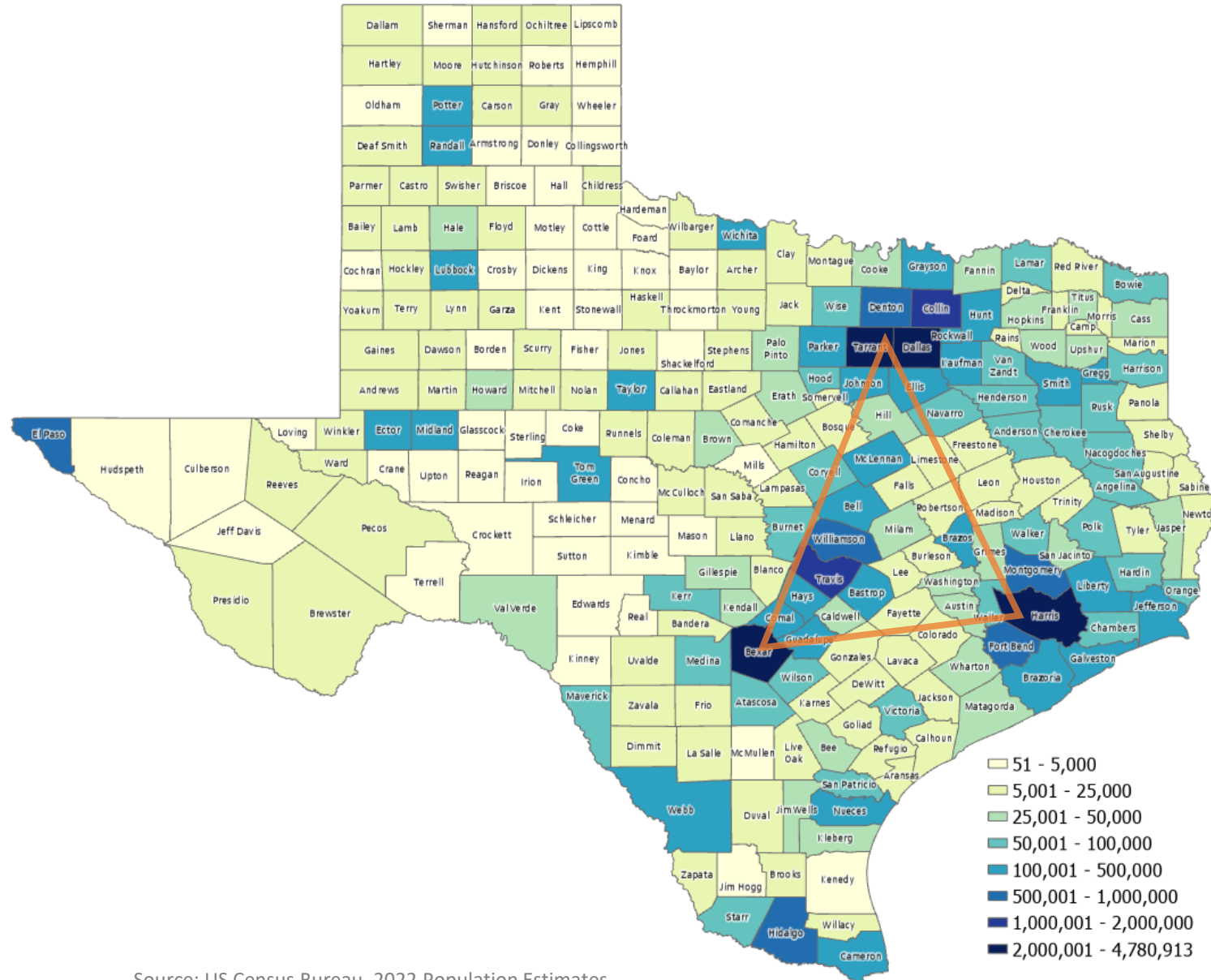

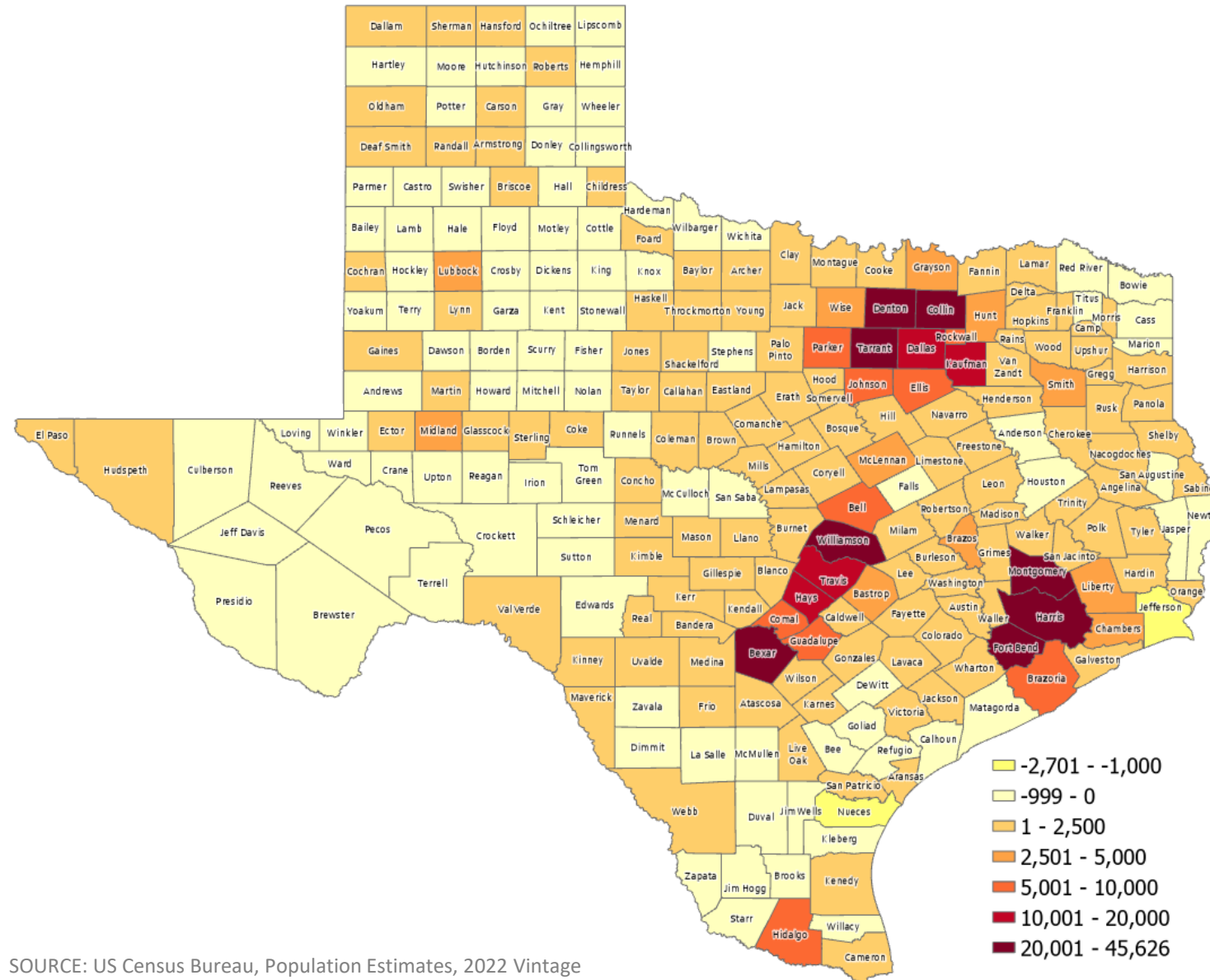
New Texans per day

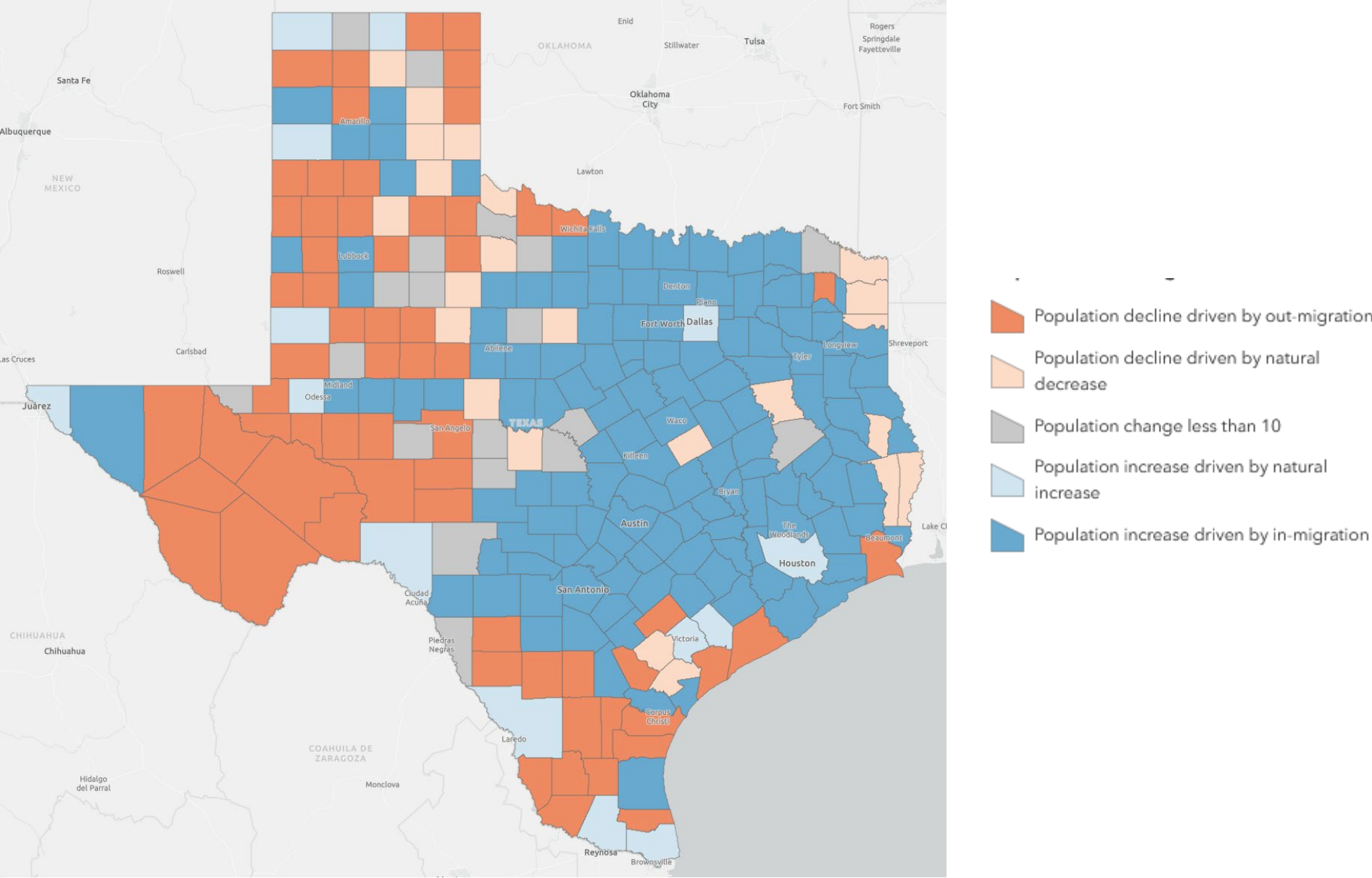
Estimated Numeric Change, Texas Counties, 2021-2022

