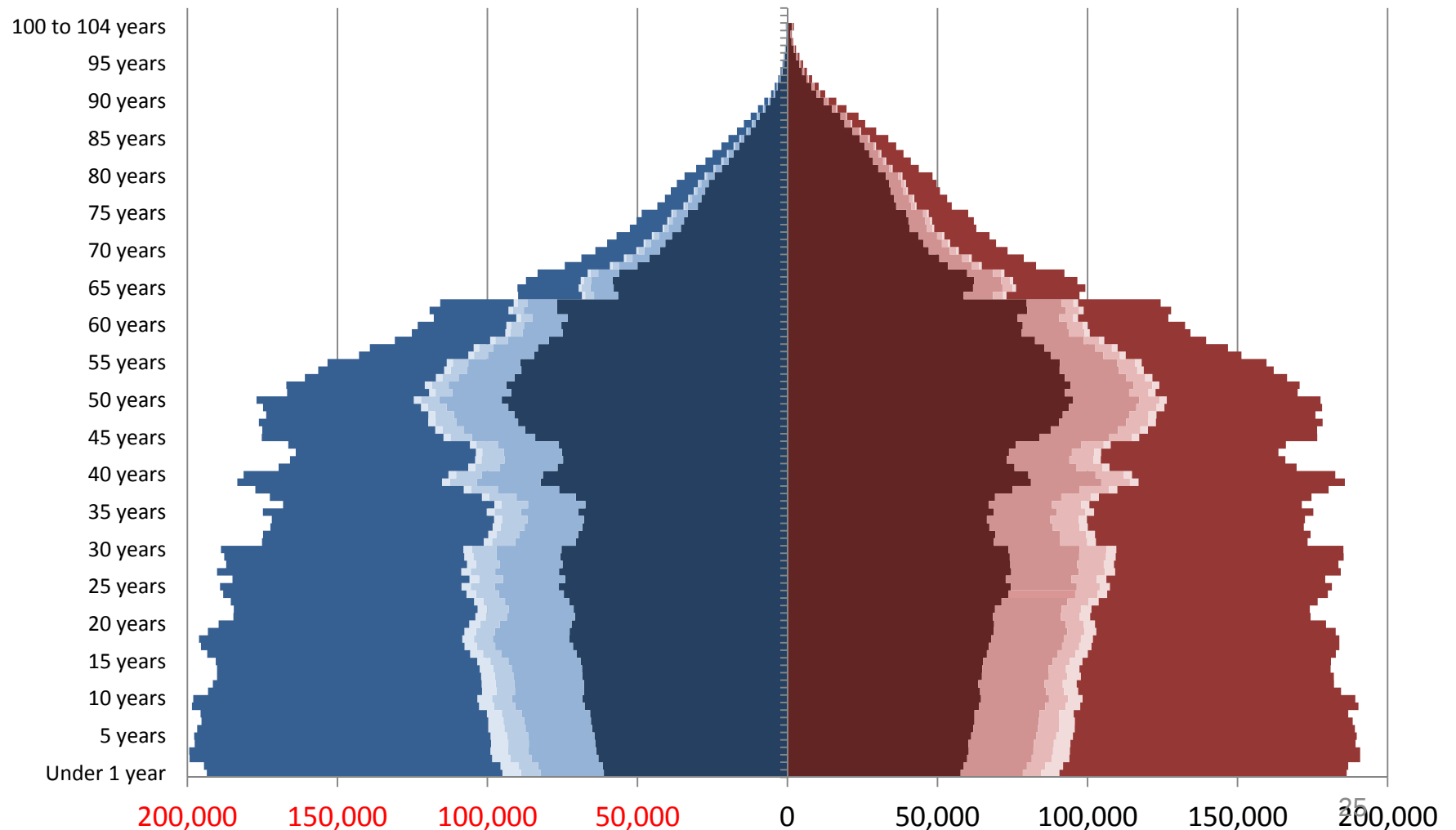

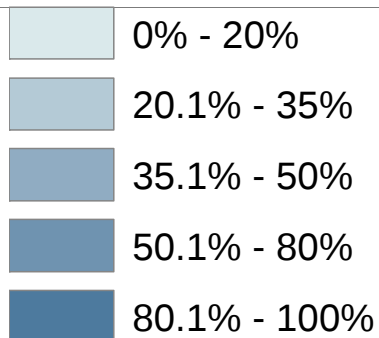

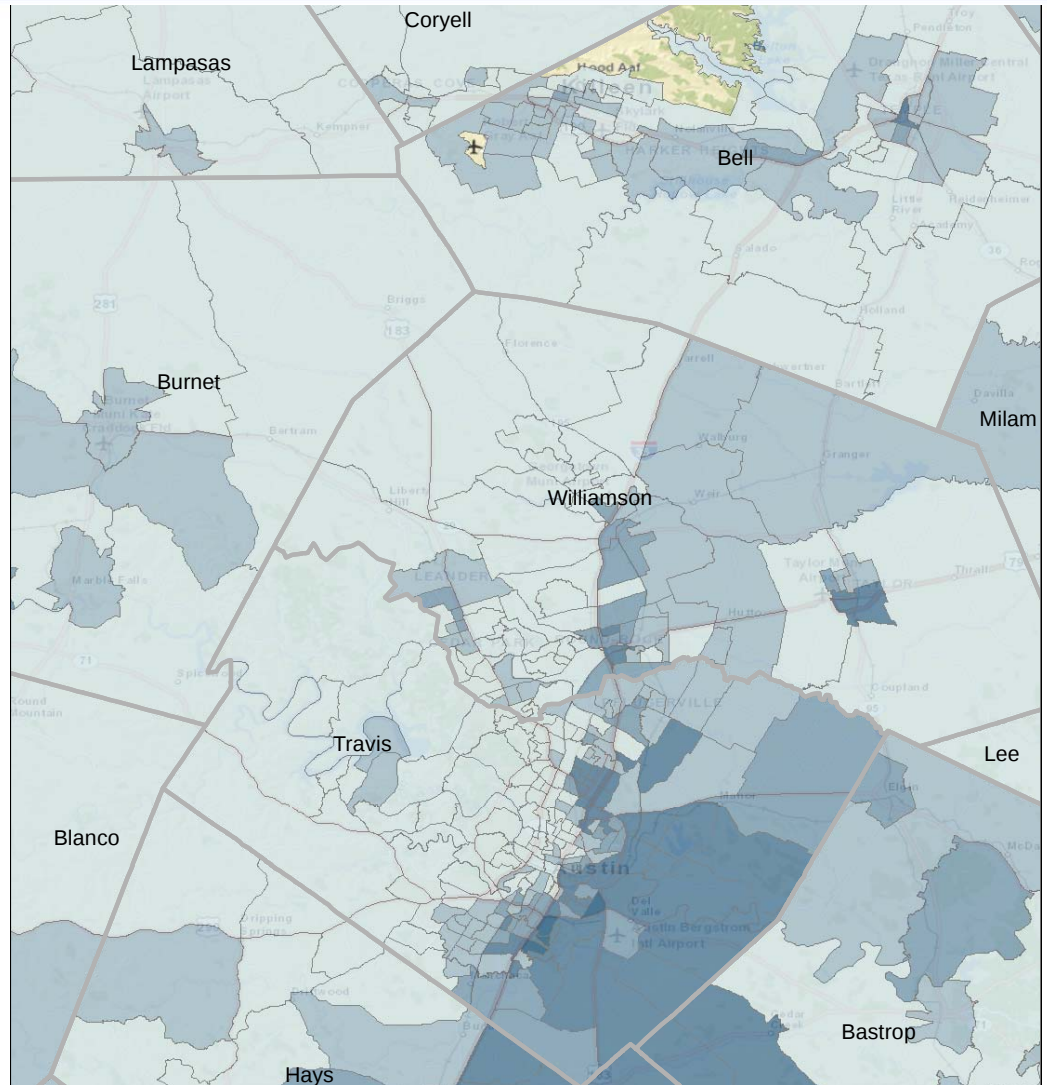
Percent of the Population that was Born in Texas, Census Tracts, Austin Area, Texas, 2009-2013