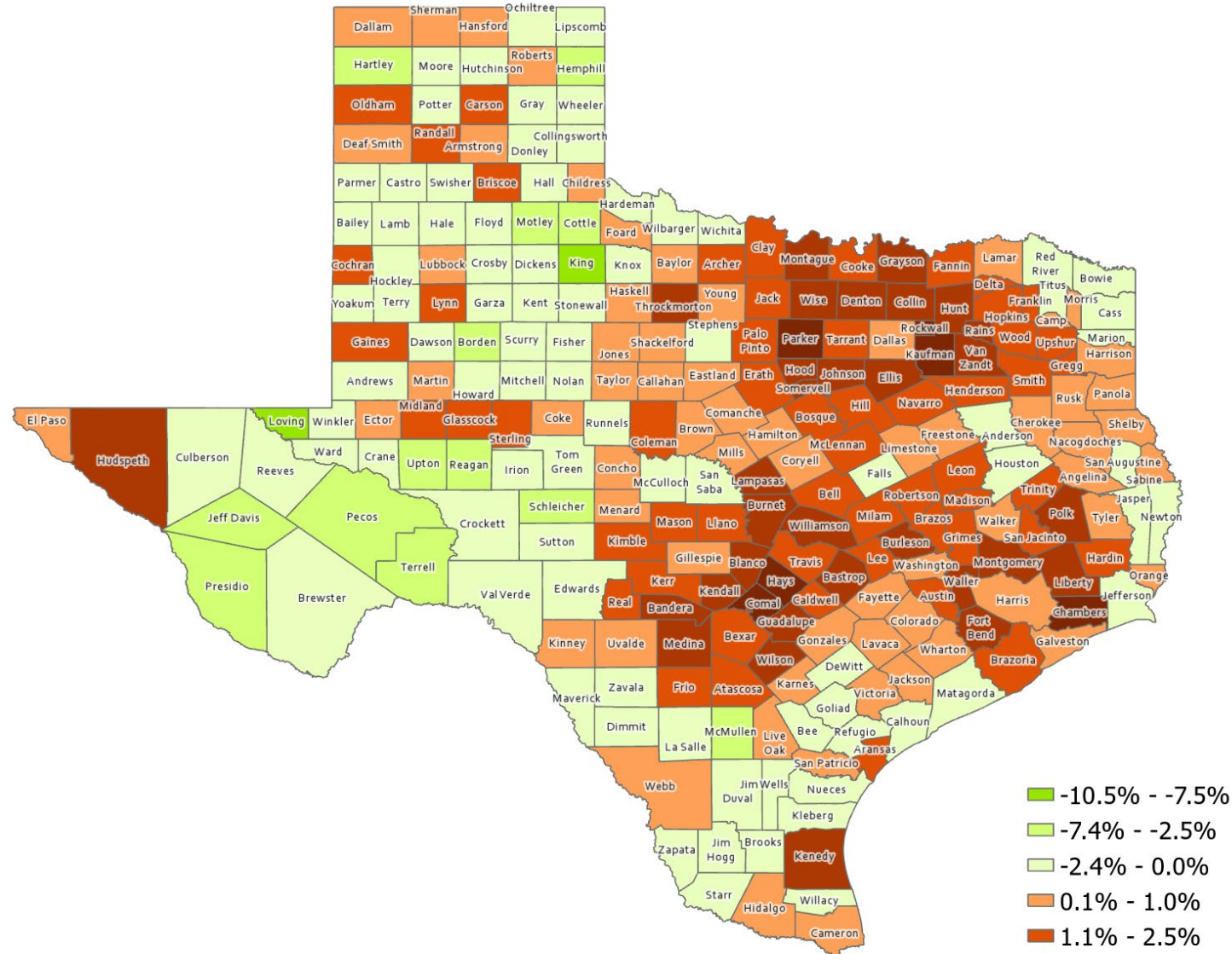

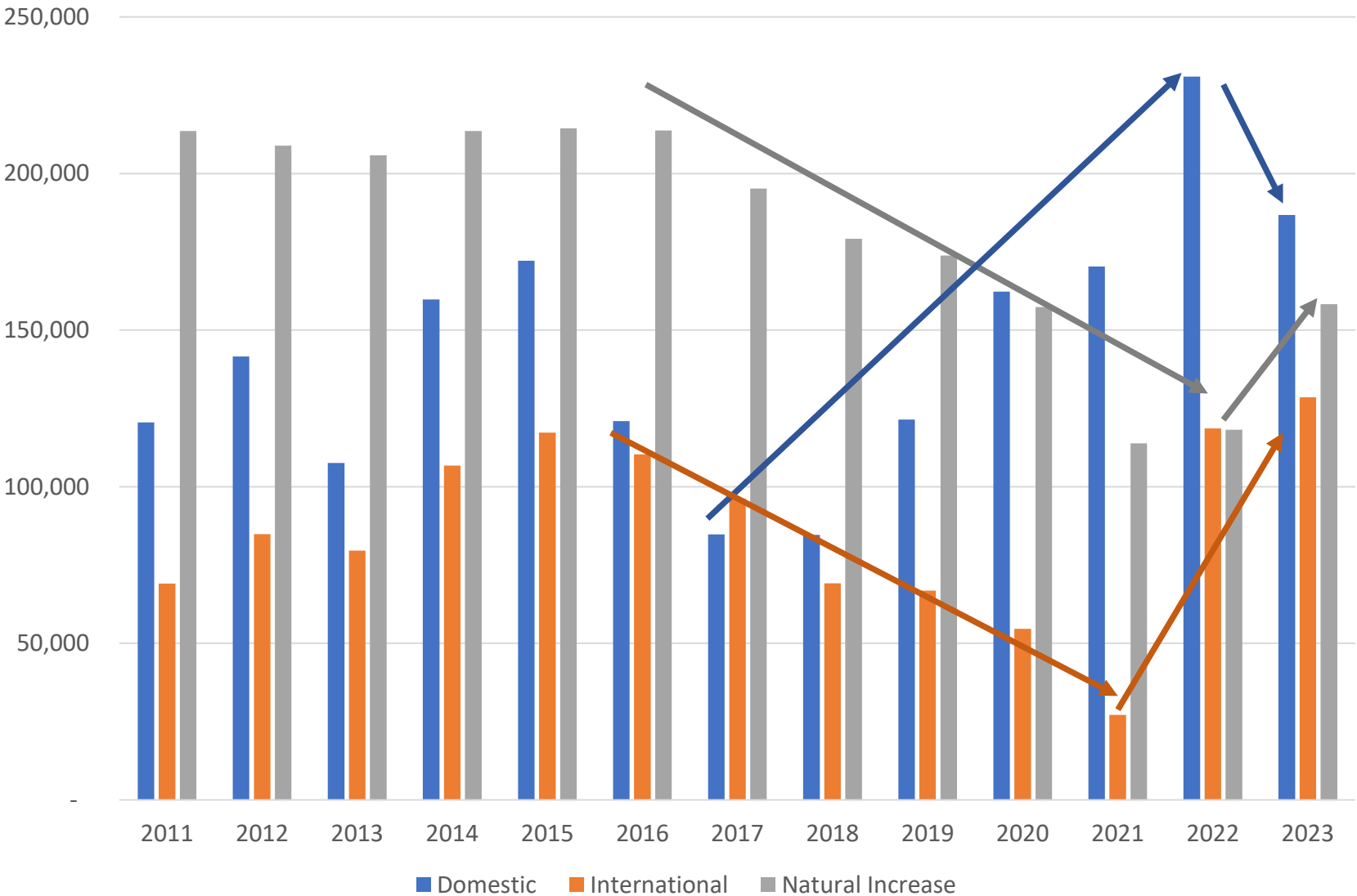

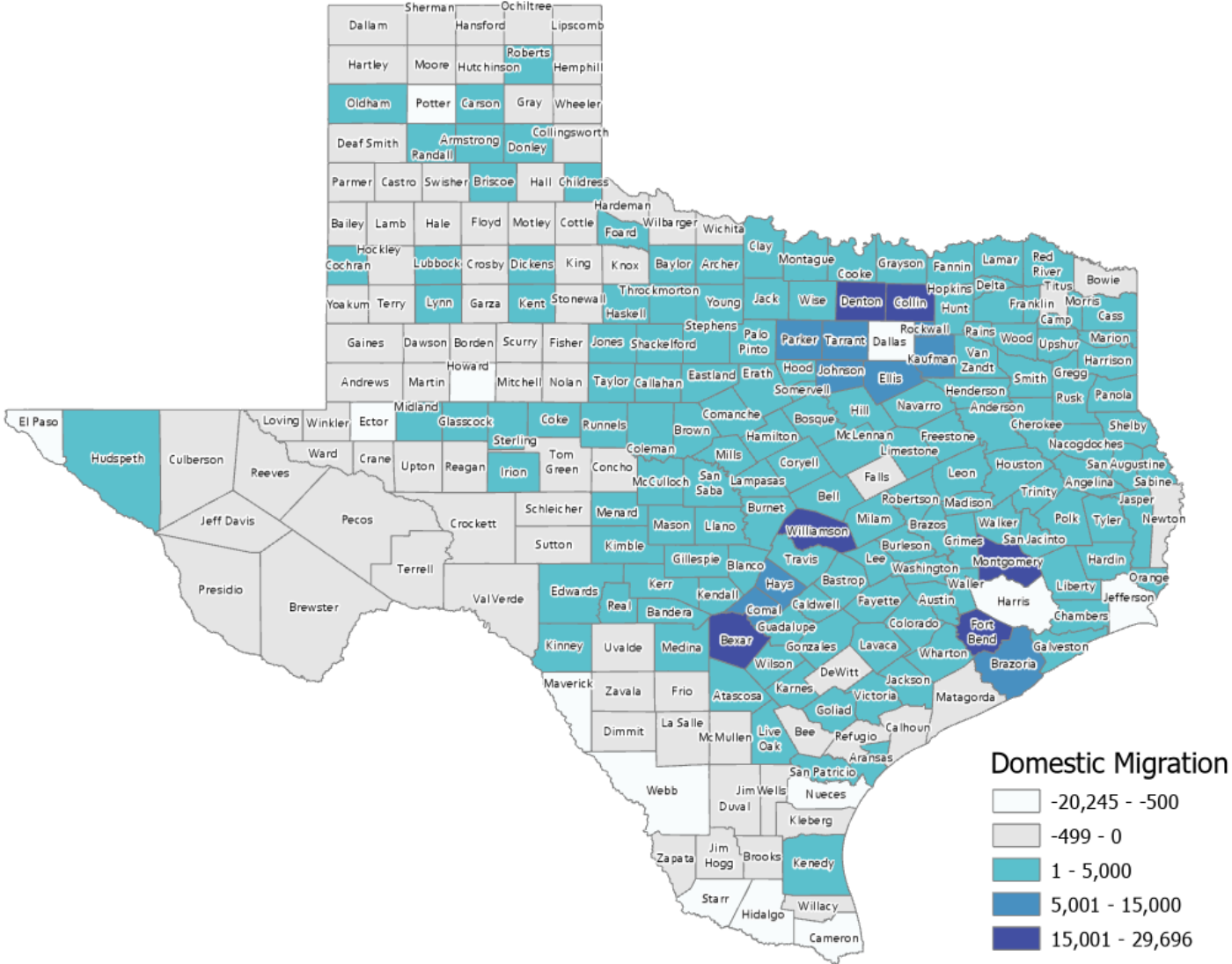


Estimated Domestic and International Migration for Texas, 2011-2023

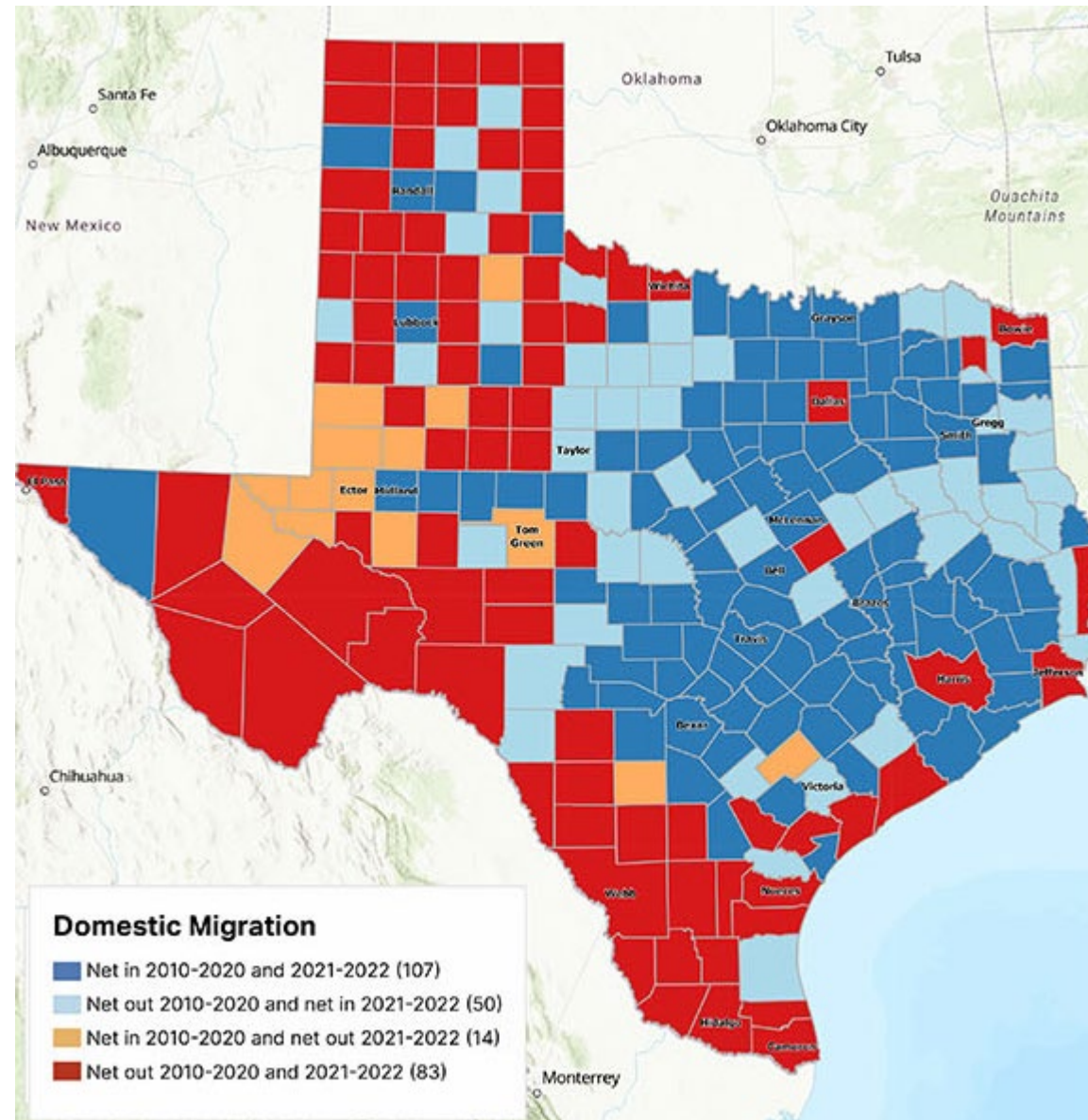

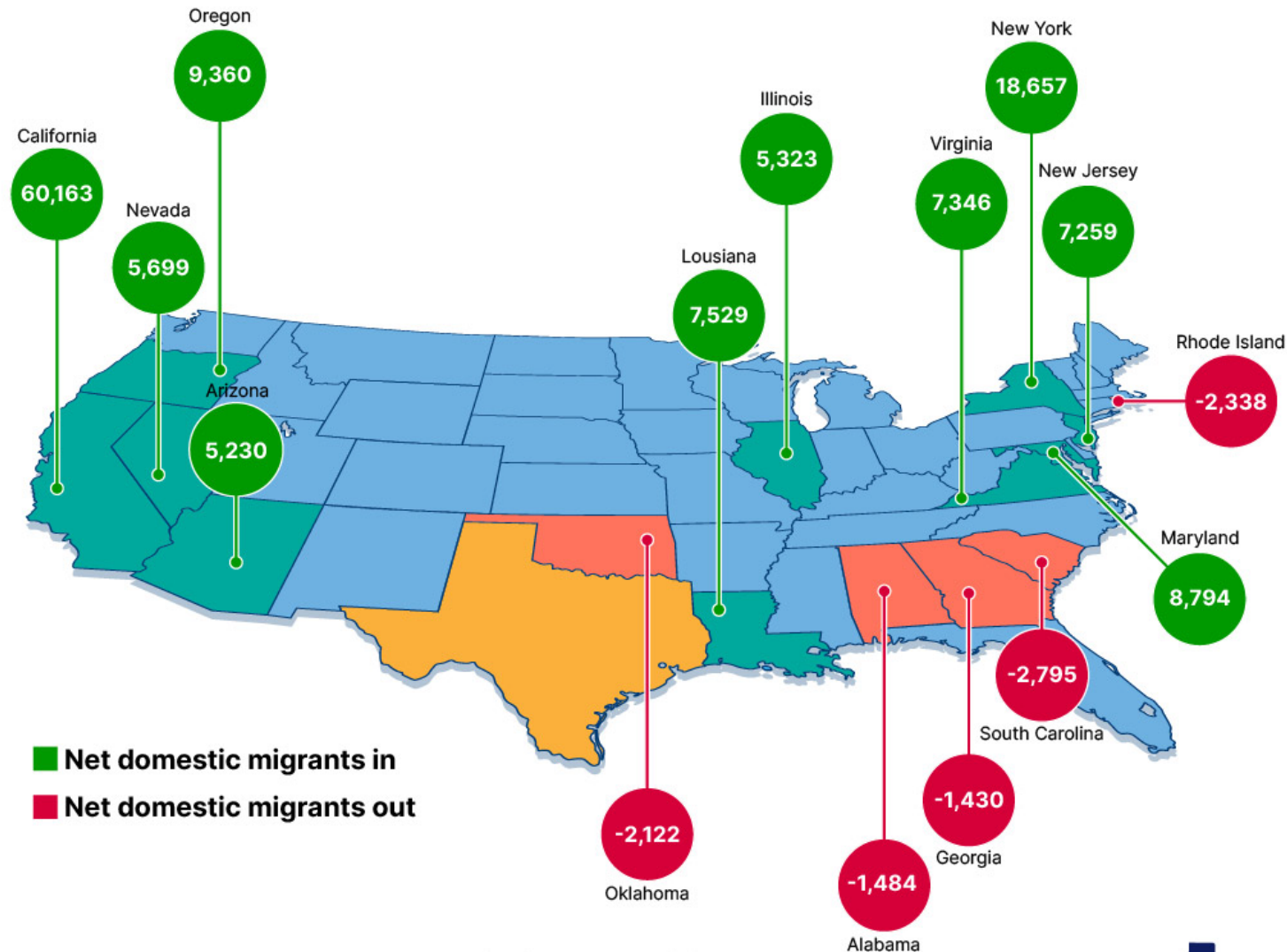
Estimated Population Change Attributed to Domestic Migration, Texas Counties, 2021-2022

Texas State-to-State Net Domestic Migration, 2022



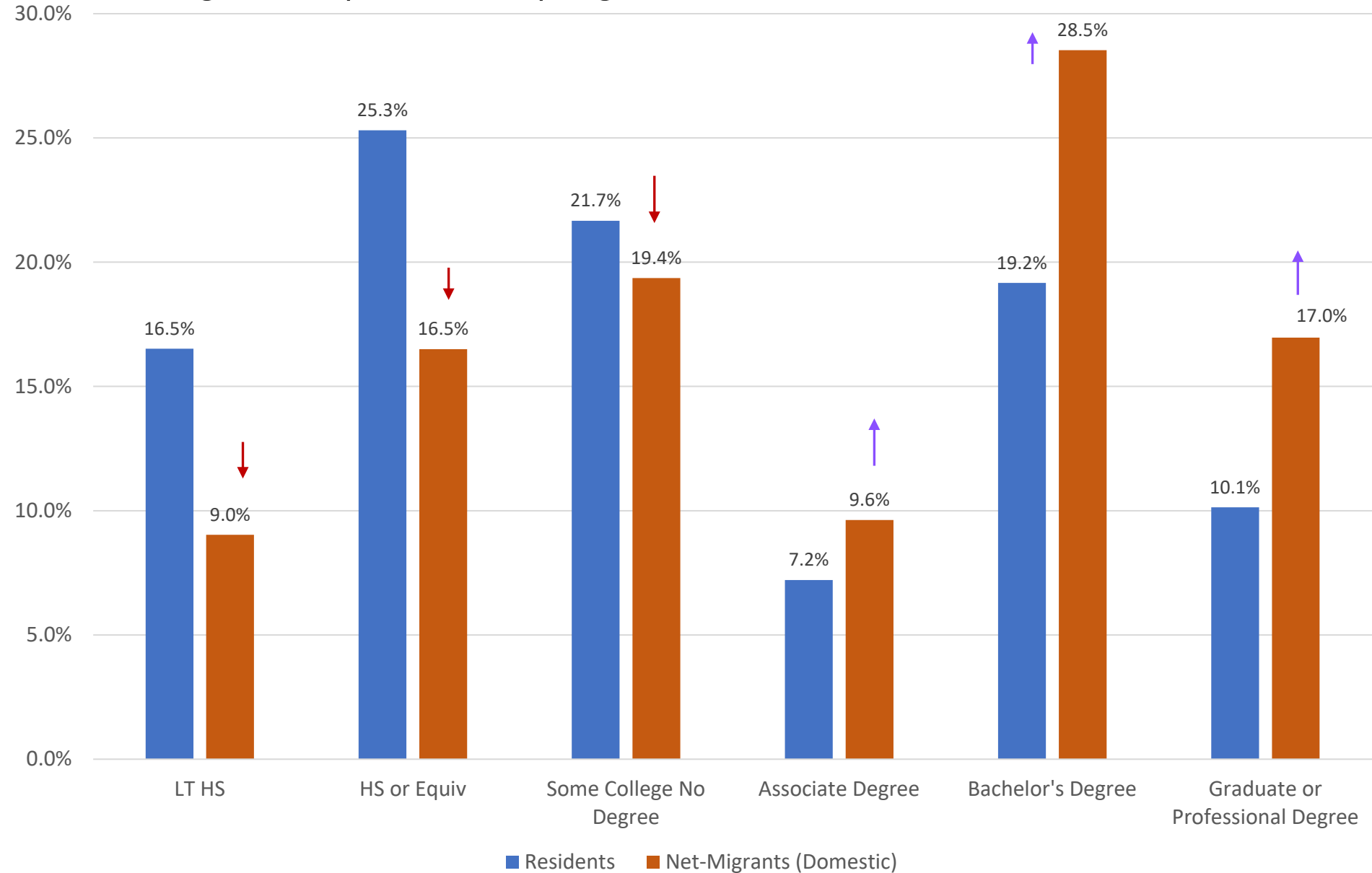

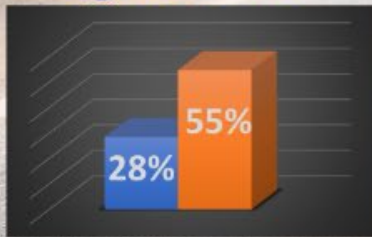

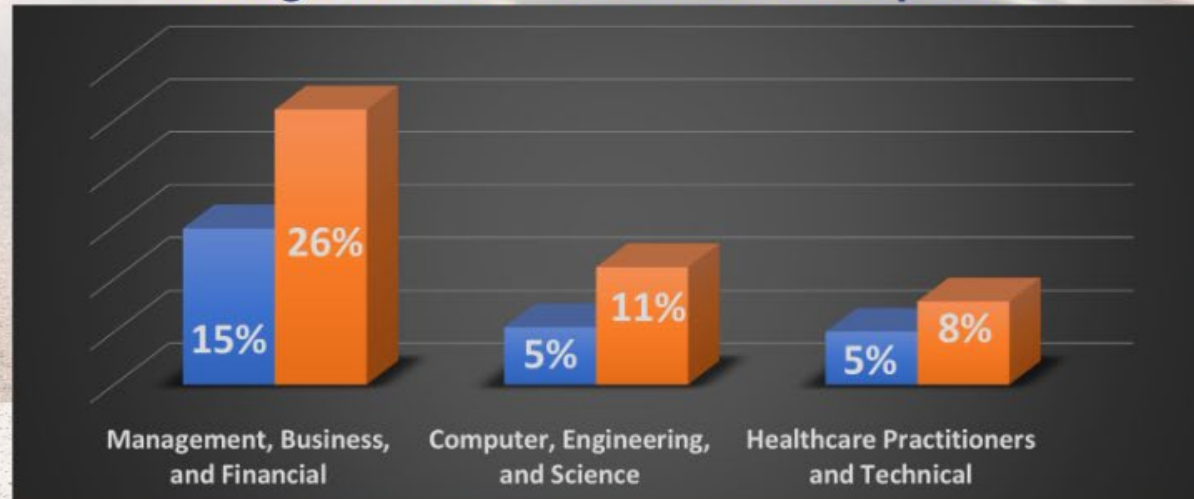

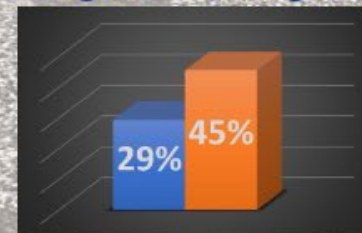

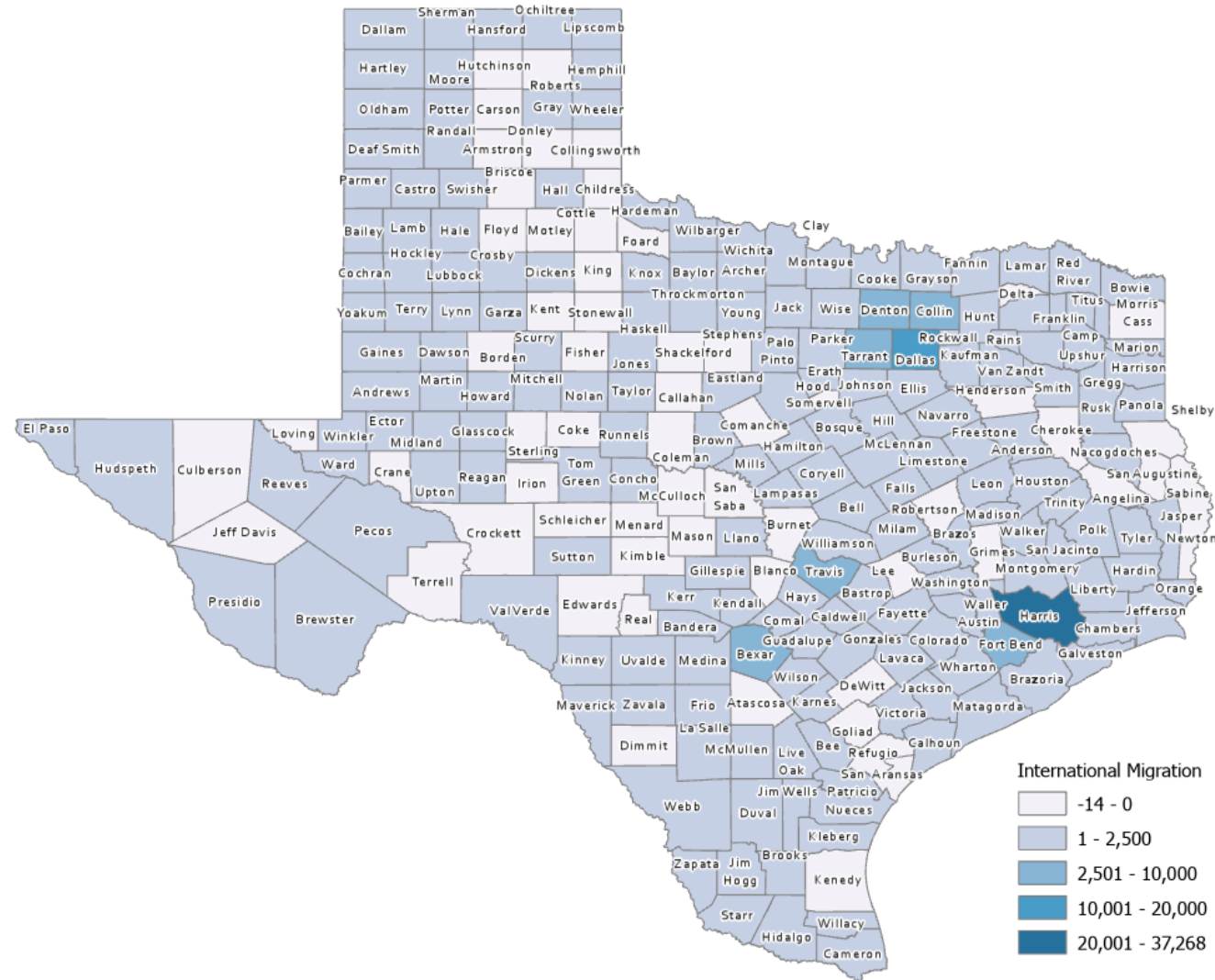

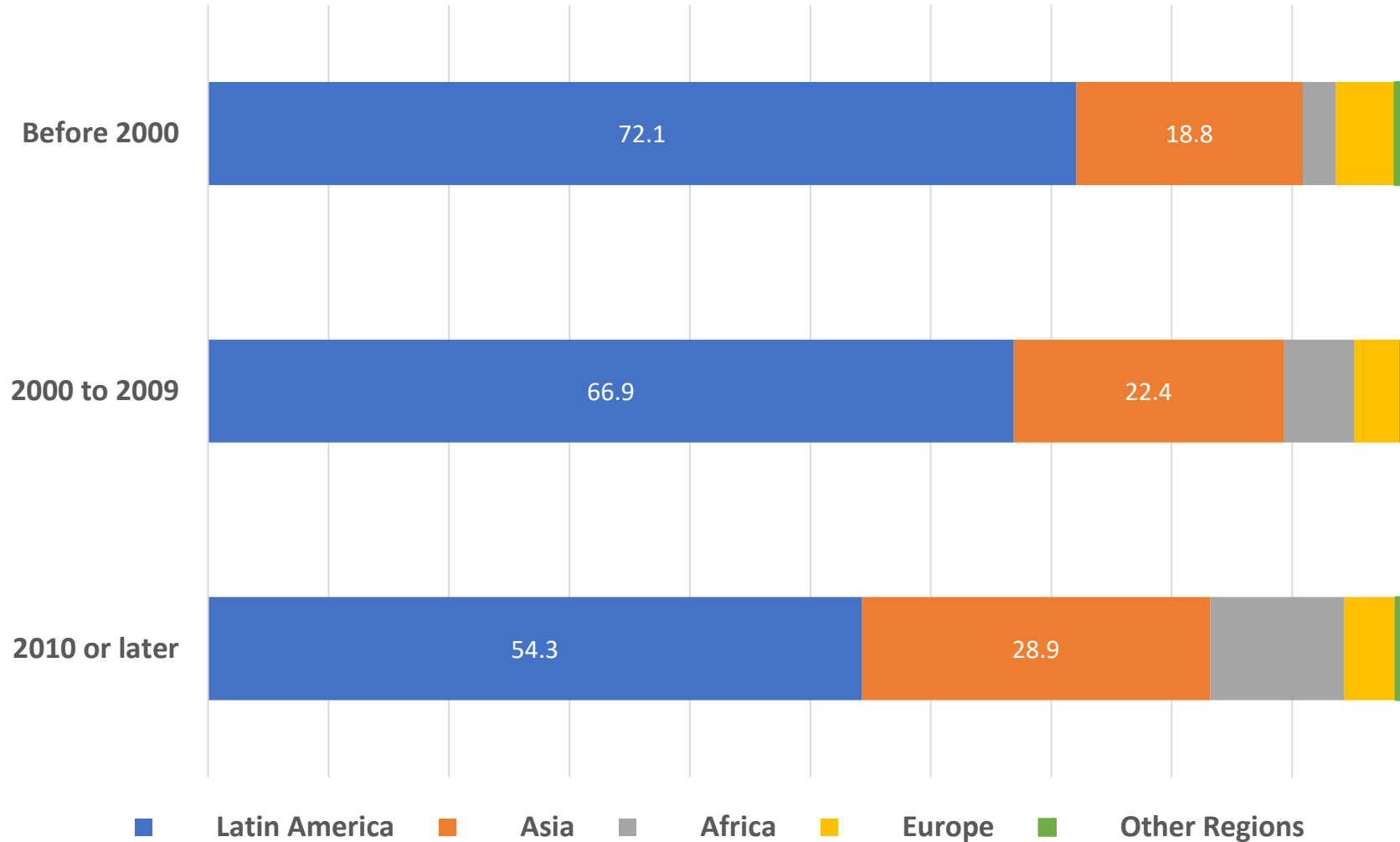

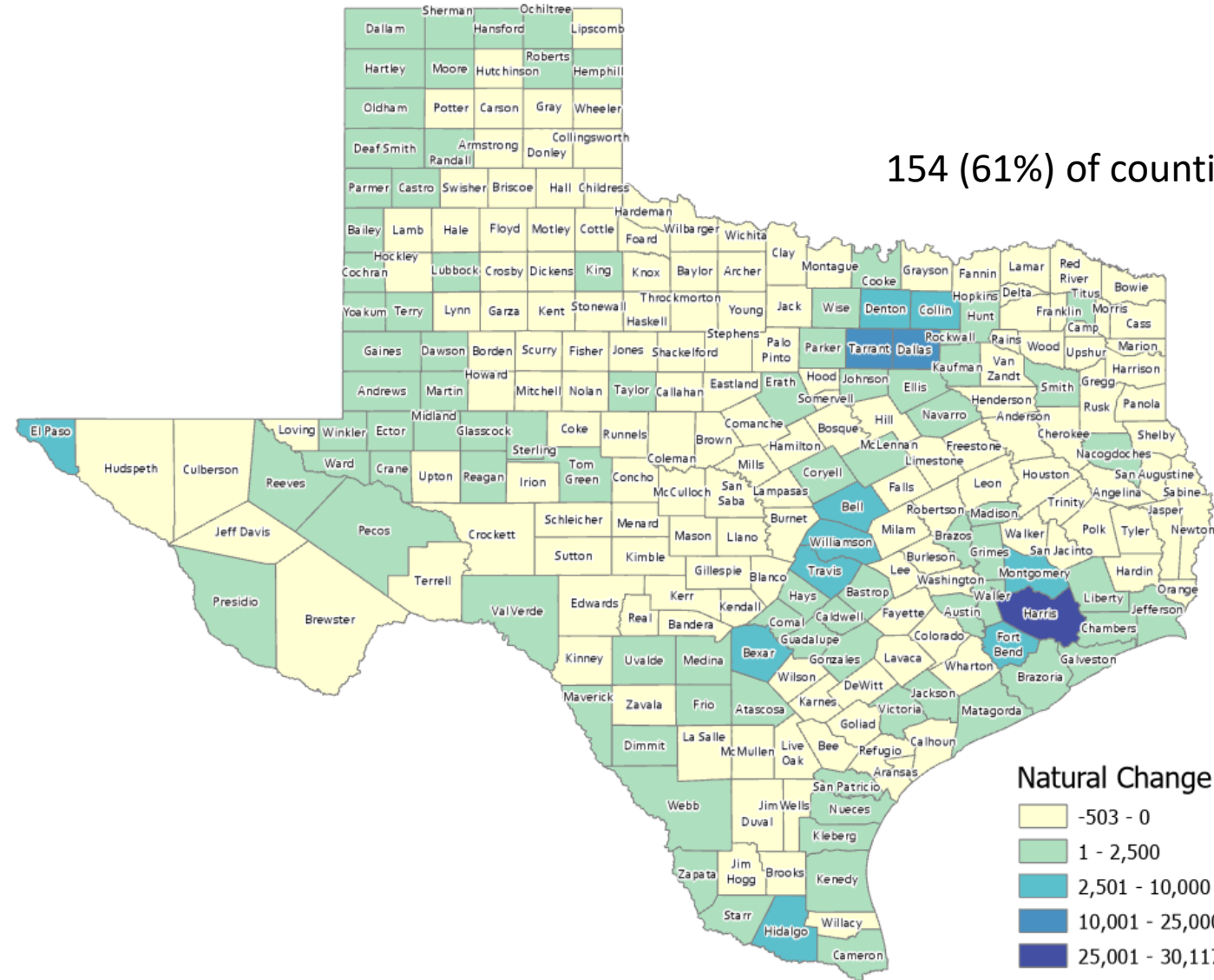




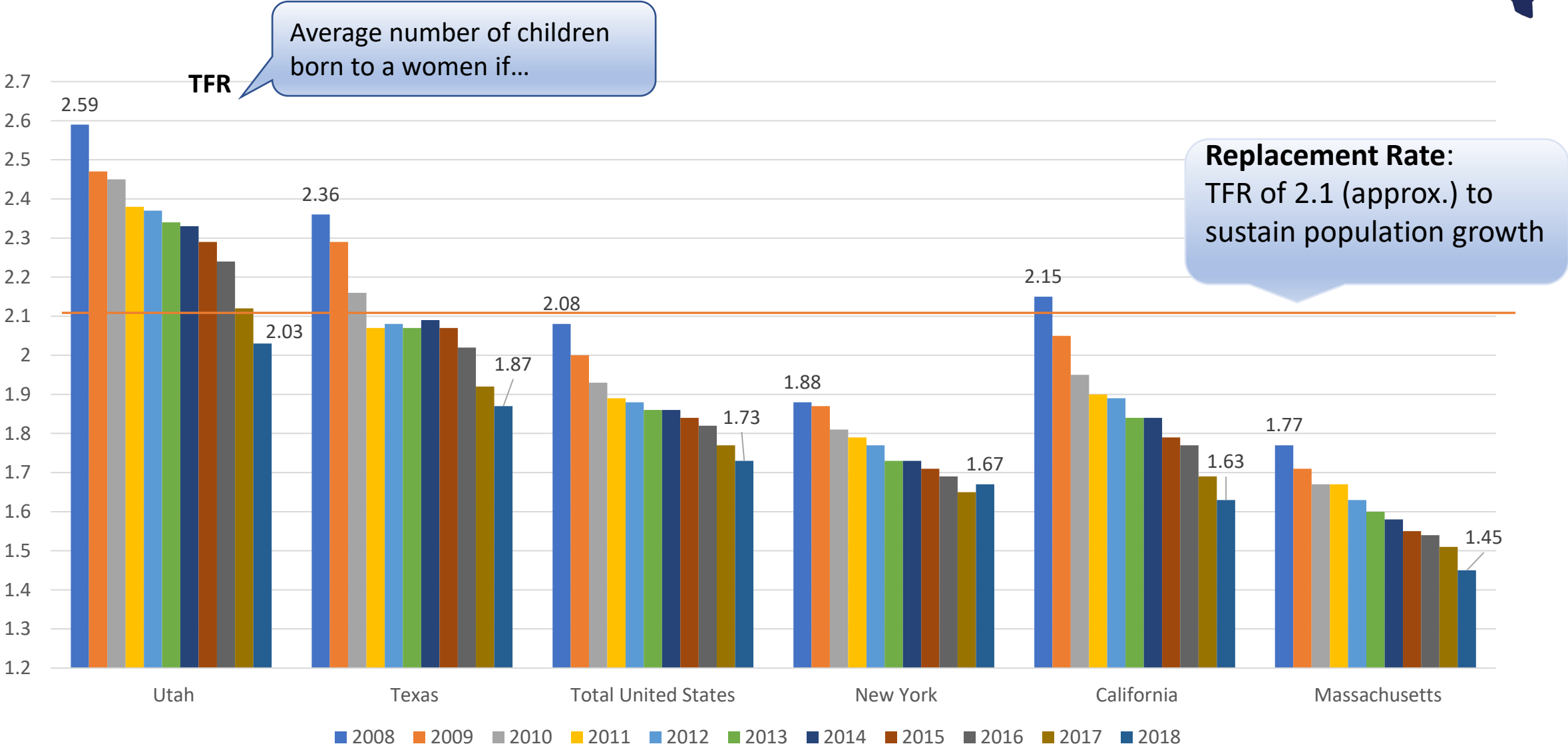
Foreign-Born Population in Texas: World Region of Birth by Year of Entry