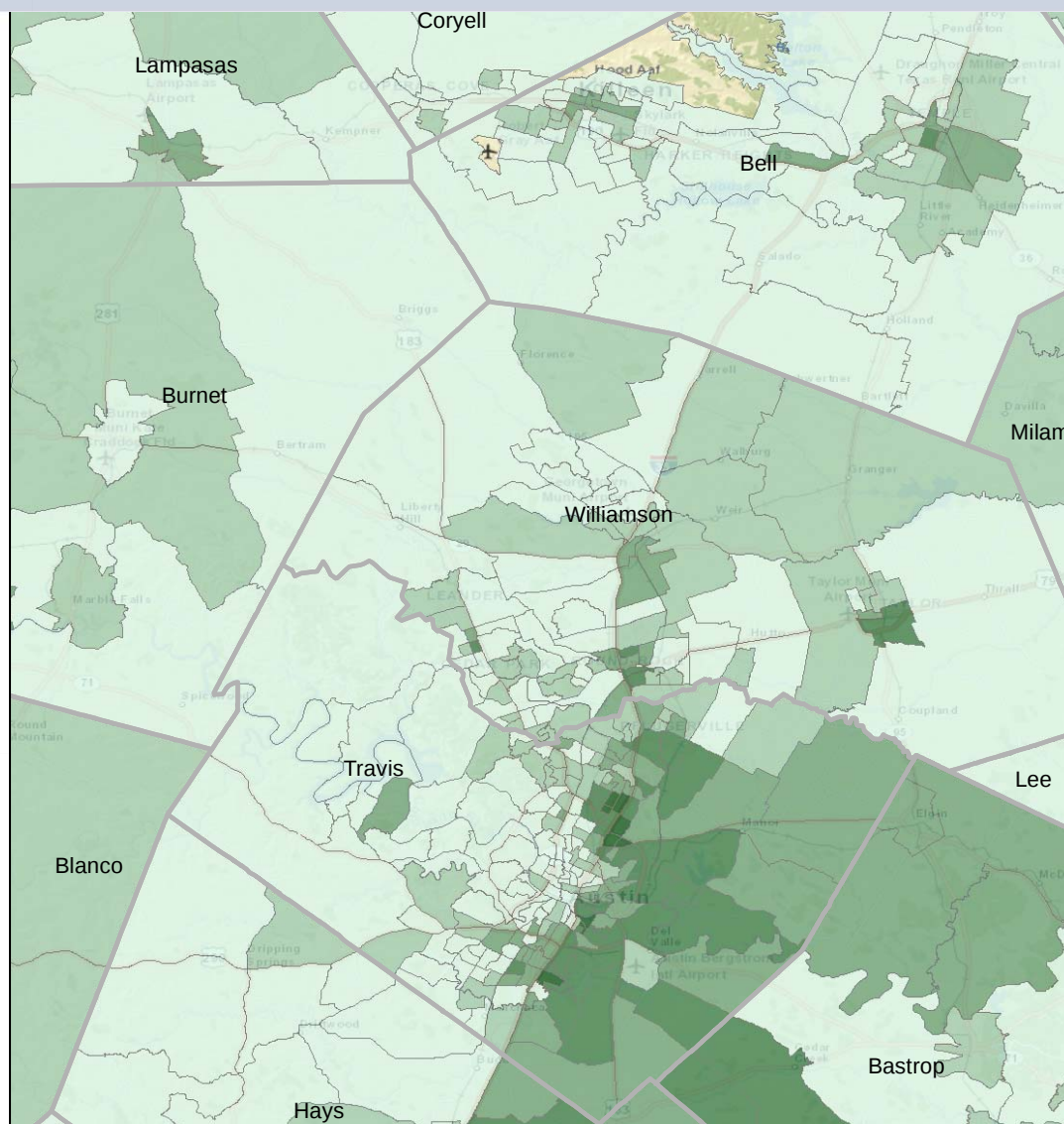
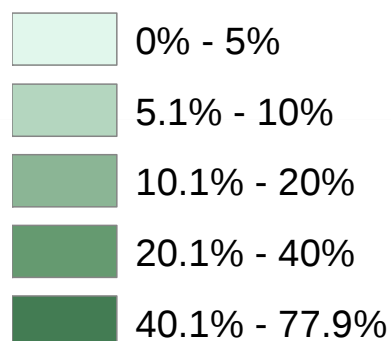
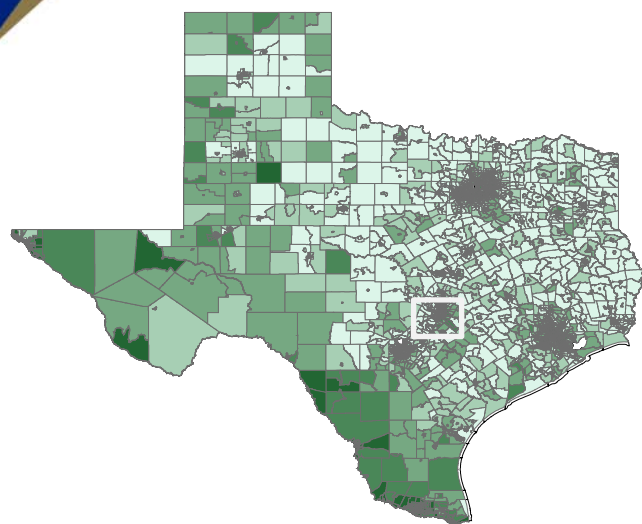

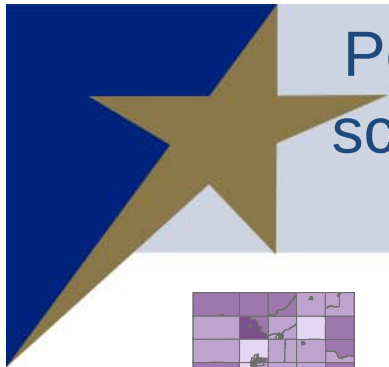
Percent of population that is of Hispanic descent, Census Tracts, Austin Area, Texas, 2009-2013



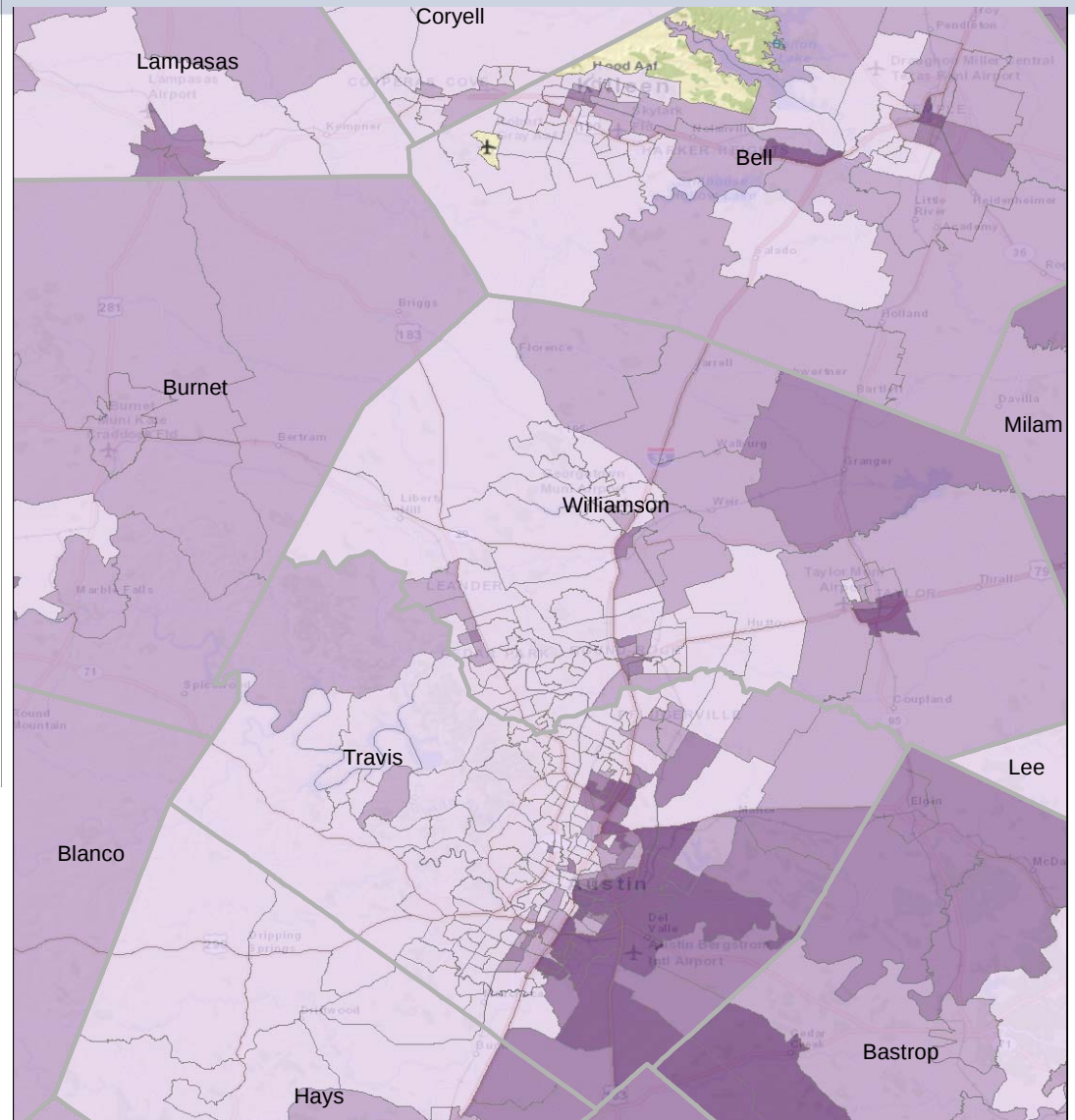
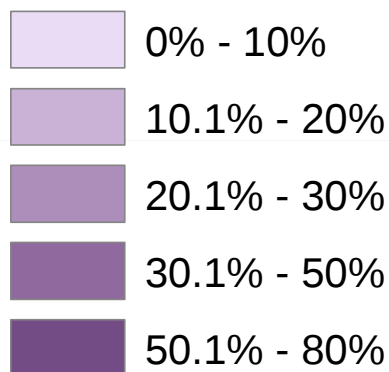
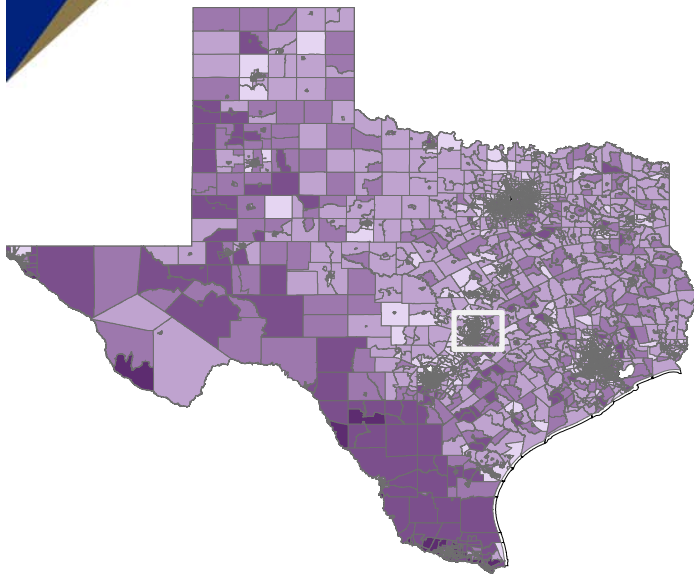
Percent of population speaking a language other than English at home and speak English less than very well, Census Tracts, Austin Area, Texas, 2009-2013