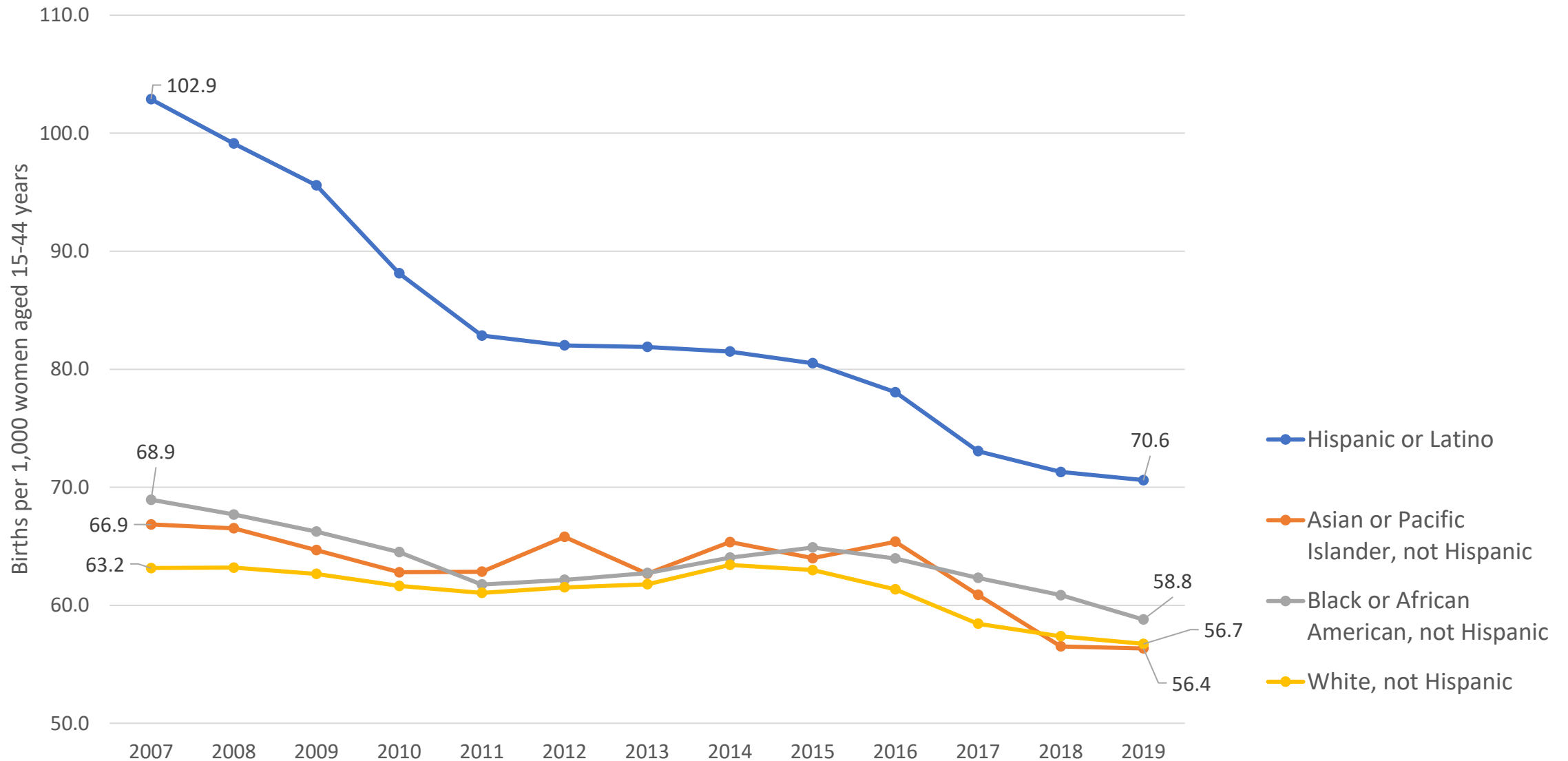


Total Fertility Rate (TFR) for Select States, 2008-2018

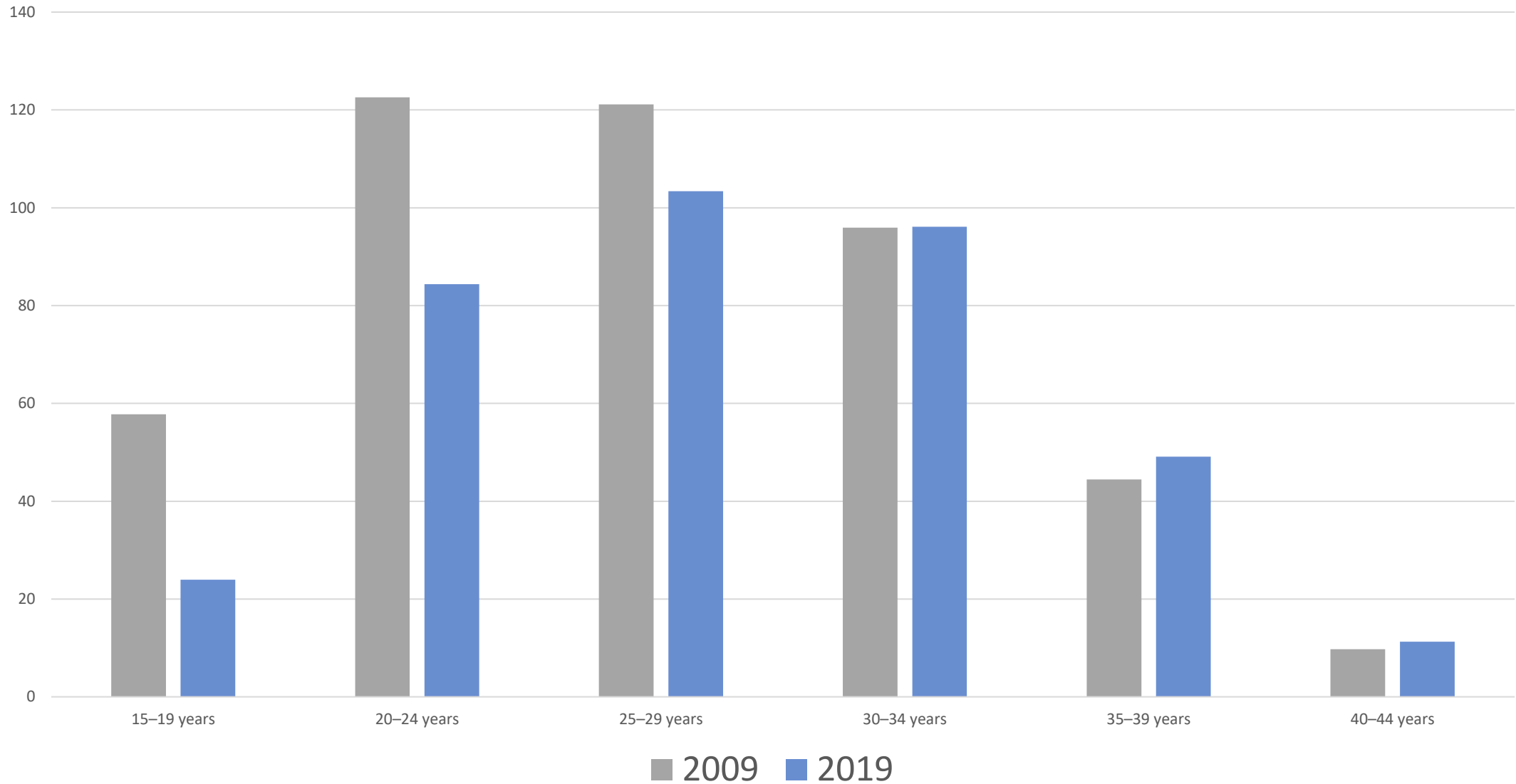

Texas Birth Rates, 2007-2019



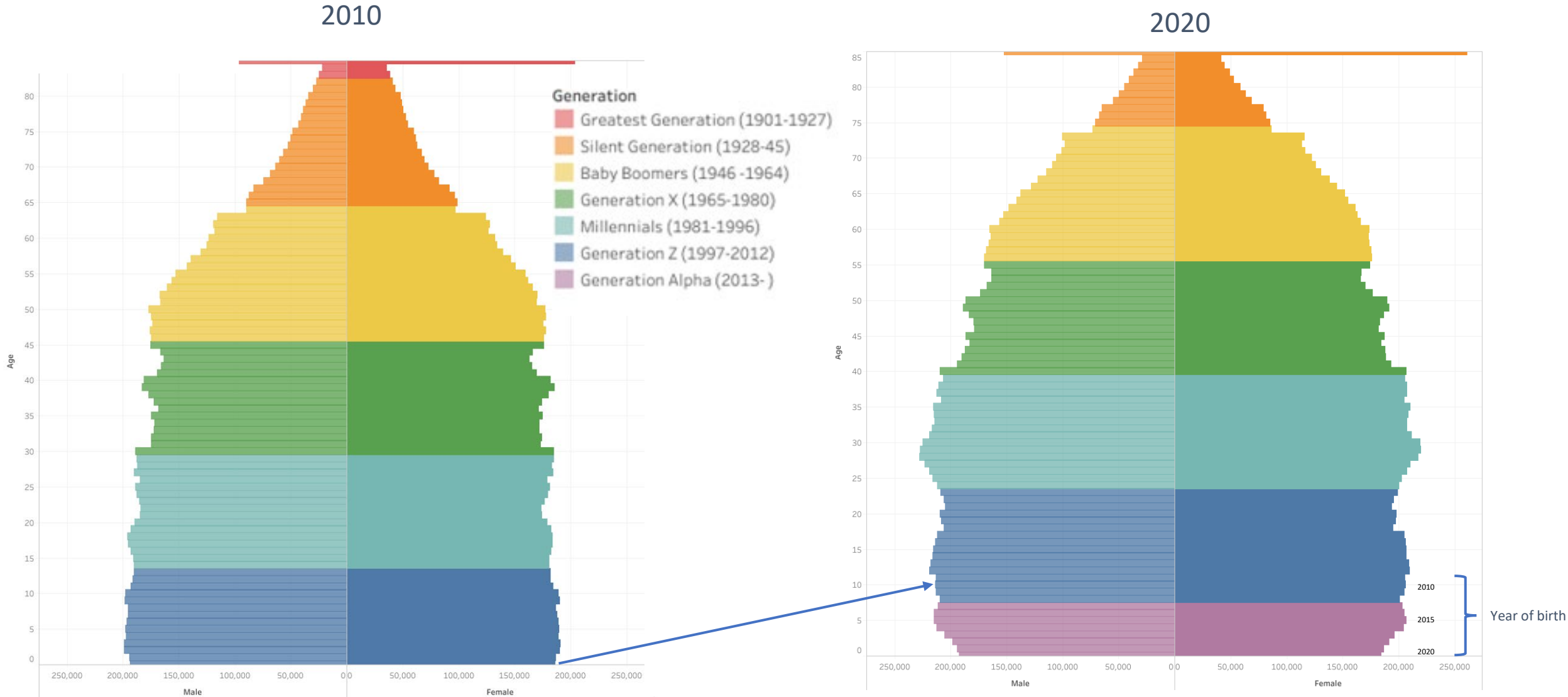
Texas Birth Rates by Age Group of Mothers, 2009, 2019

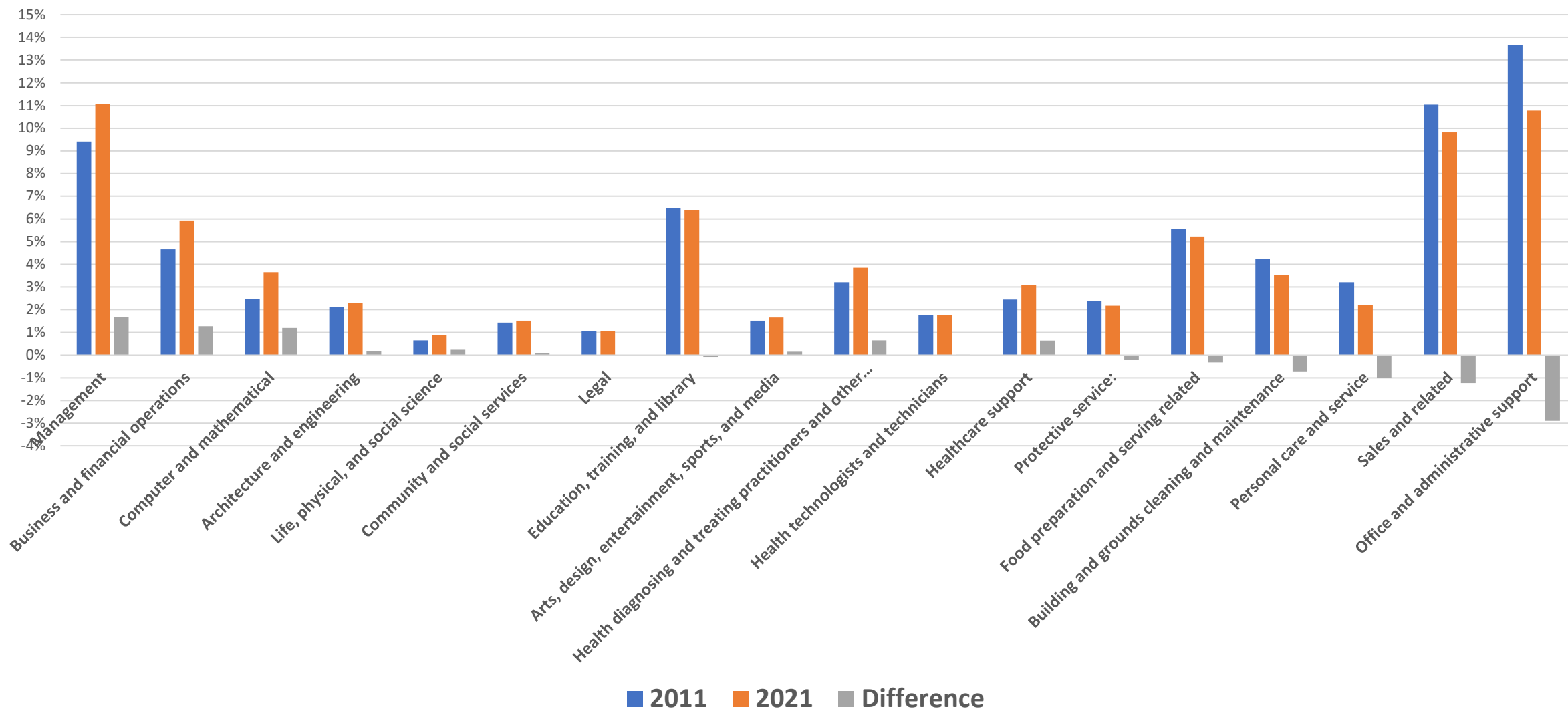
Generational Population Pyramids, Texas, 2010 and 2020

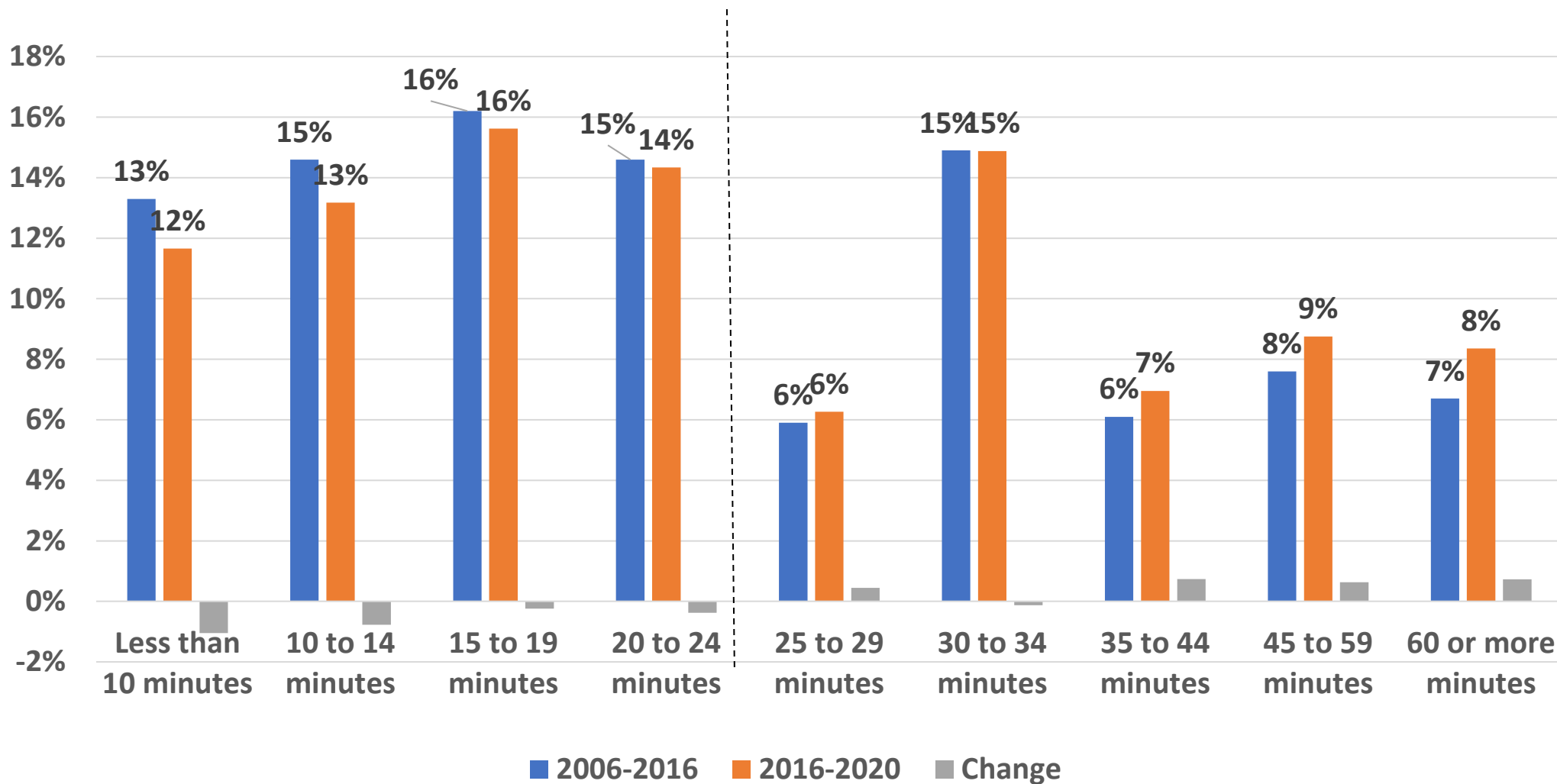


Percent of Civilian Labor Force by Occupation, Texas, 2011, 2021 and 2011-2012 Change