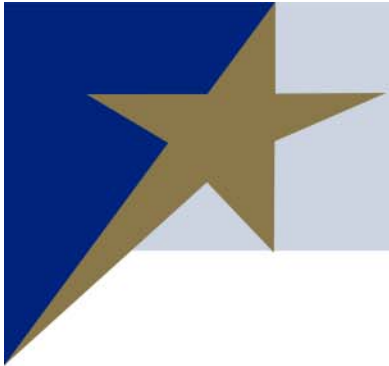

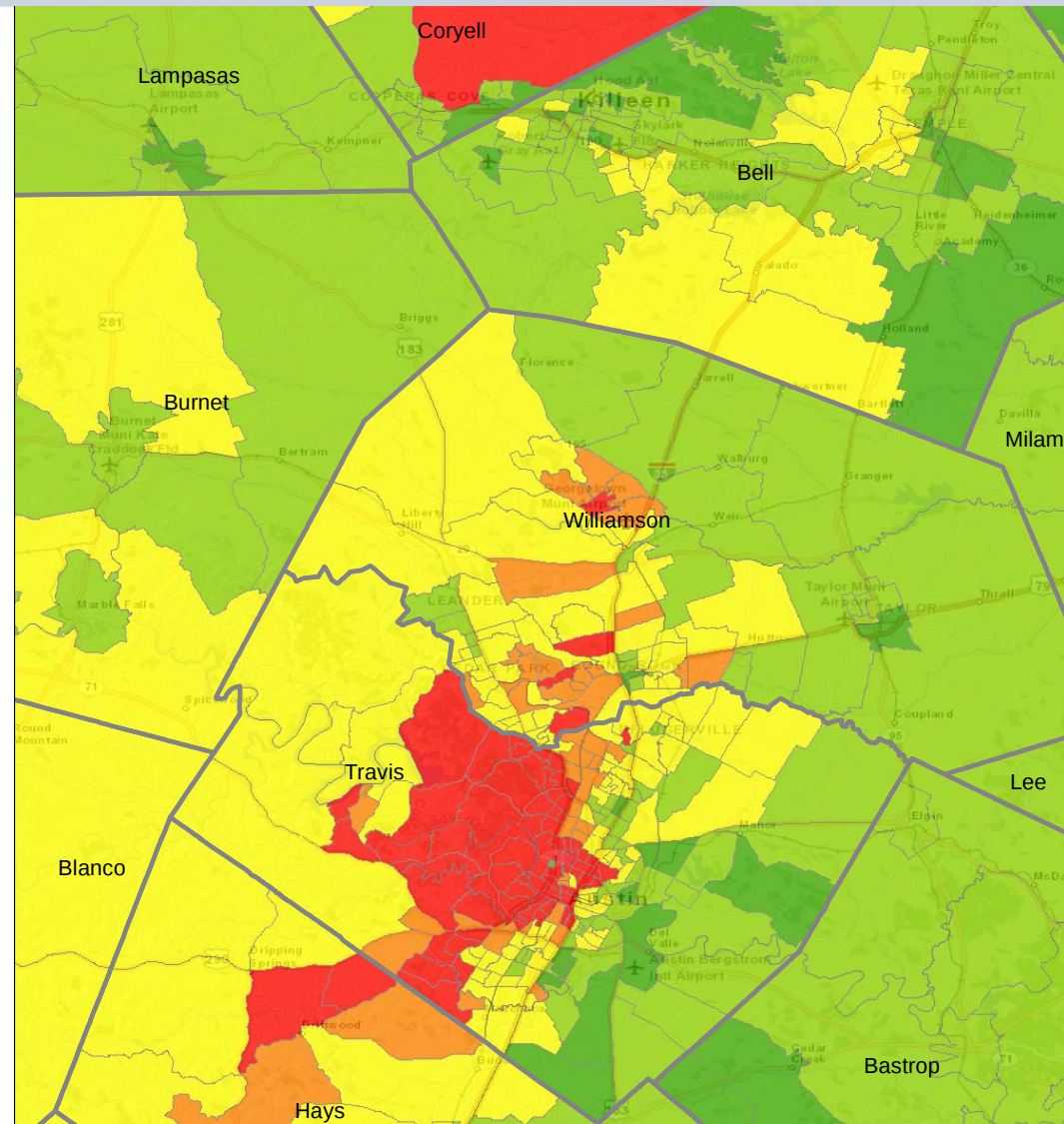
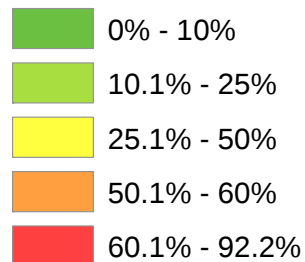
Percent of population 25 years and older without a high school degree, Census Tracts, Austin Area, Texas 2009-2013

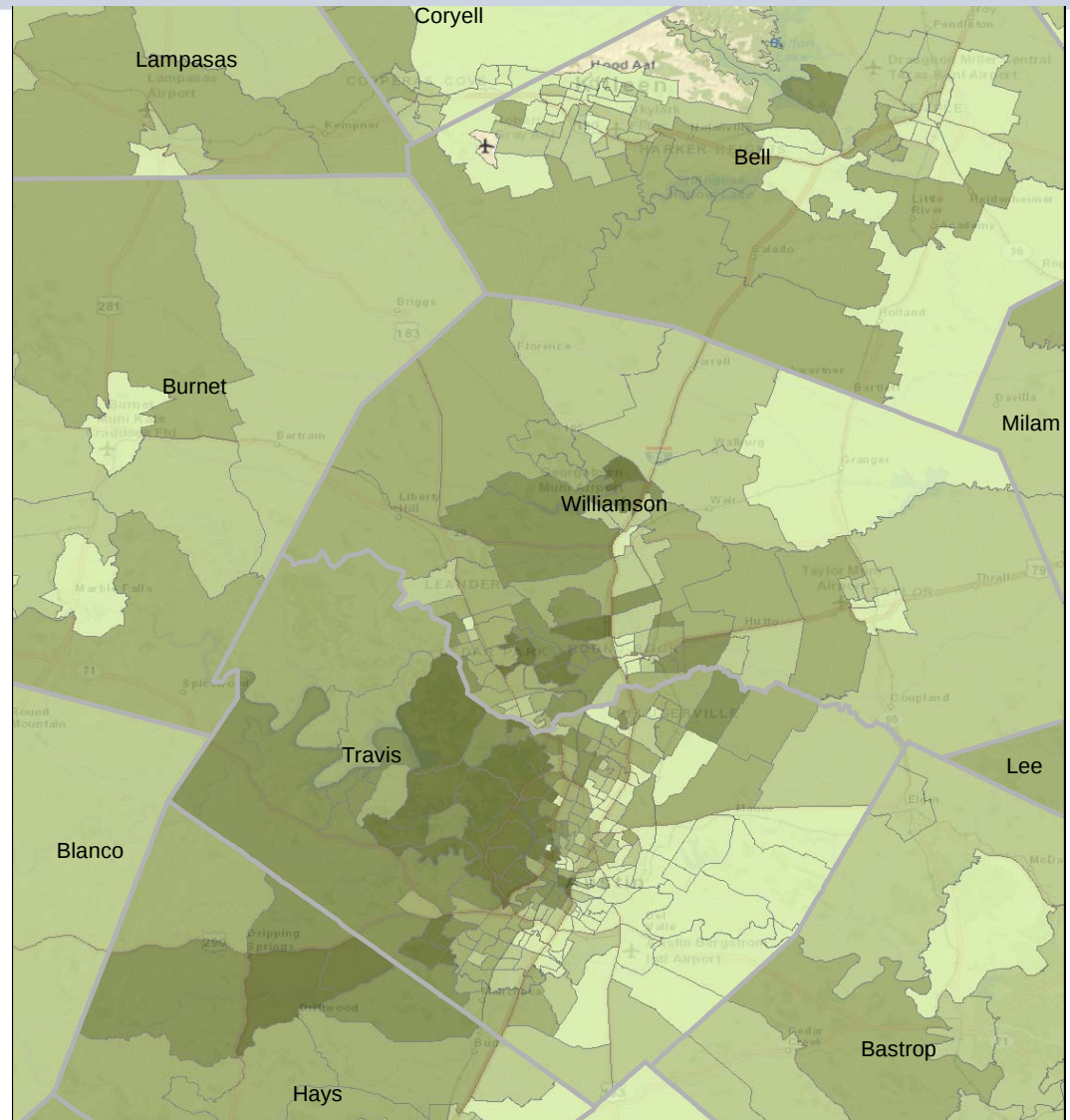
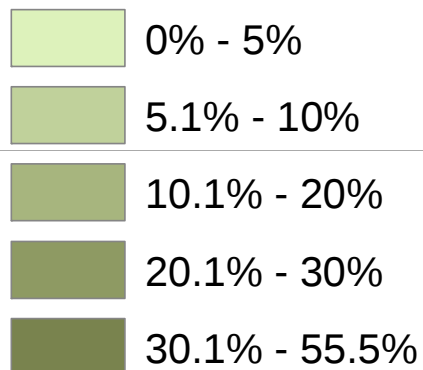
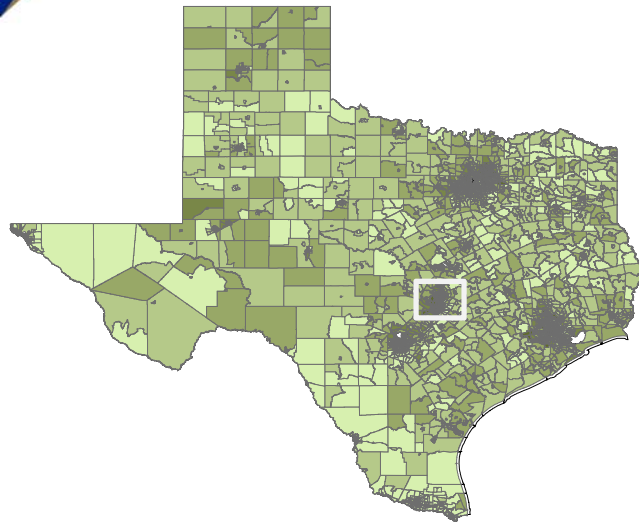


Percent of Persons Aged 25 Years and Older with Bachelor's Degree or Higher, census tracts, Austin Area, Texas 2009-2013