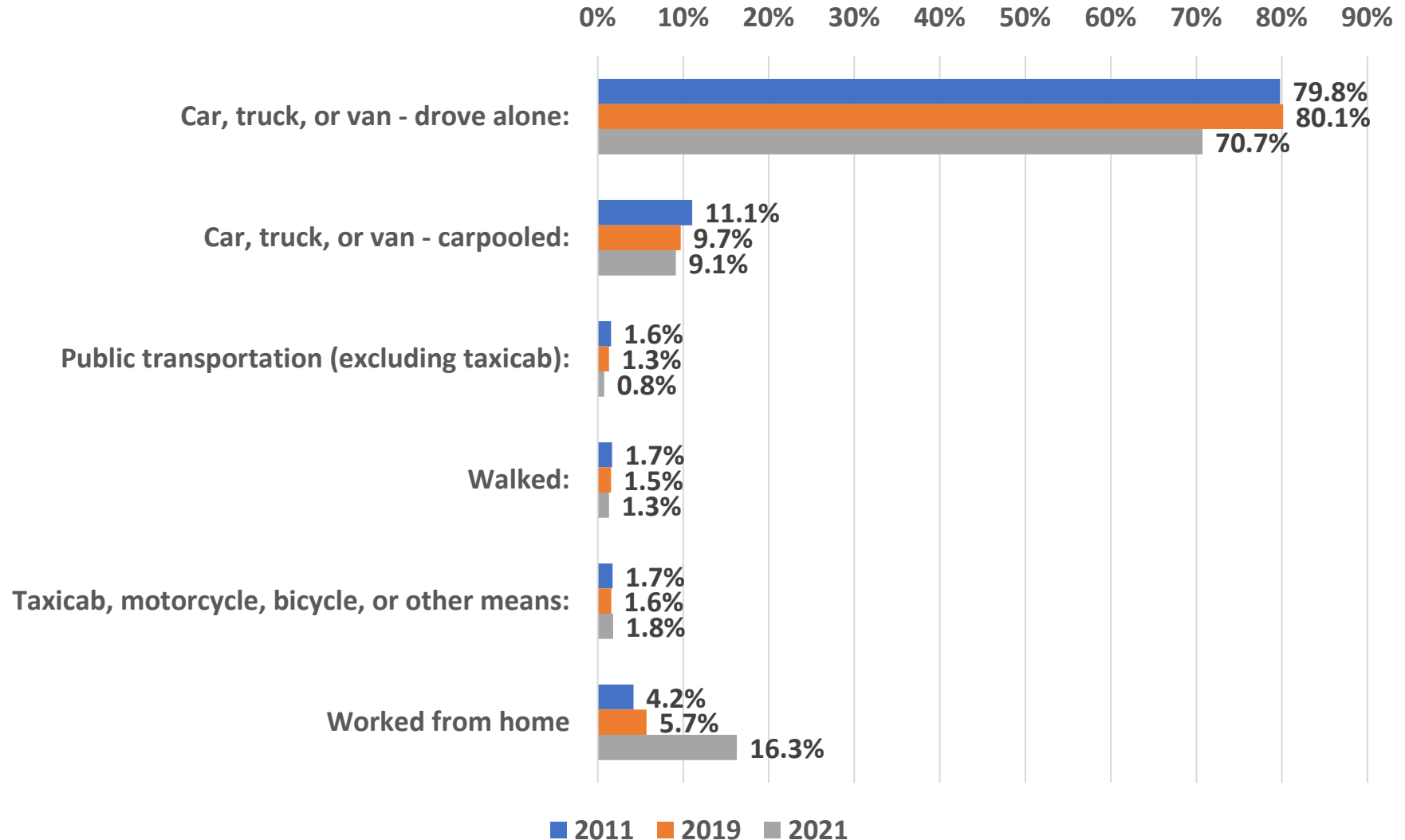


Change in Travel Time to Work, Texas, 2006-2010 and 2016-2020

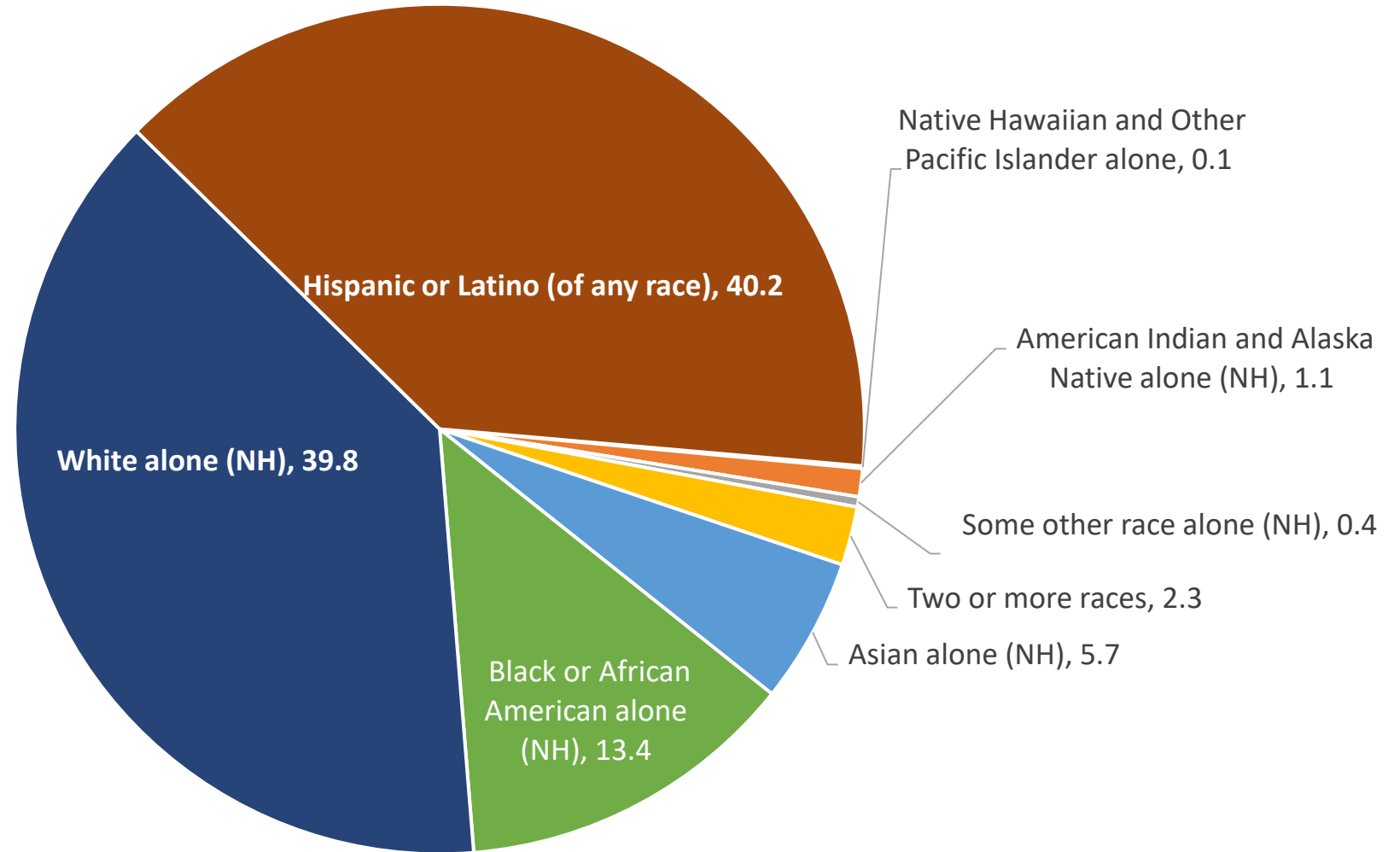




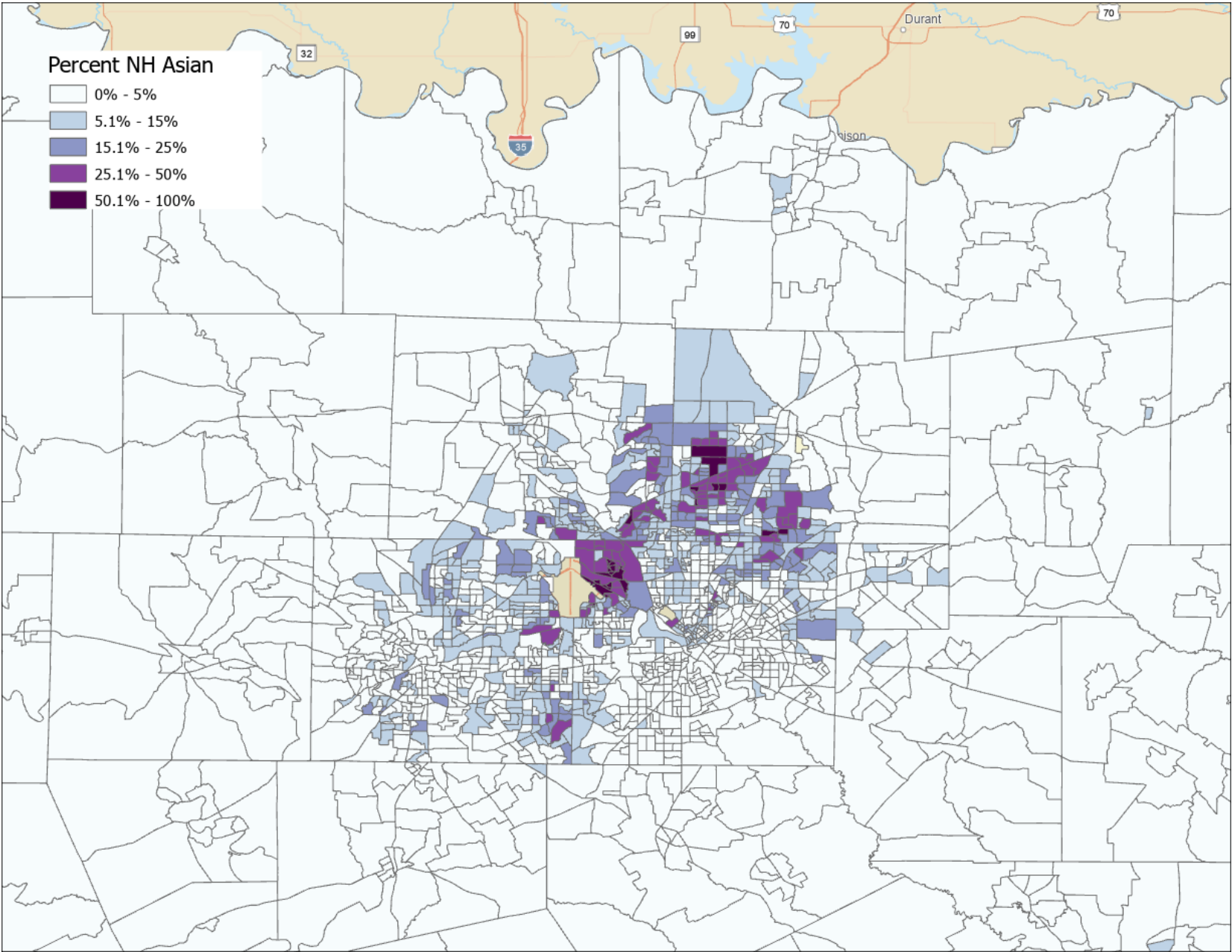

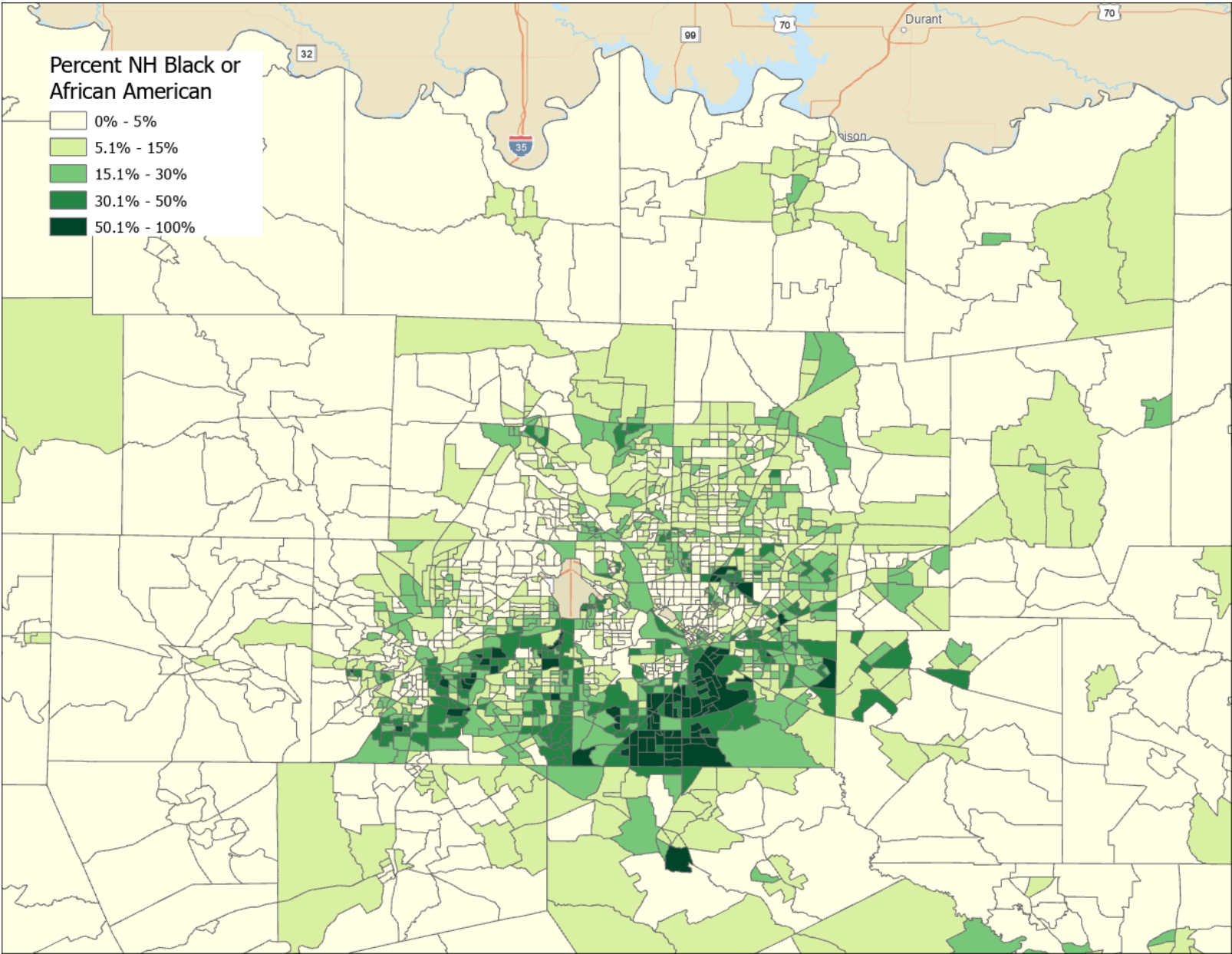
Estimated Racial/Ethnic Composition of Texas Population, 2022



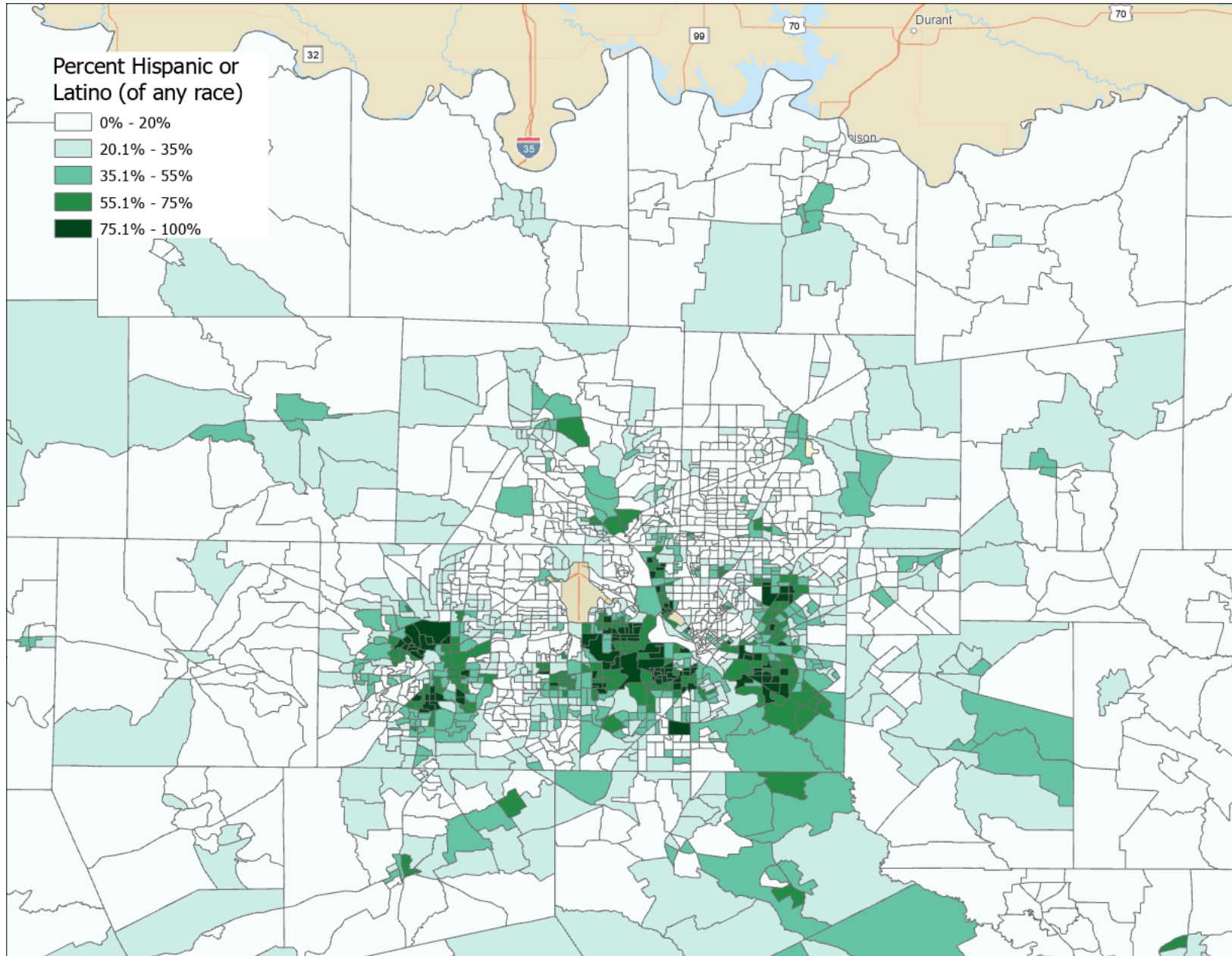
Percent non-Hispanic Asian population, Metroplex area, census tracts, 2017-2022



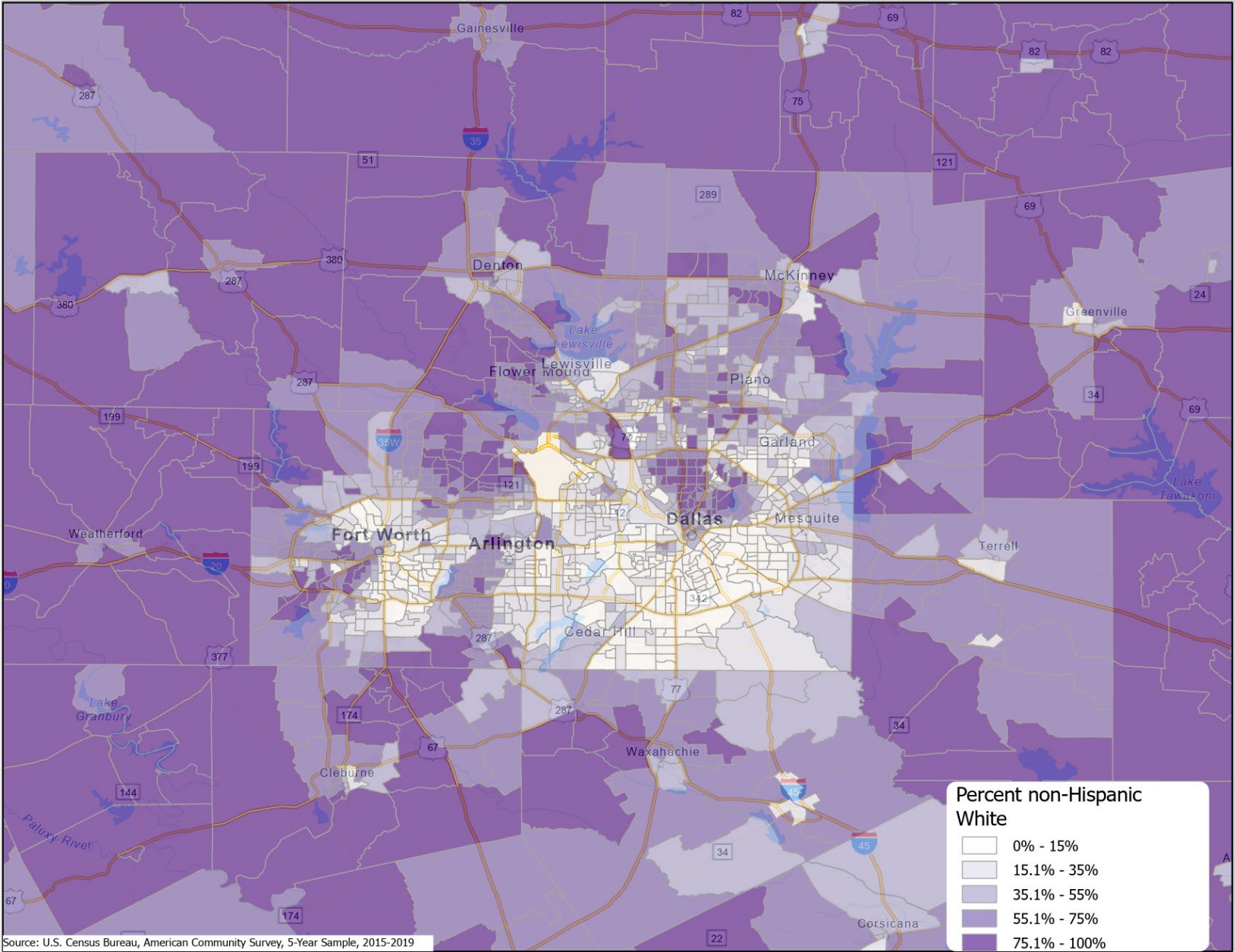
Percent non-Hispanic Black/African American population, Metroplex area, census tracts, 2017-2022



Percent population that is Hispanic, Metroplex area, census tracts, 2017-2022



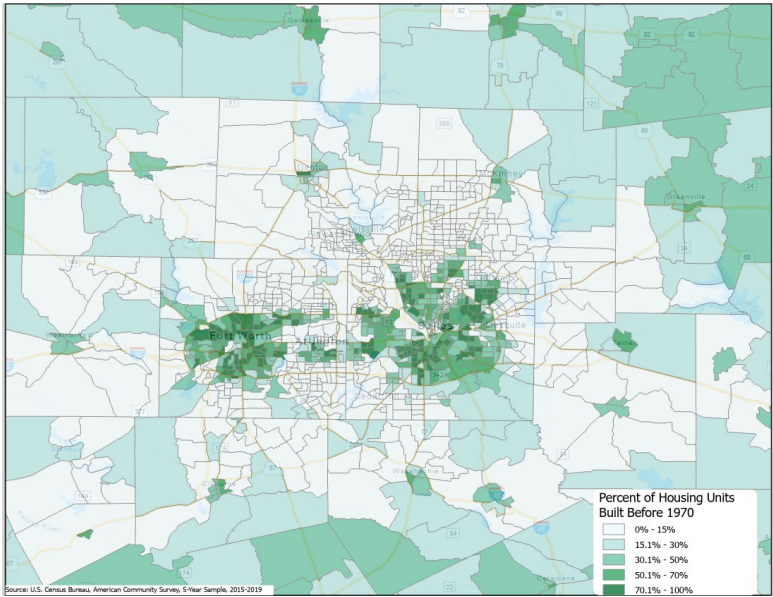
Percent population that is non-Hispanic white, Metroplex area, census tracts, 2015-2019