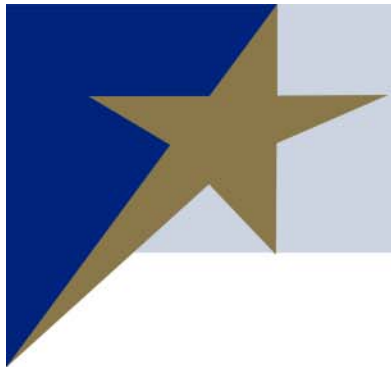

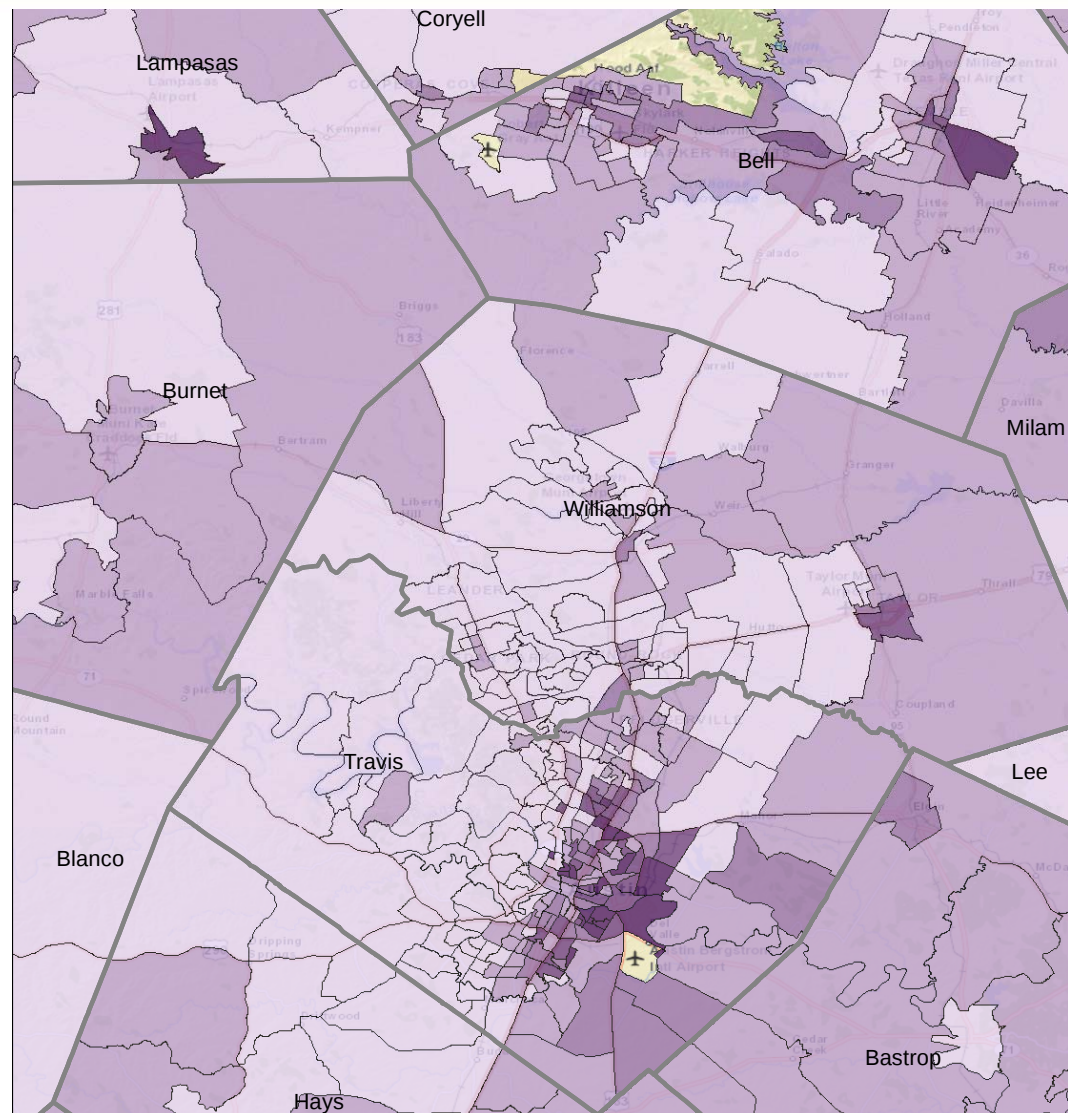
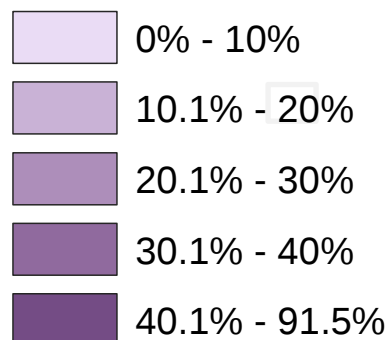
Percent of population earning \$75,000 per year or more, Census Tracts, Austin Area, Texas, 2009-2013



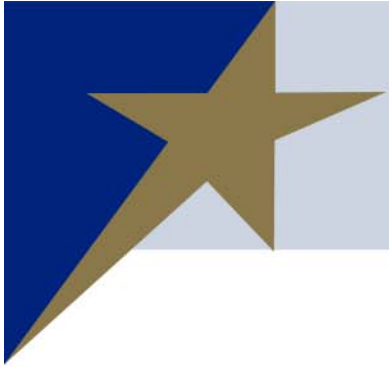

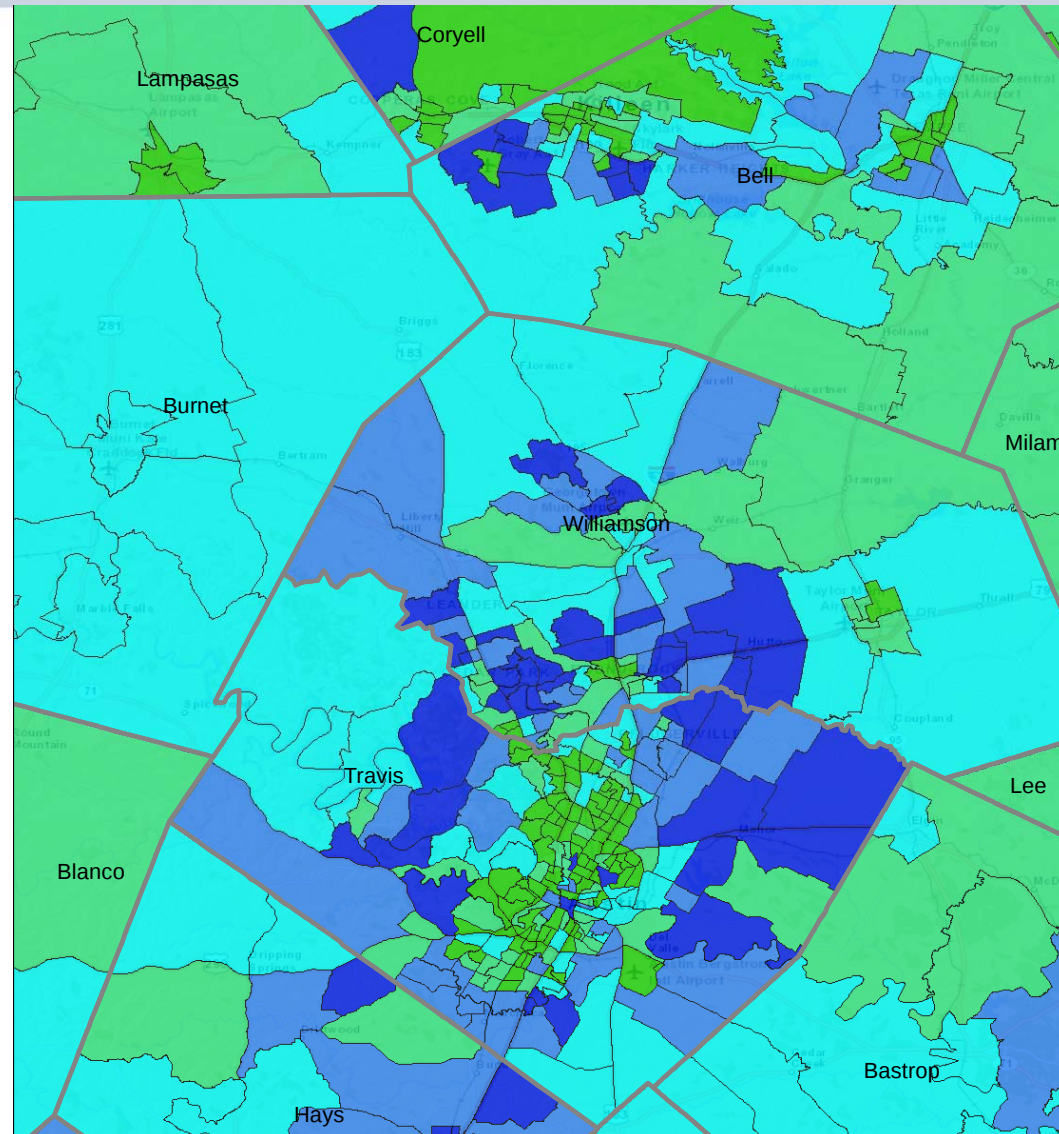
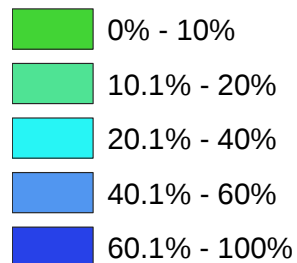
Percent of population living below poverty, Census Tracts, Austin Area, Texas, 2009-2013



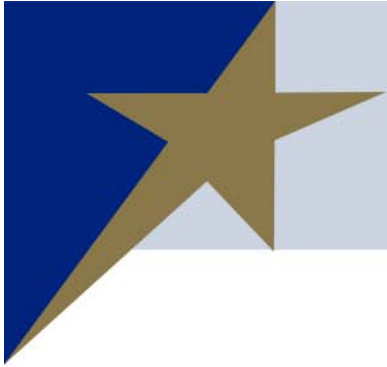

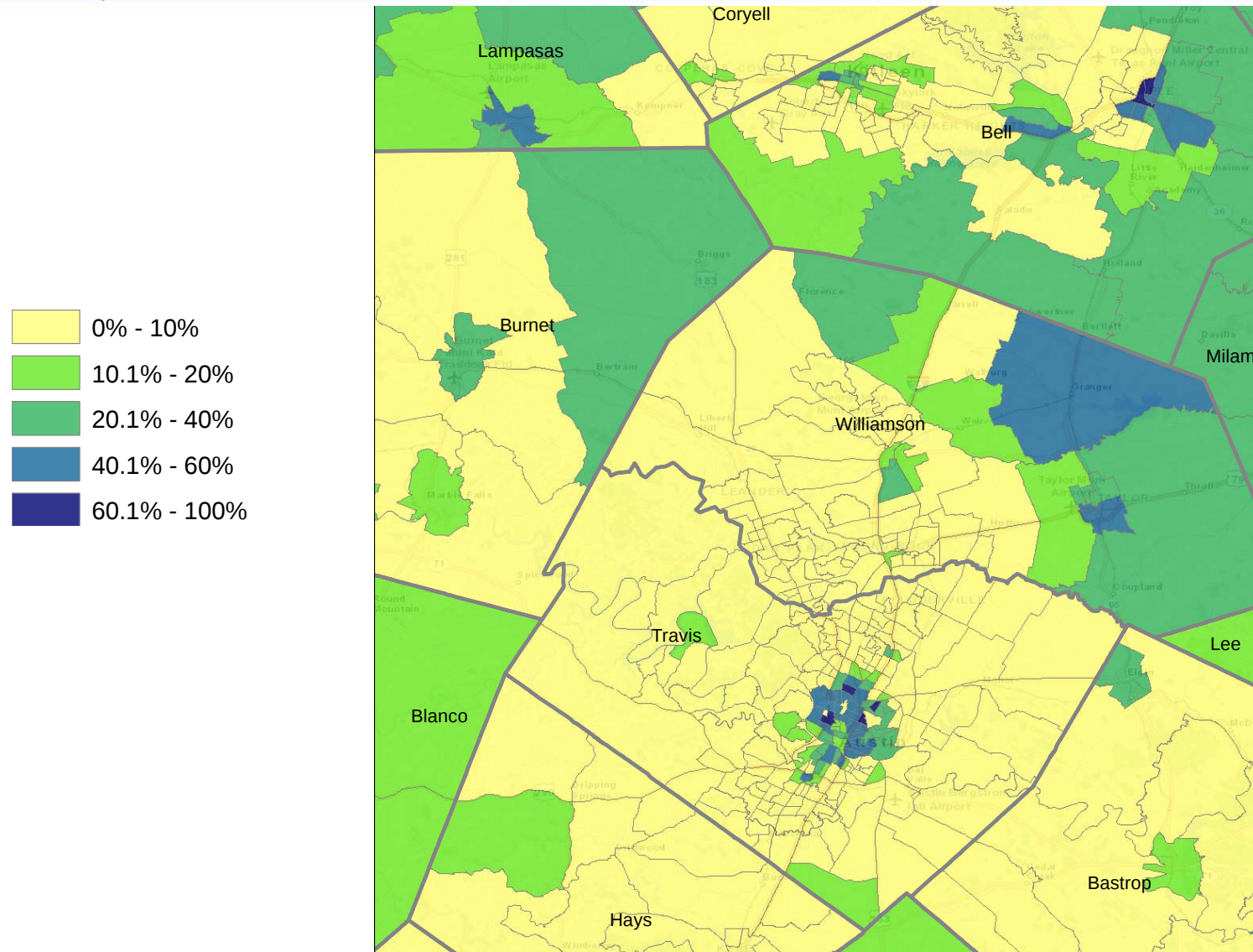
Percent of Housing Units Build After 1999, Census Tracts, Austin Area, Texas, 2009-2013

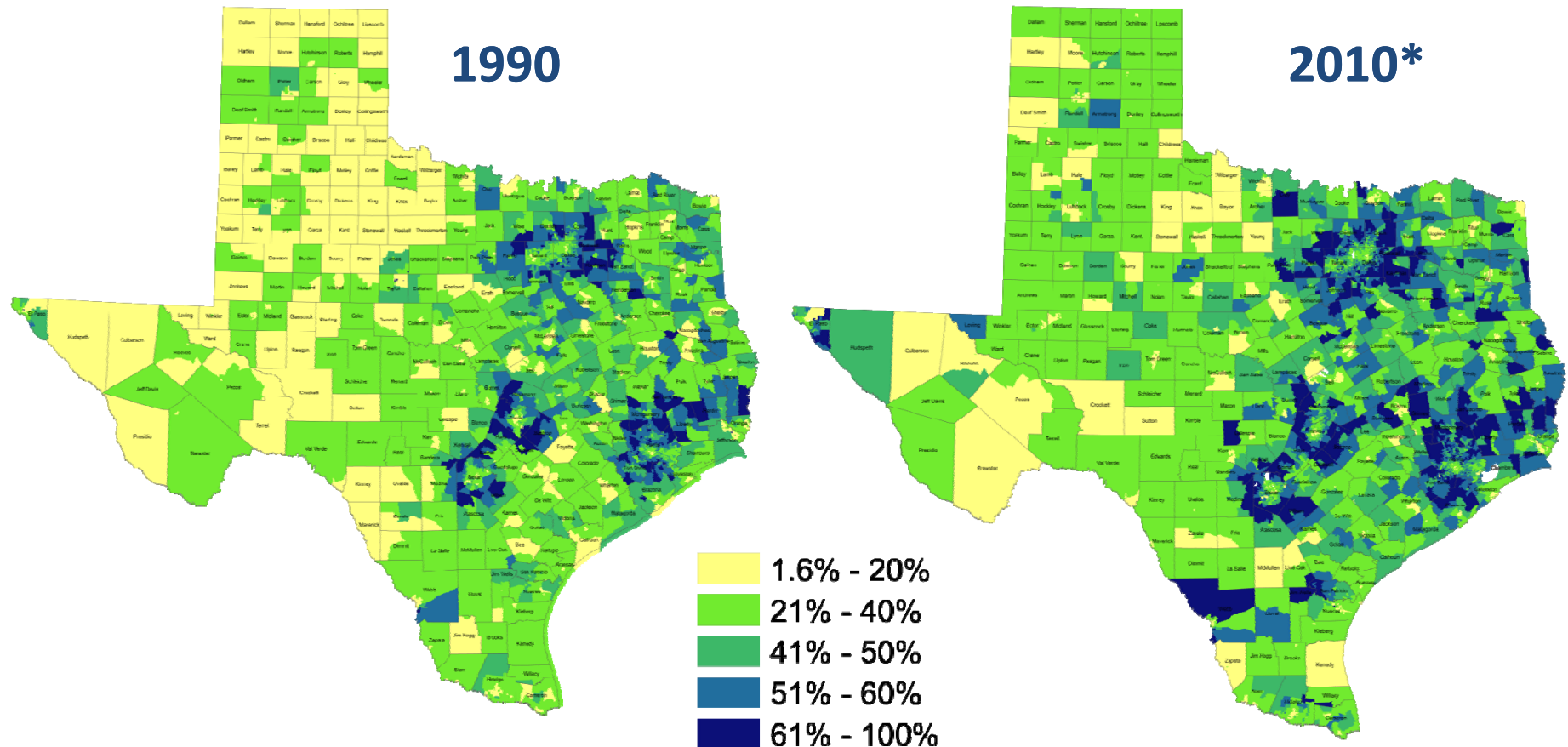


Percent of Housing Units Build Before 1960, Census Tracts, San Antonio, Texas, 2009-2013

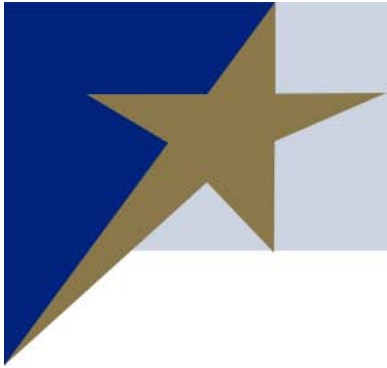

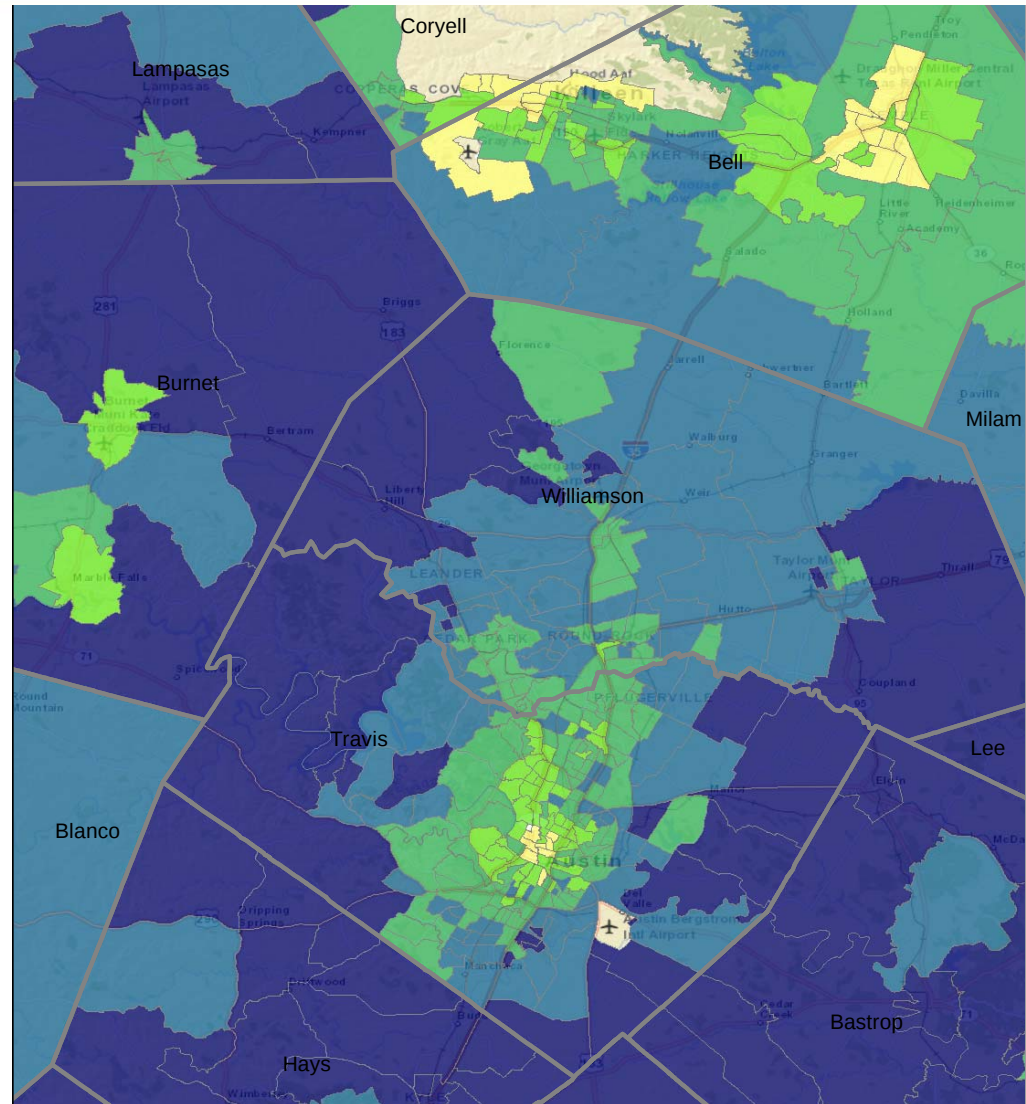
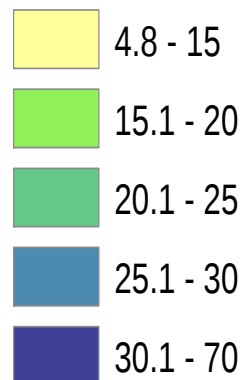
Percentage of Population with Drive Times Longer than 25 Minutes, Texas Census Tracts, 1990 and 2010*