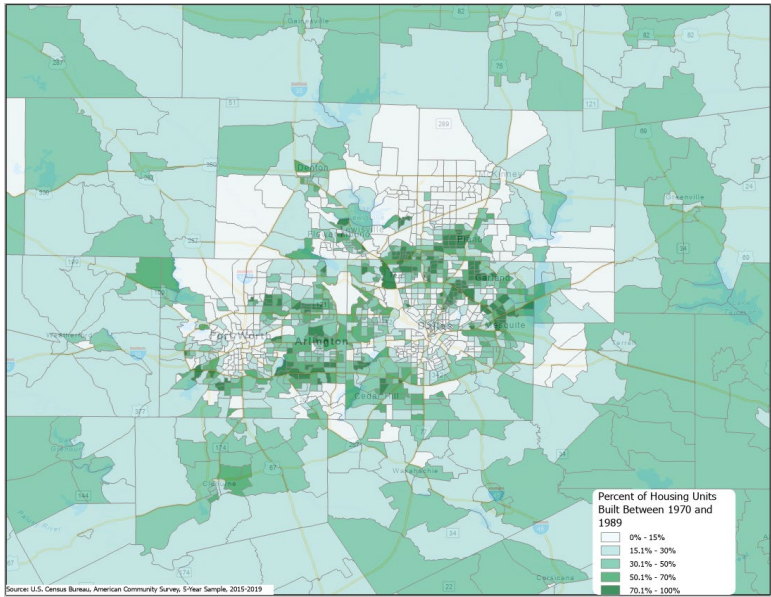
Percent of housing stock by year built, Metroplex area, census tracts, 2015-2019



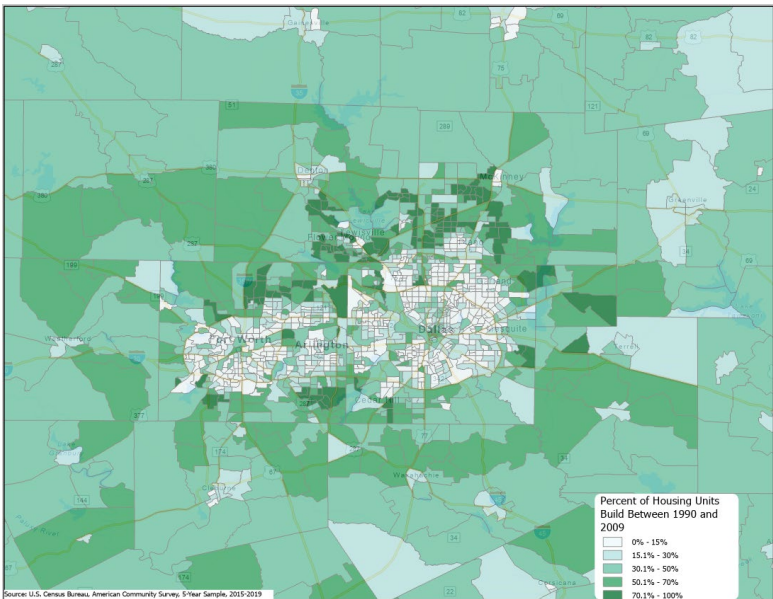

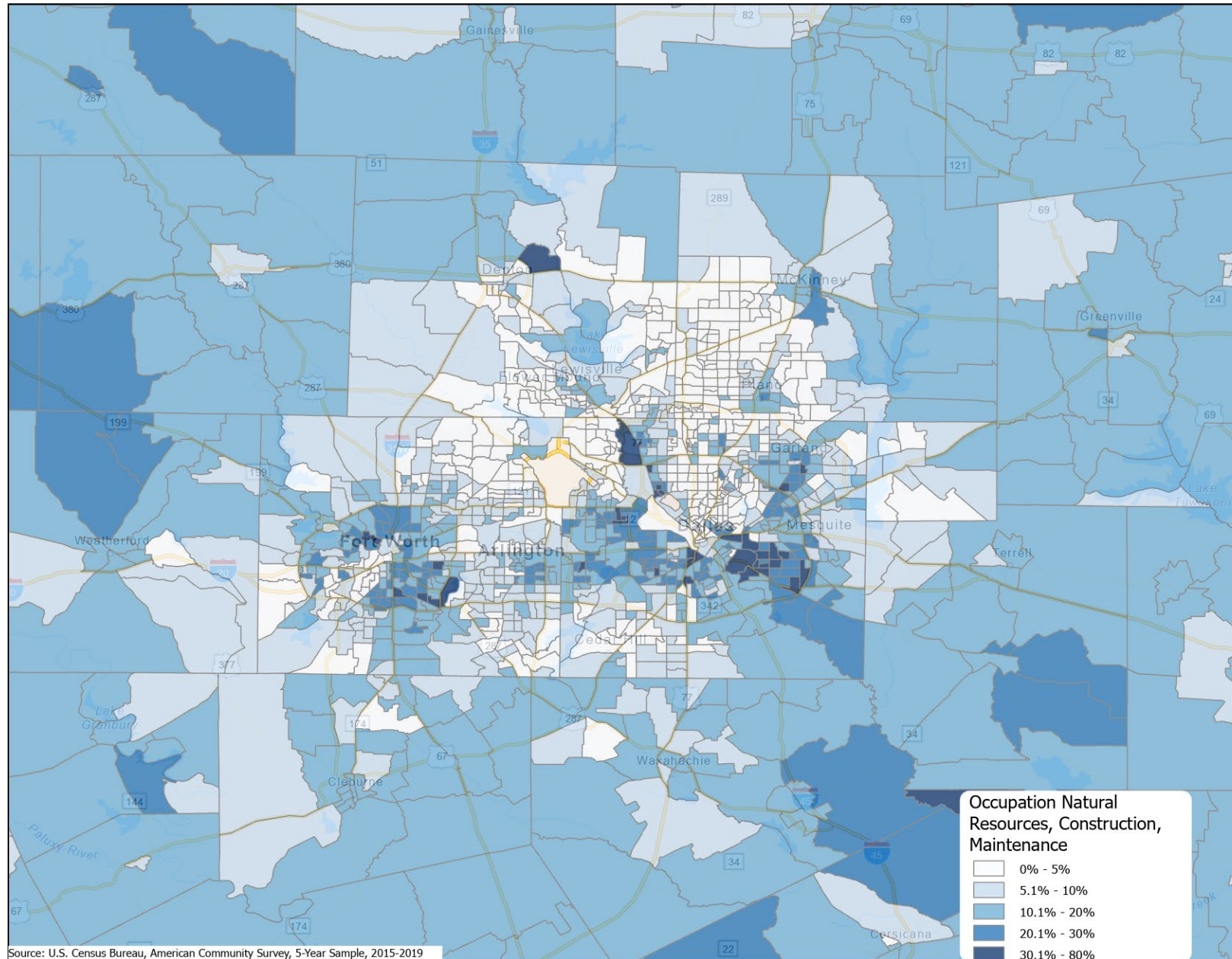

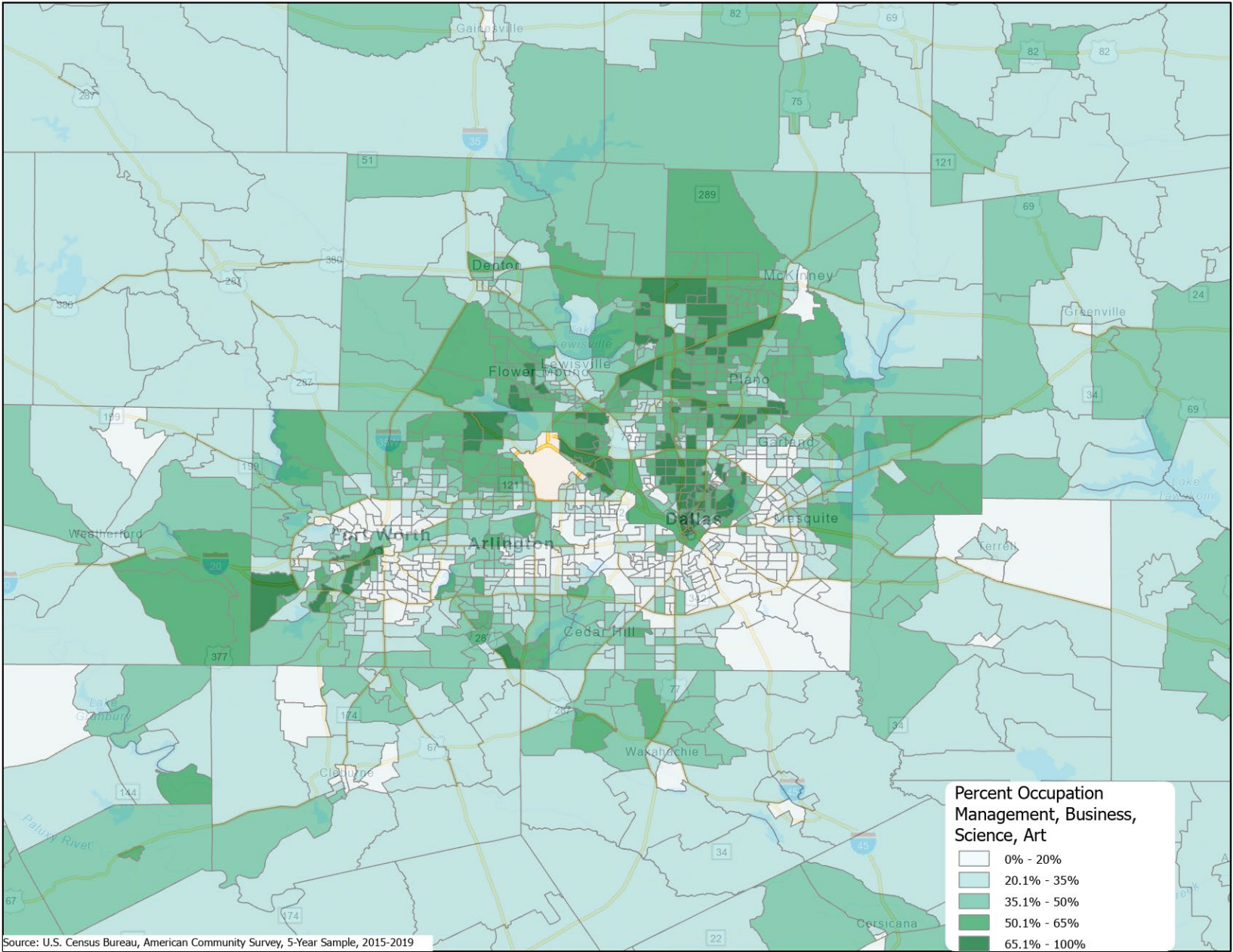
Percent of aged 25 years and older with bachelor's degree or higher, Metroplex area, census tracts, 2017-2022



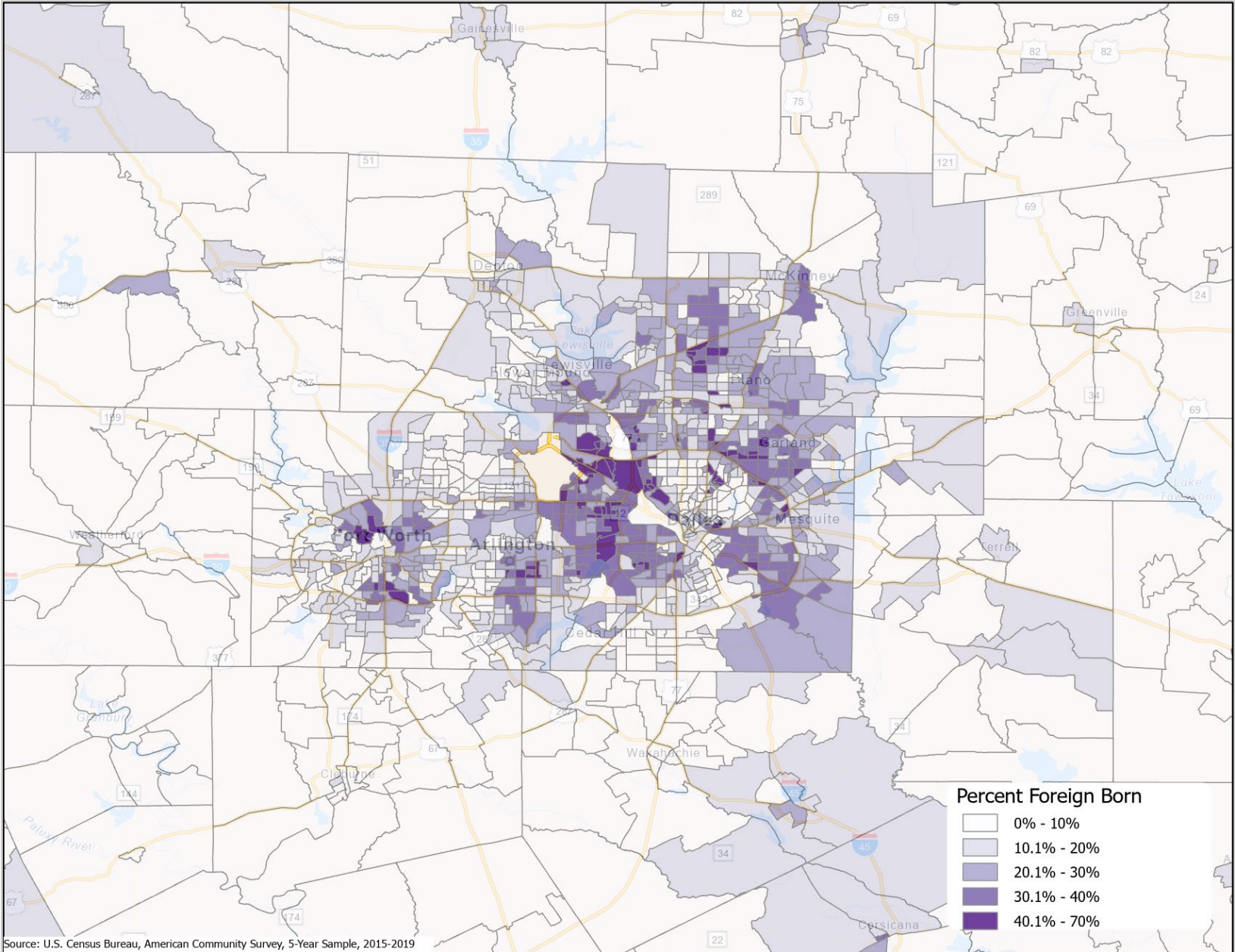
Percent of the labor force working in natural resources, construction, maintenance, occupations, Metroplex area, census tracts, 2015-2019



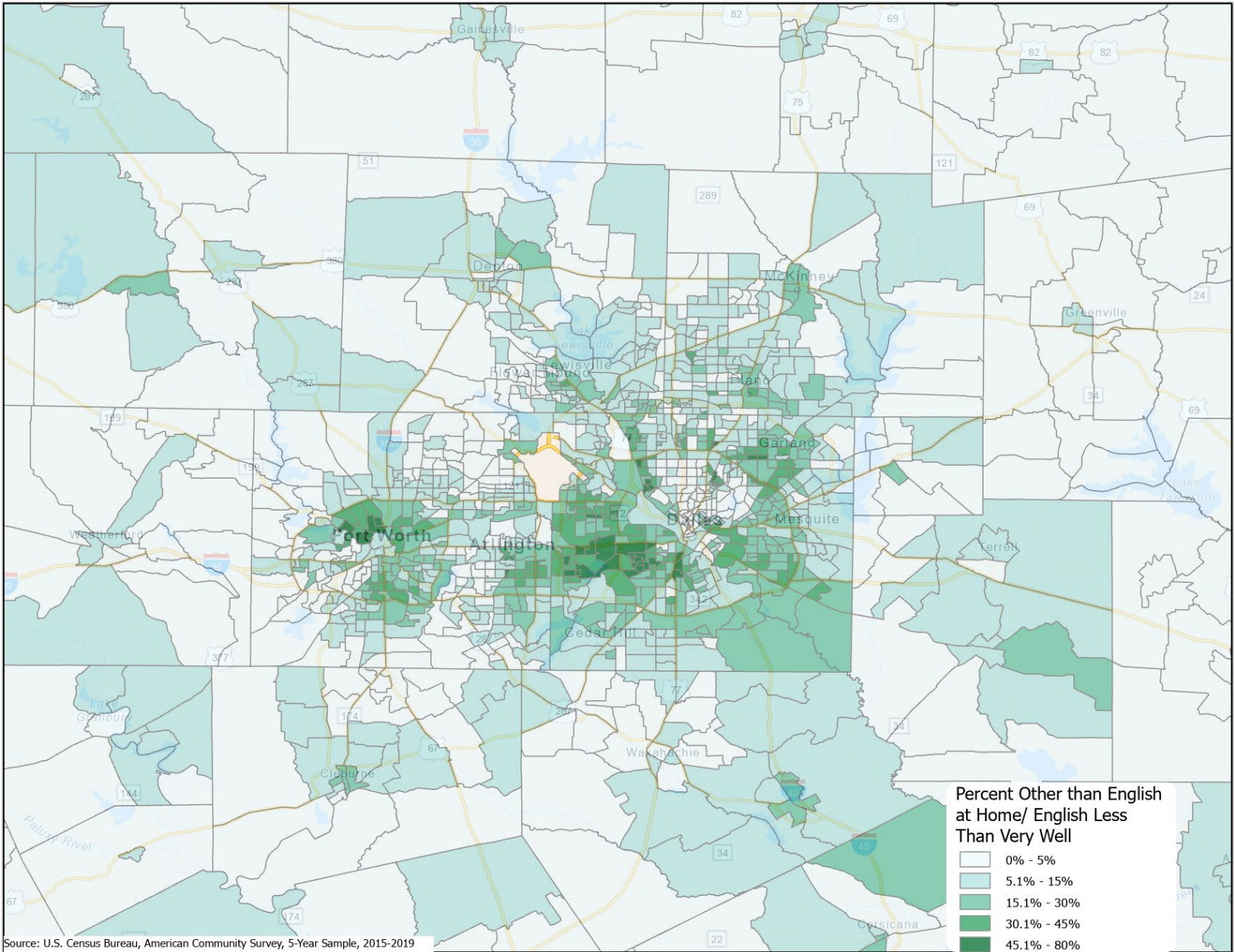
Percent of labor force working in management, business, science, art occupations, Metroplex area, census tracts, 2015-2019