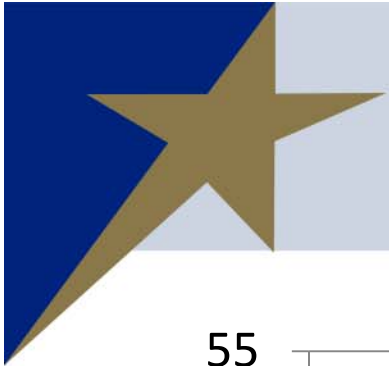

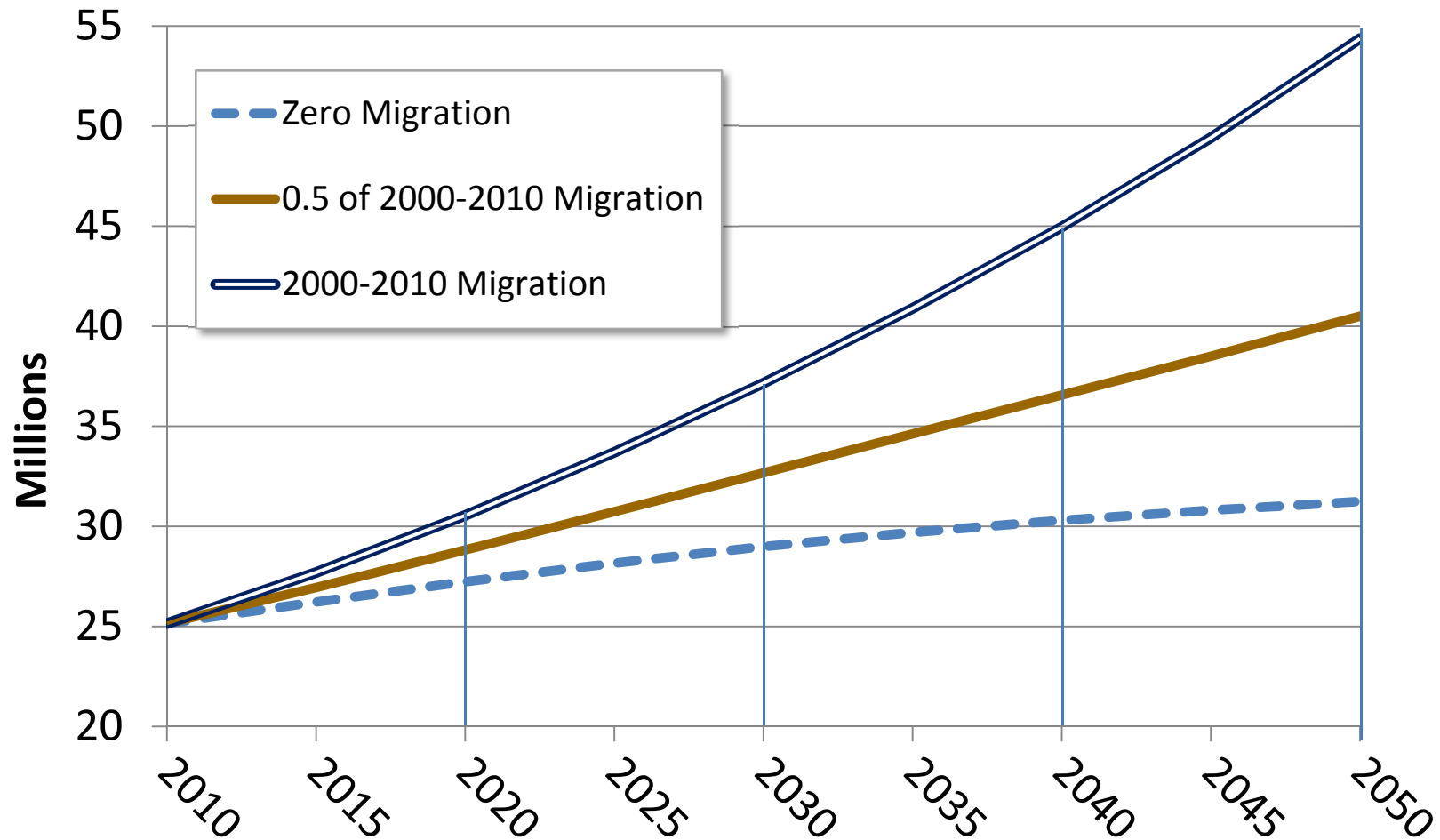


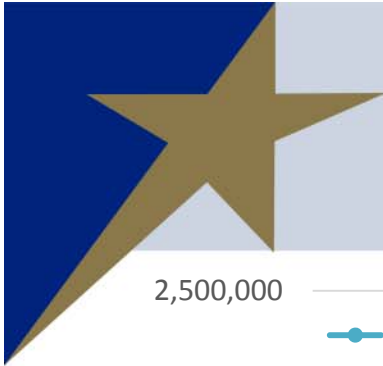
Mean travel time to work (minutes), census tracts, Austin Area, Texas, 2009-2013



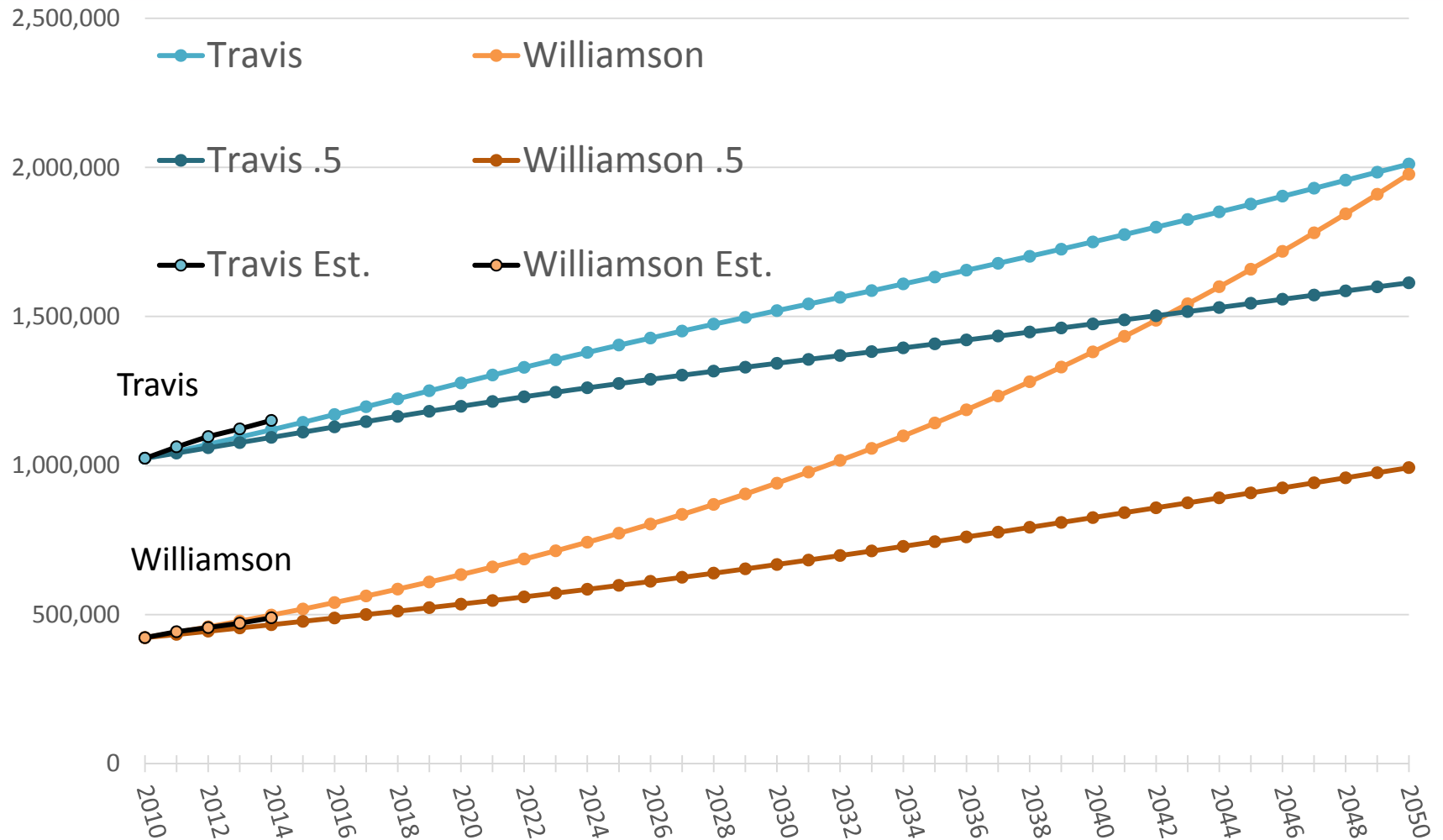


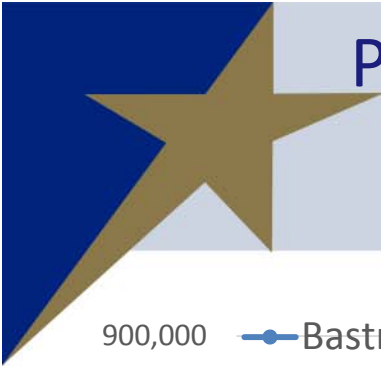
Projected Population Growth in Texas, 2010-2050



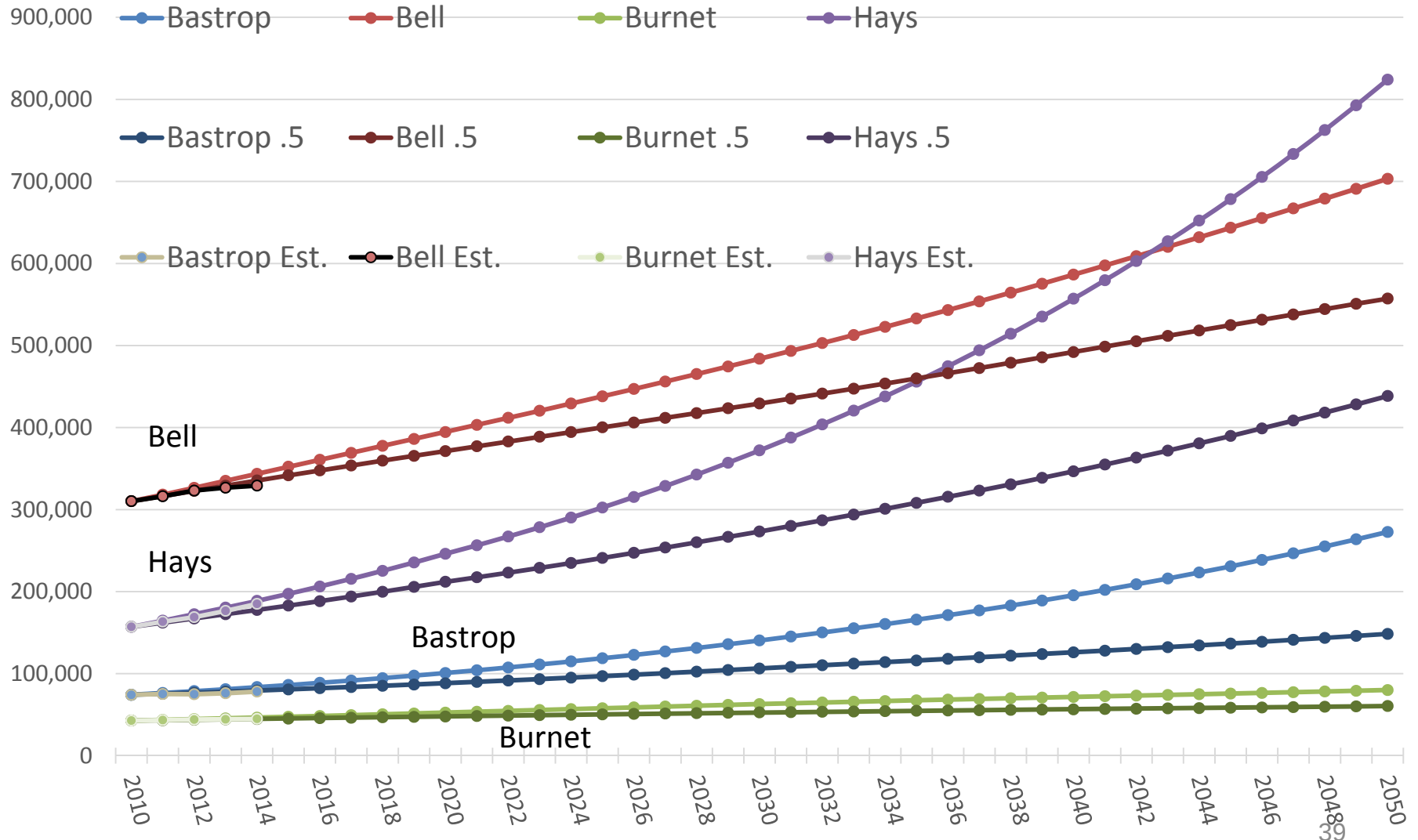


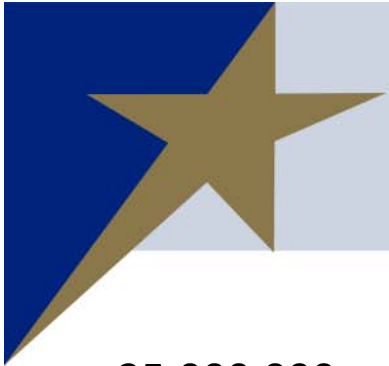
Population Estimates and Projections, Travis and Williamson Counties, Texas, 2010-2050



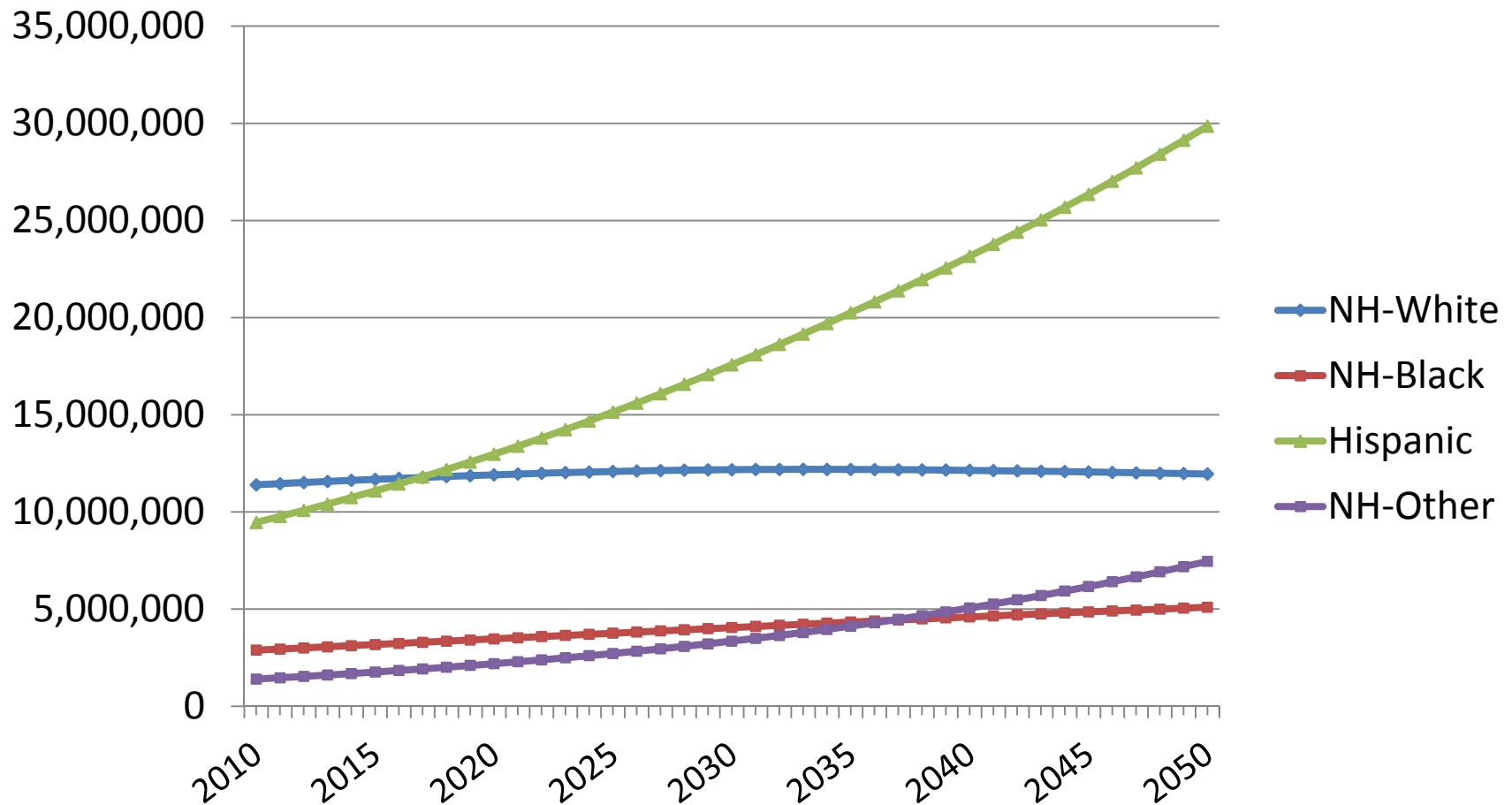


Population Estimates and Projections, Bastrop, Bell, Burnet, and Hays Counties, Texas, 2010-2050