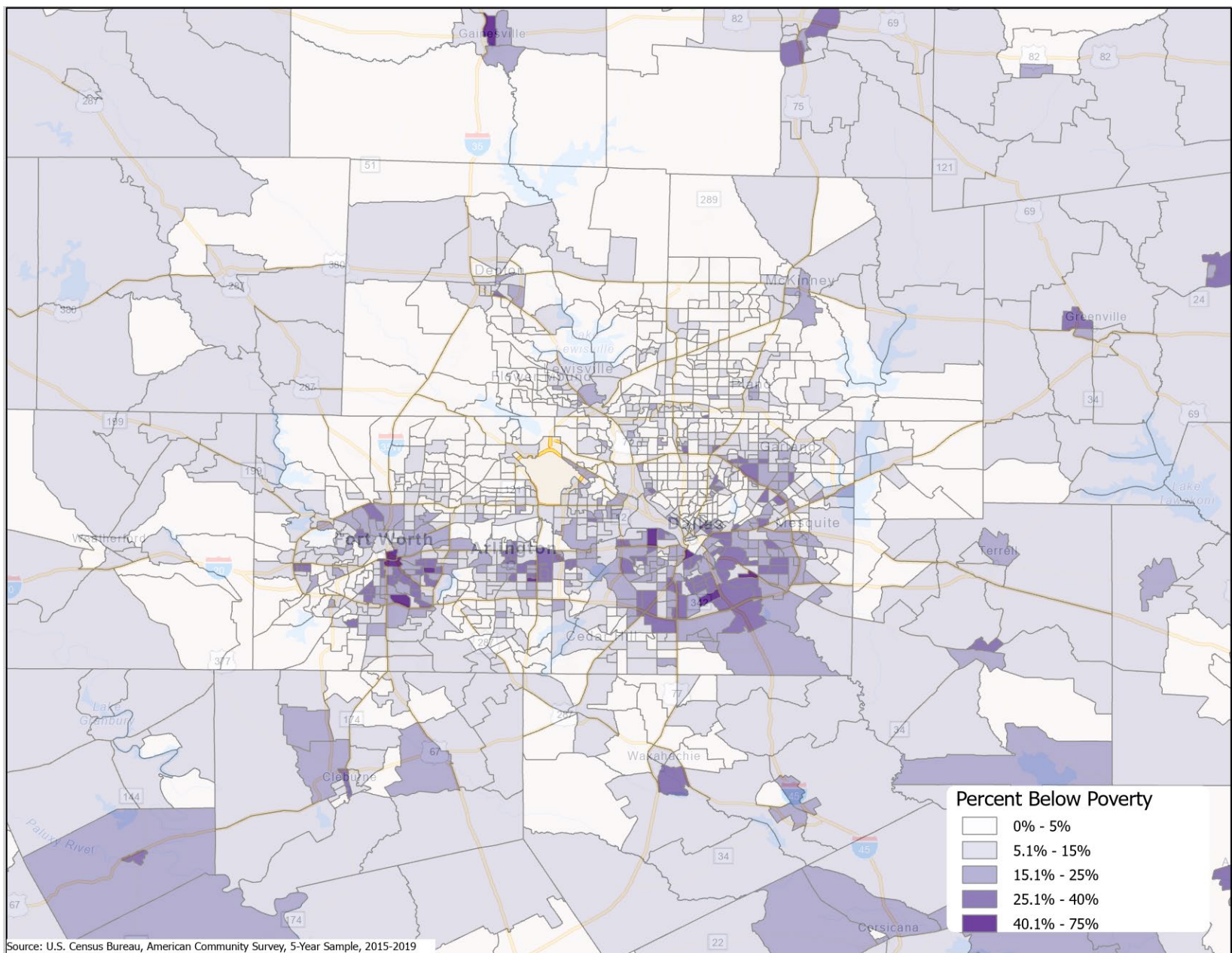
Percent population that is foreign-born, Metroplex area, census tracts, 2015-2019



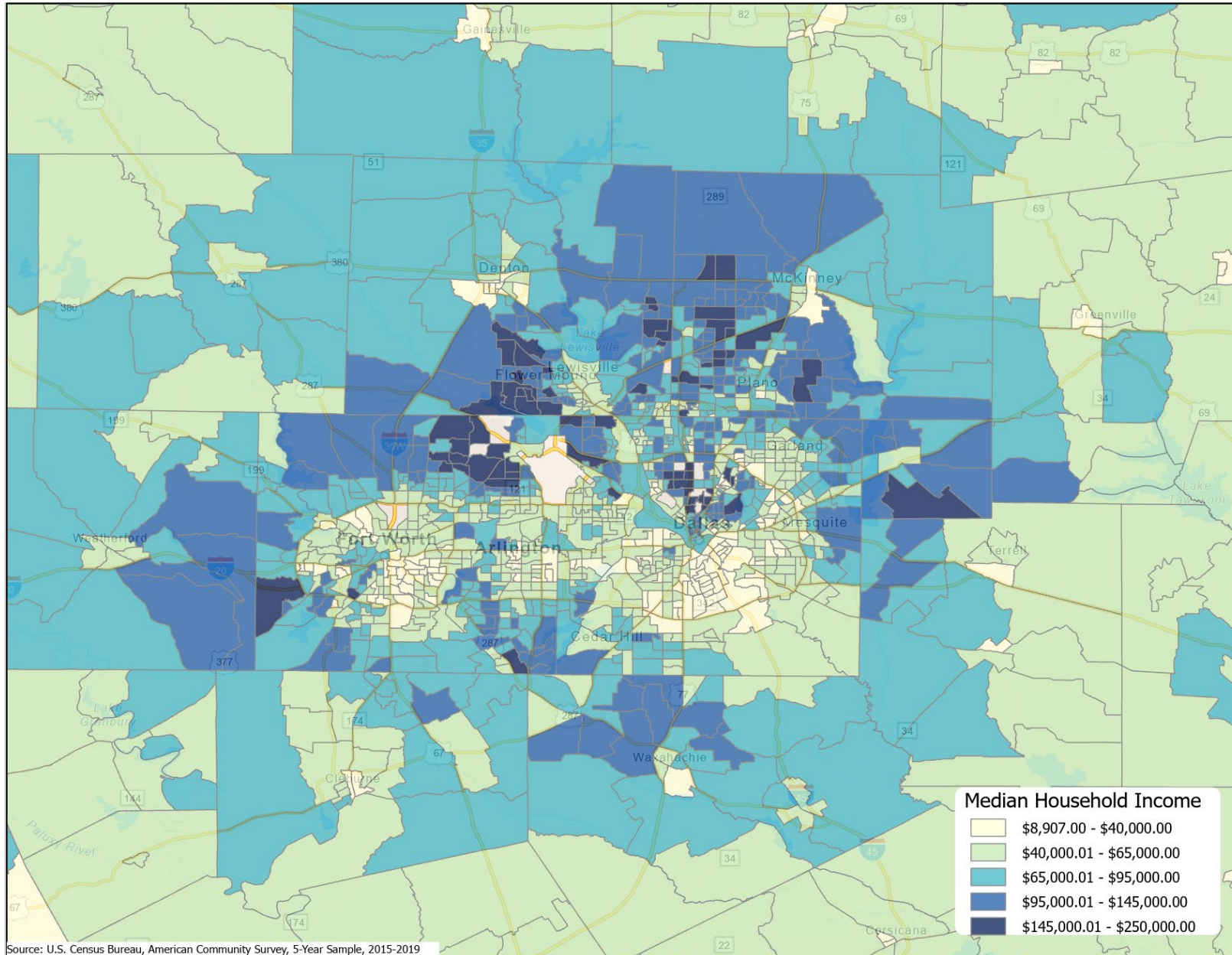
Percent of population speak a language other than English and English less than very well, Metroplex area, census tracts, 2015-2019



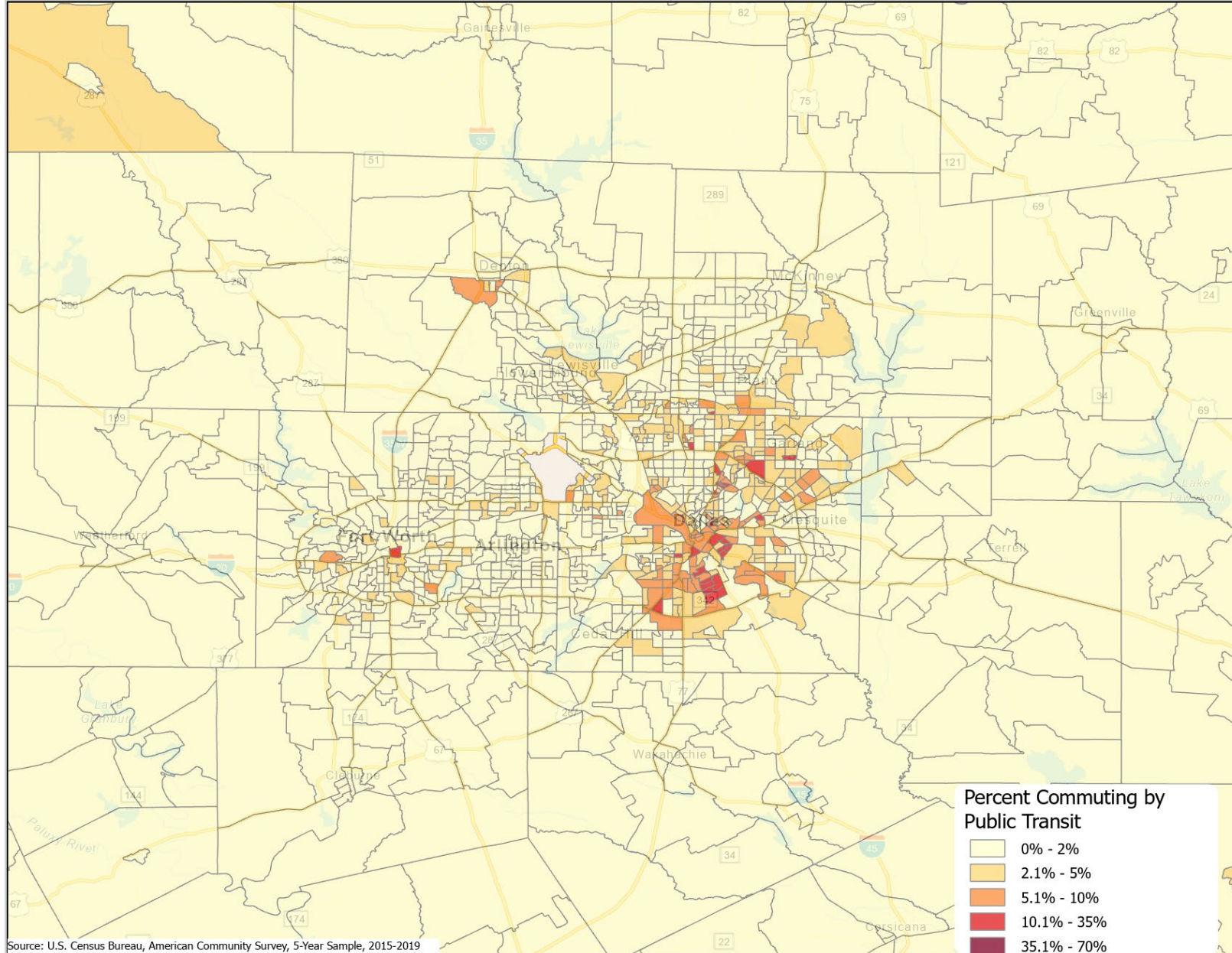
Percent of population living below poverty, Metroplex area, census tracts, 2015-2019



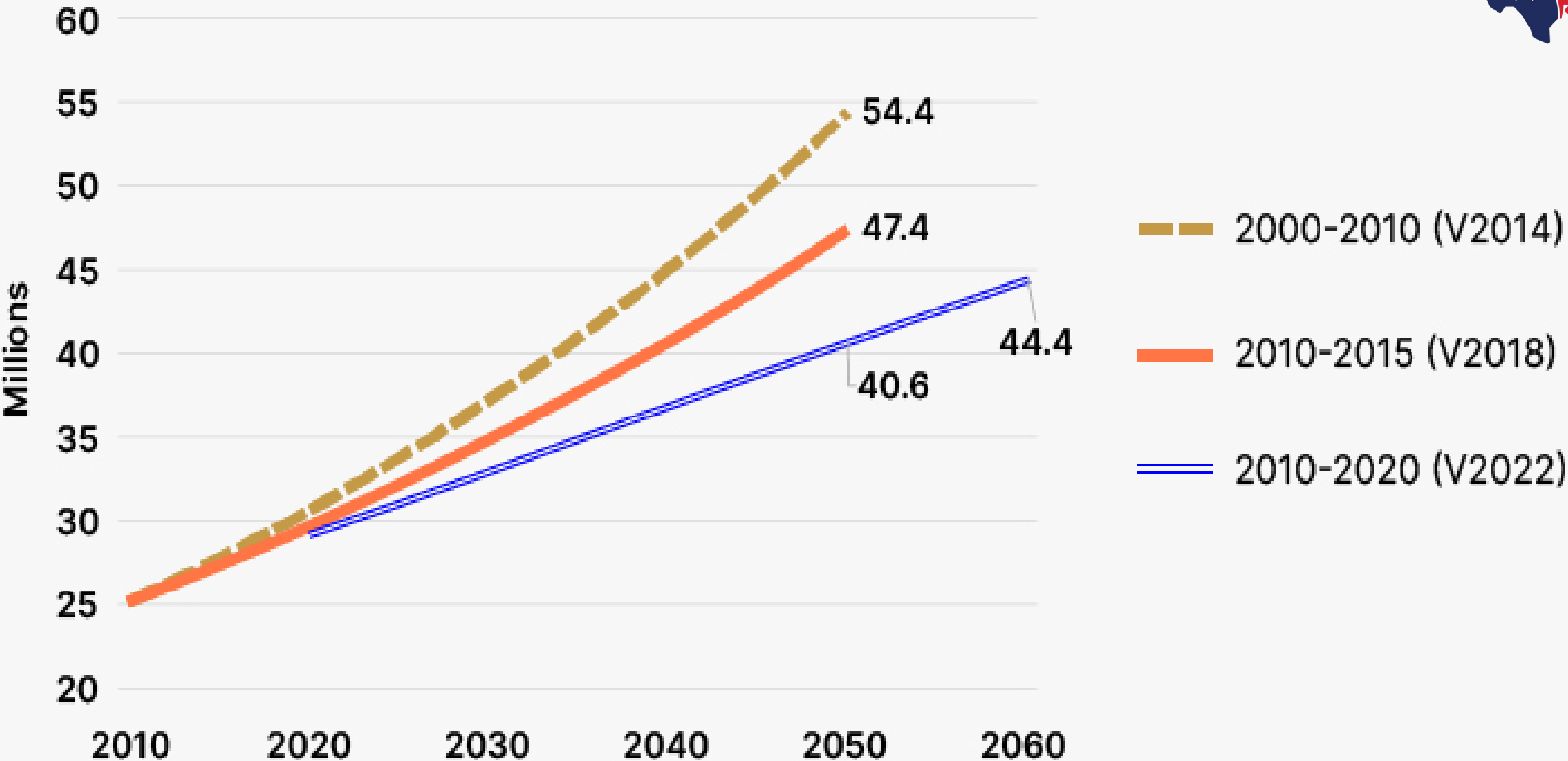
Median household income, Metroplex area, census tracts, 2015-2019