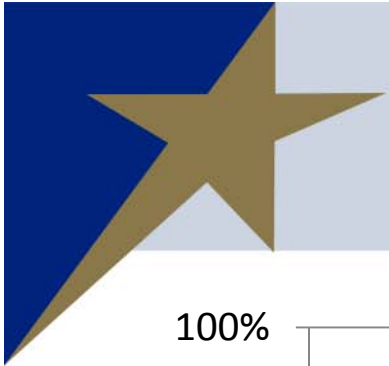




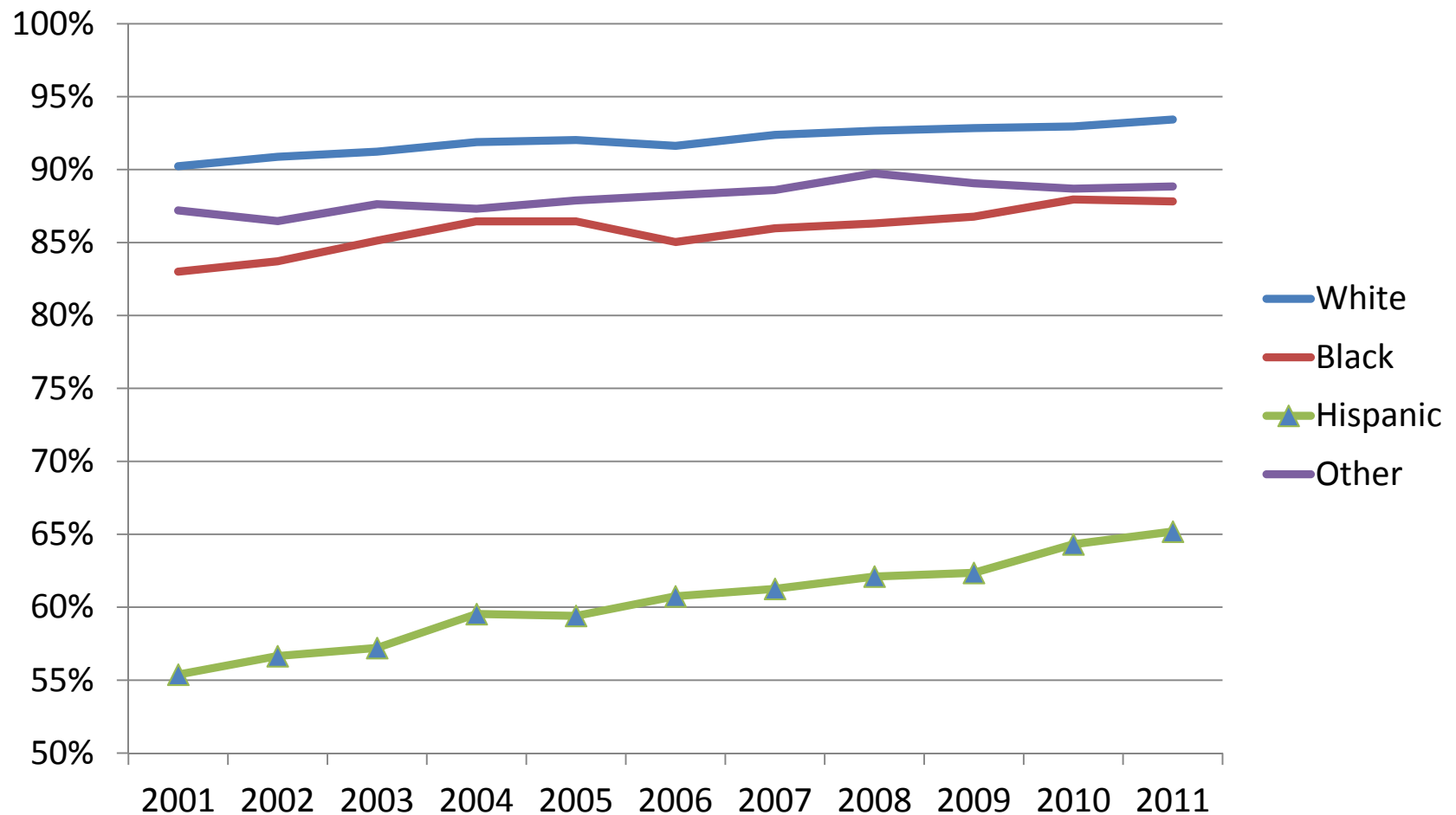
Projected Racial and Ethnic Percent, Texas, 2010-2050



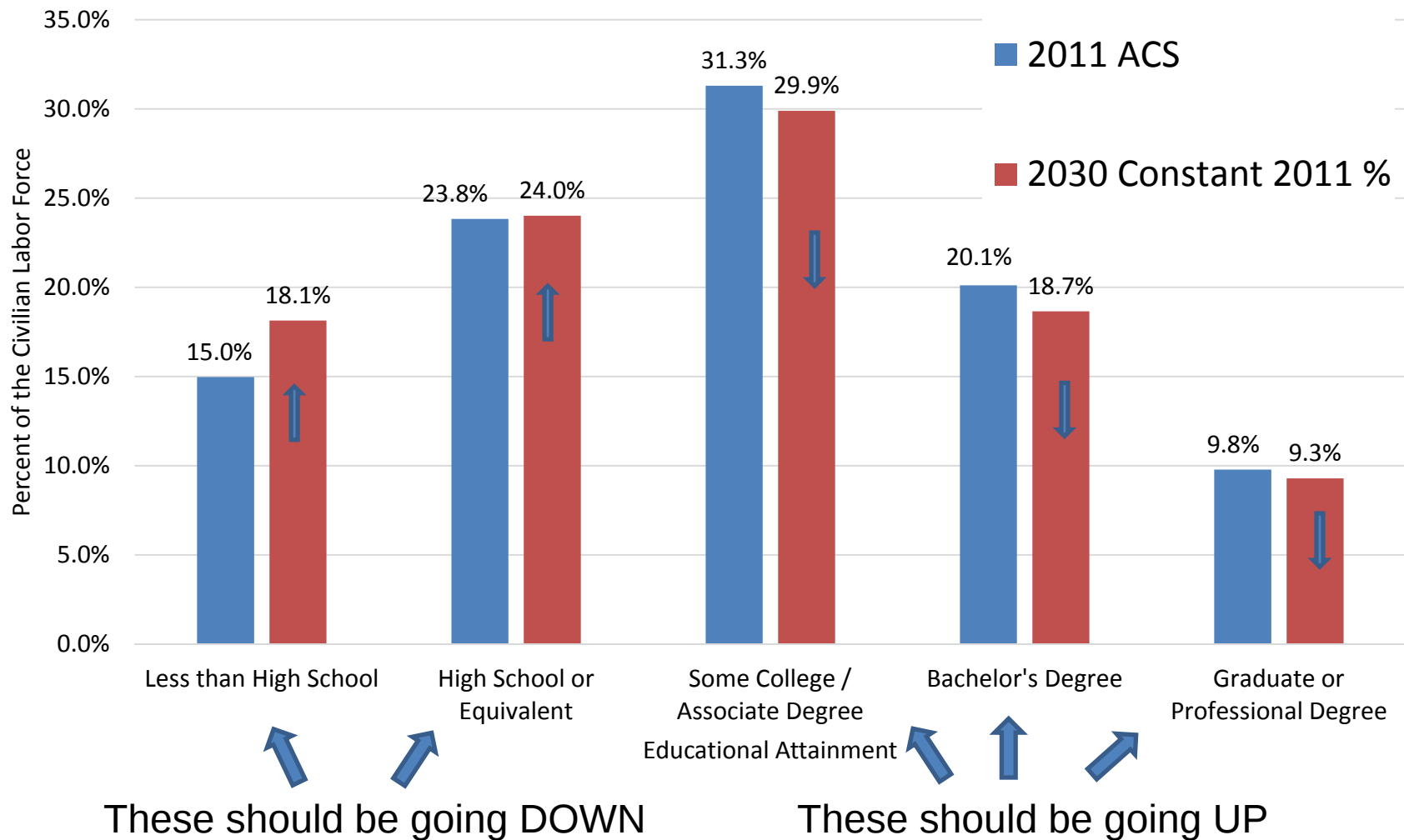

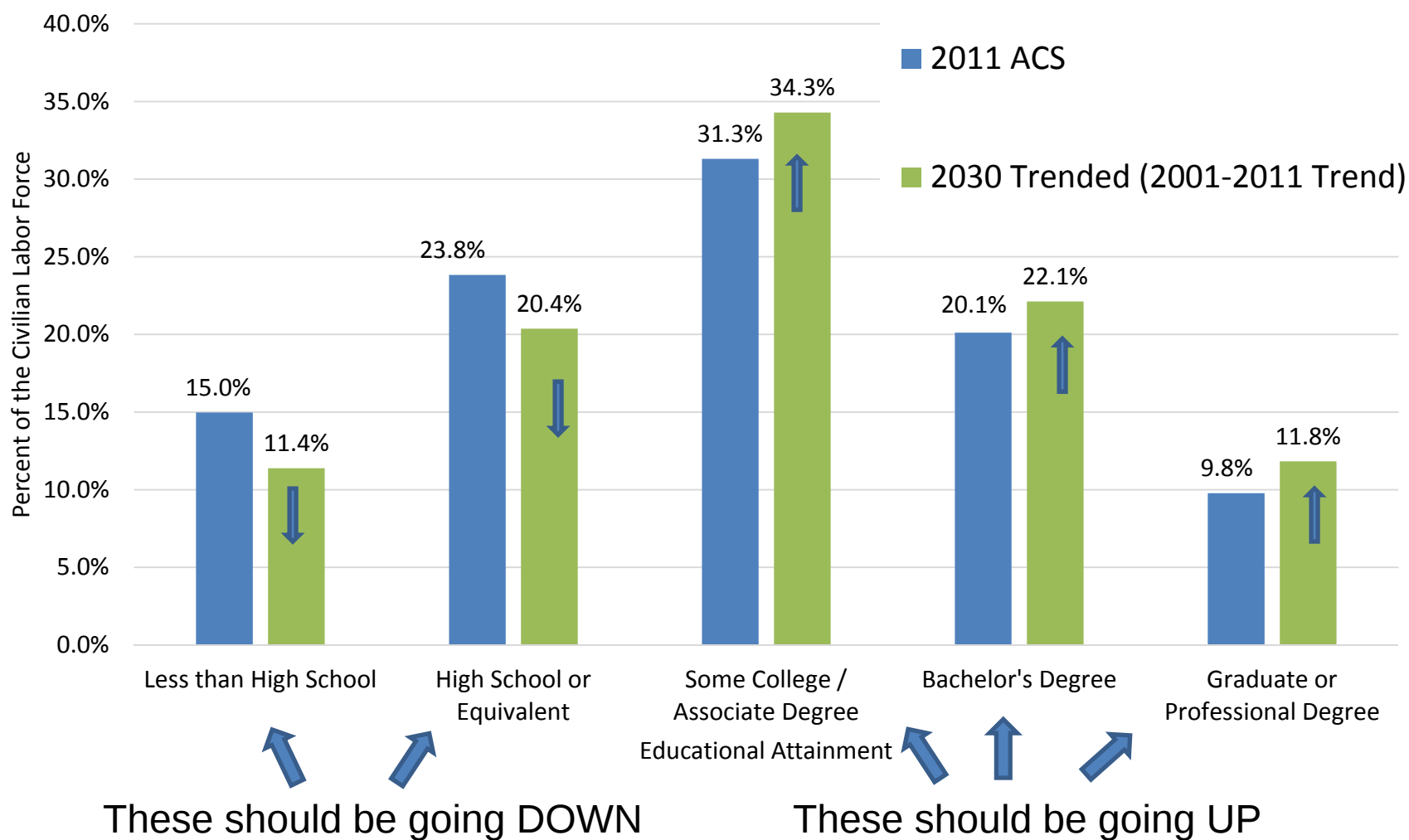
Trends in Educational Attainment of Persons in the Labor Force (25-64 Years of Age) in Texas by Race/Ethnicity – High School Graduates and Above