Percent Commuting by Public Transit, Metroplex area, census tracts, 2015-2019

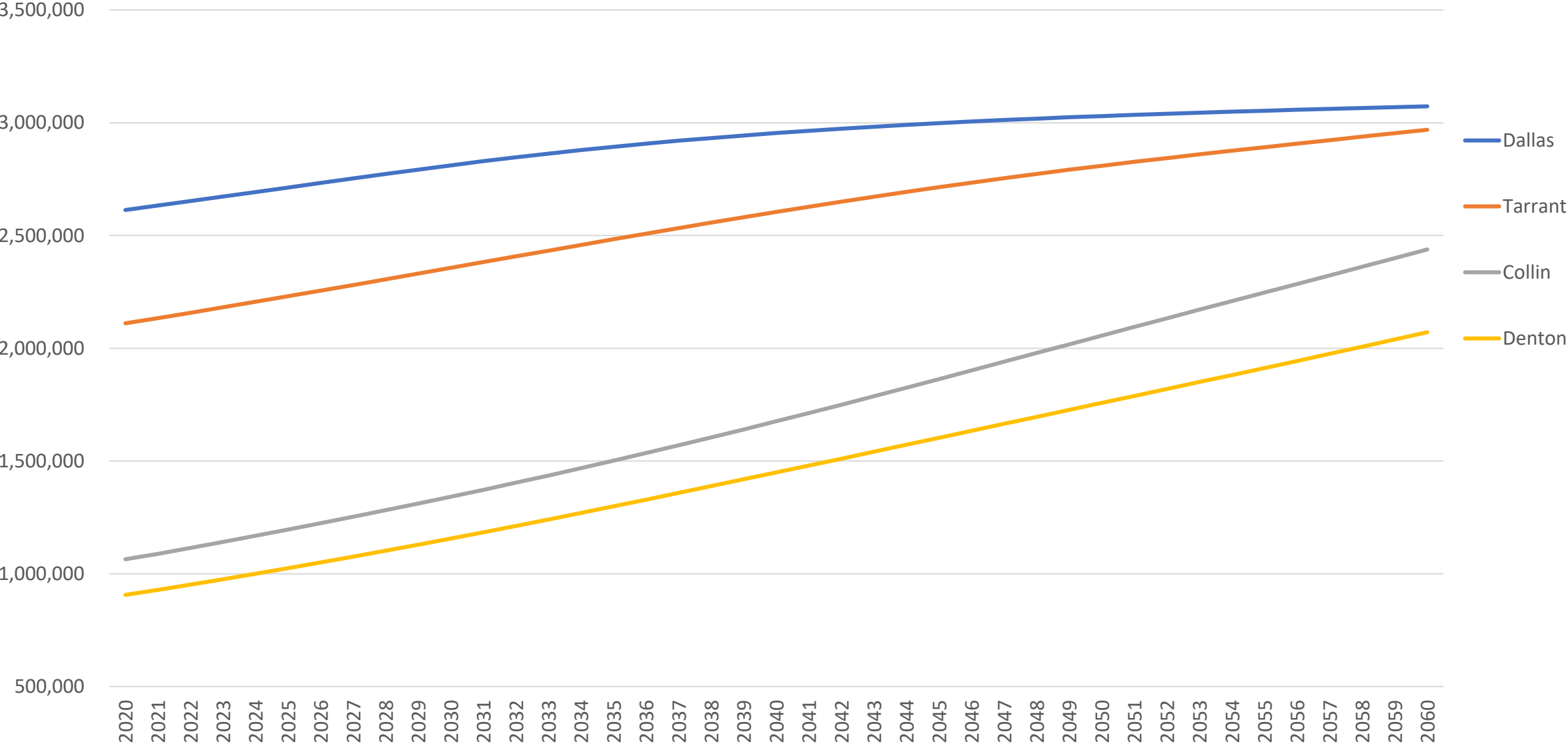


Projected Population Growth in Texas, 2010-2050



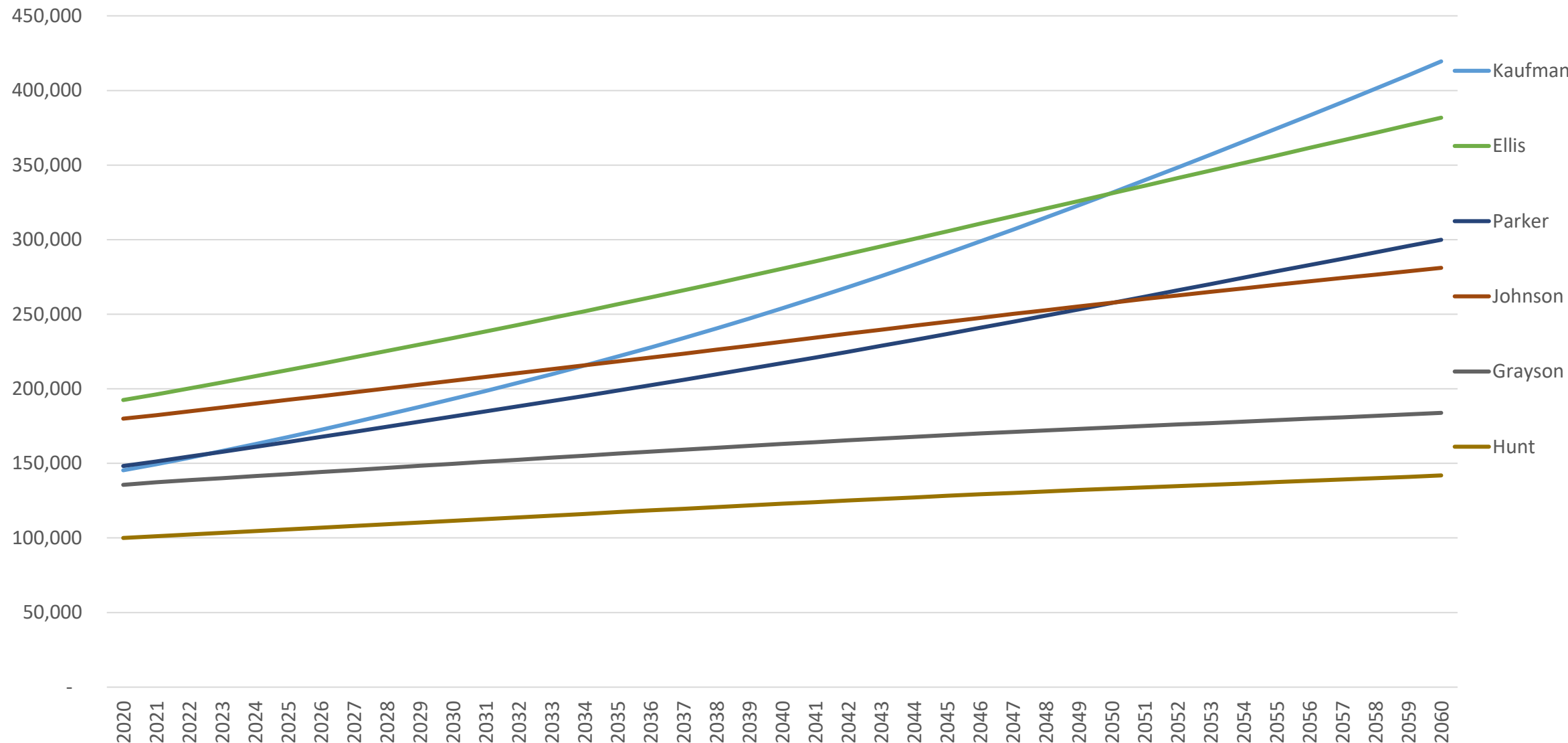

Population Projections, DFW Metro Largest and Fast Growing Counties, 2020-2060



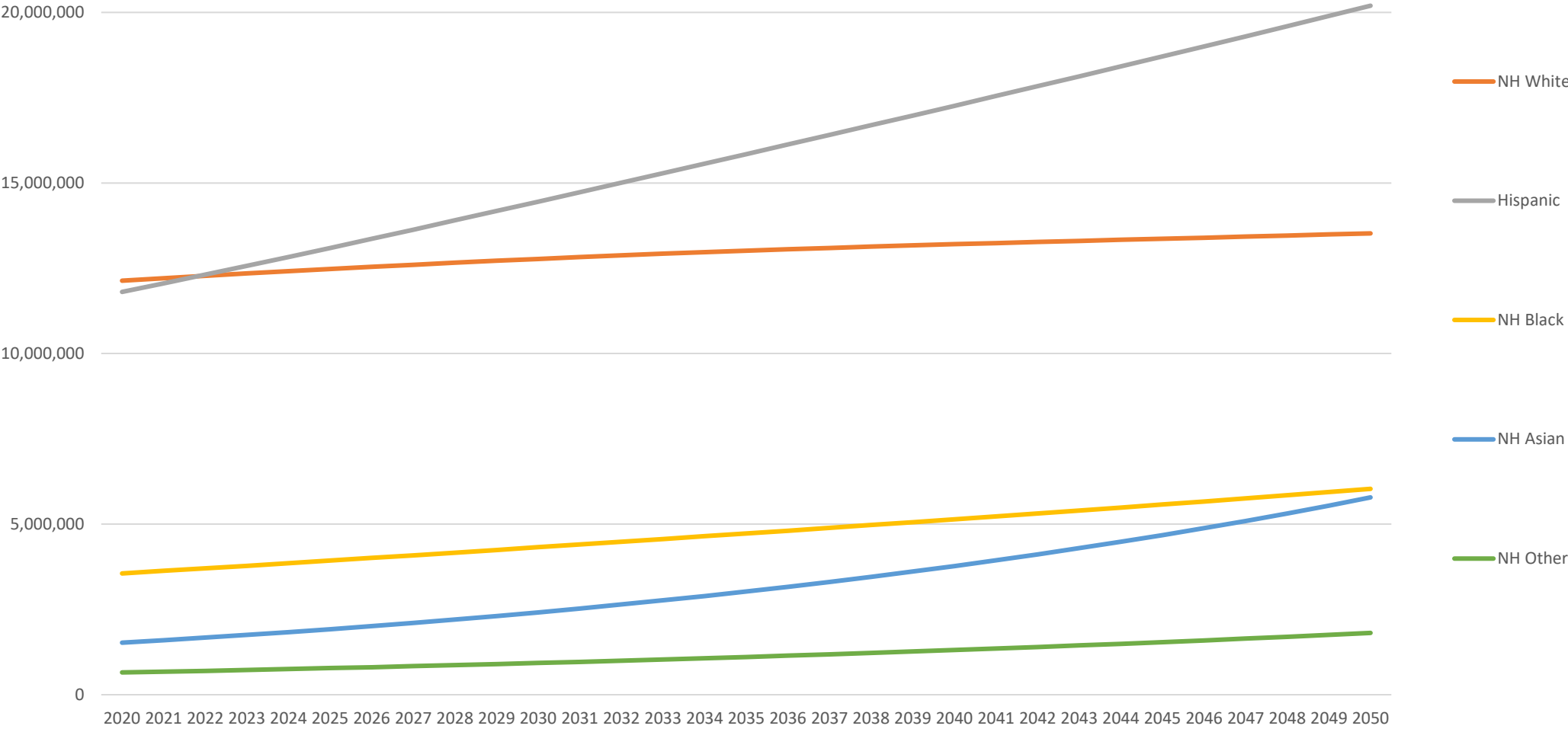

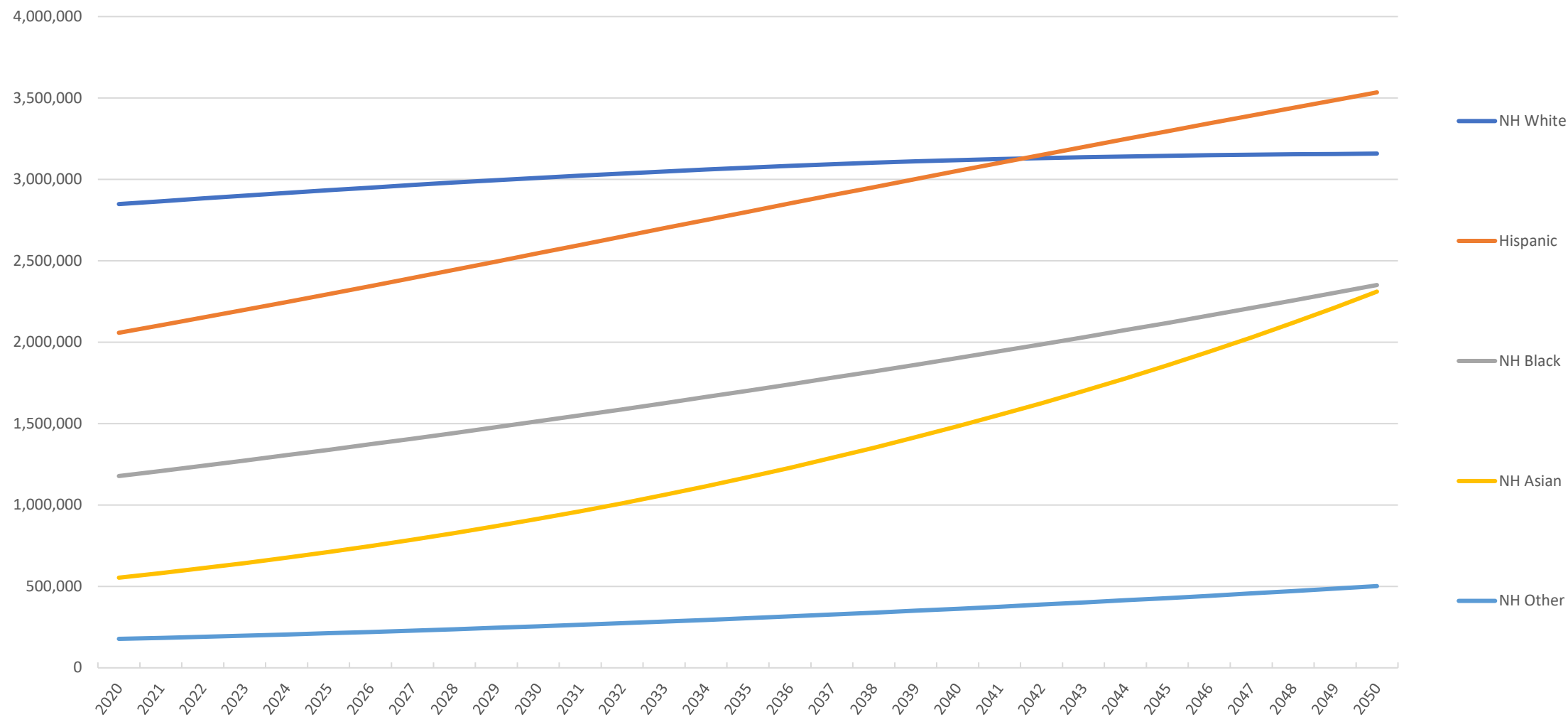
Projected Population by Race and Ethnicity, Texas 2010-2050

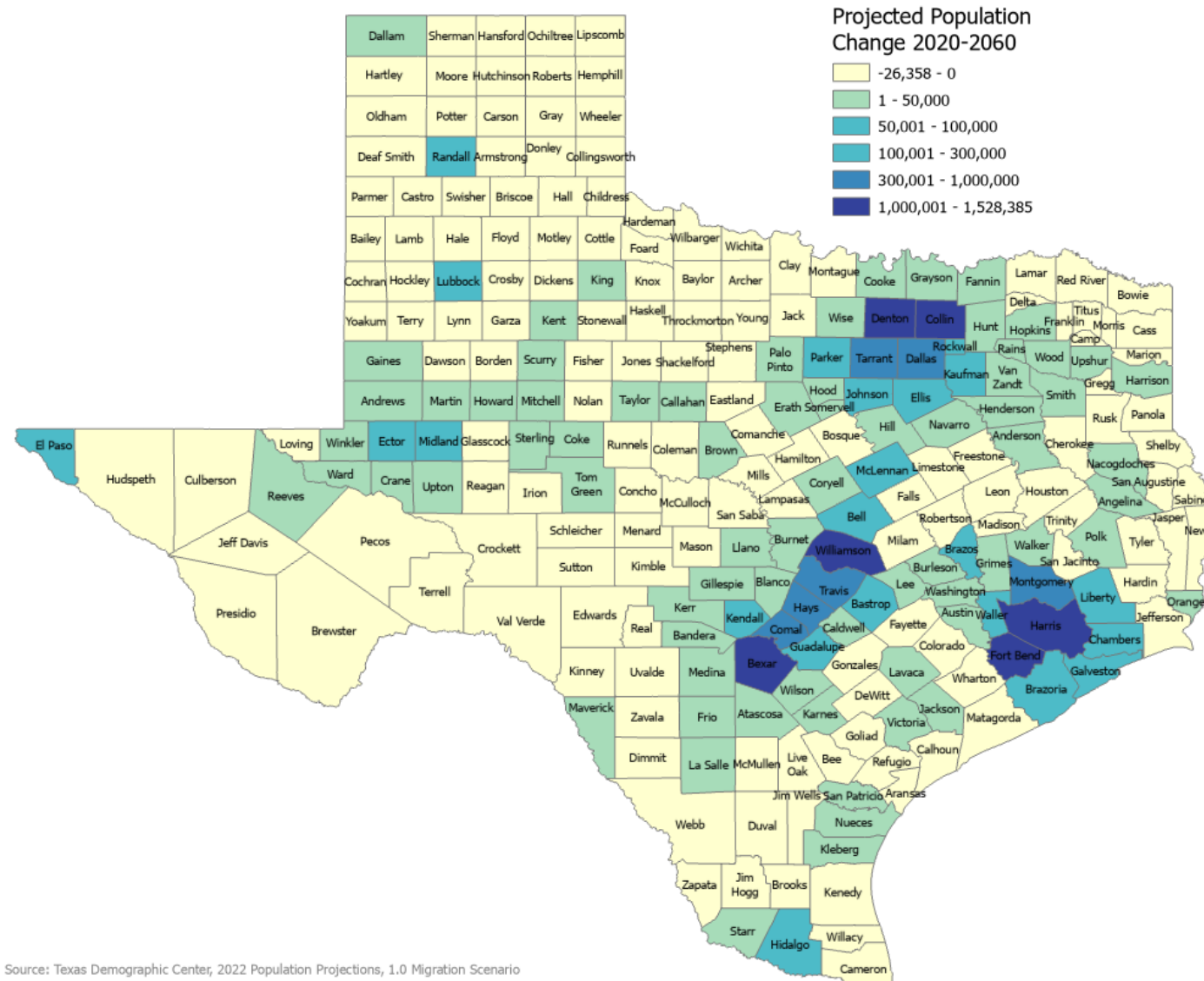


Projected Population by Race and Ethnicity for Dallas, Tarrant, Collin and Denton Counties Combined, Texas 2020-2050

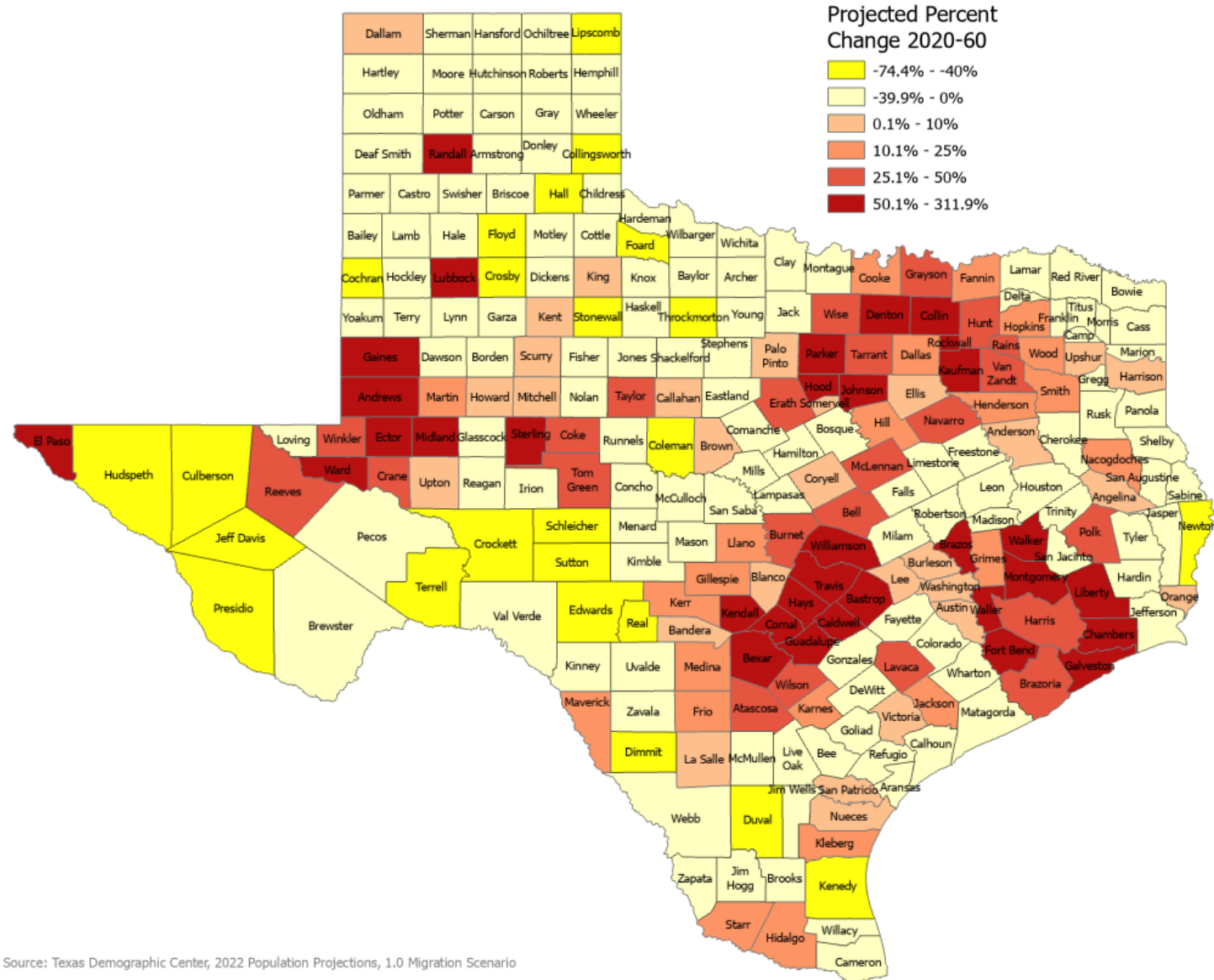

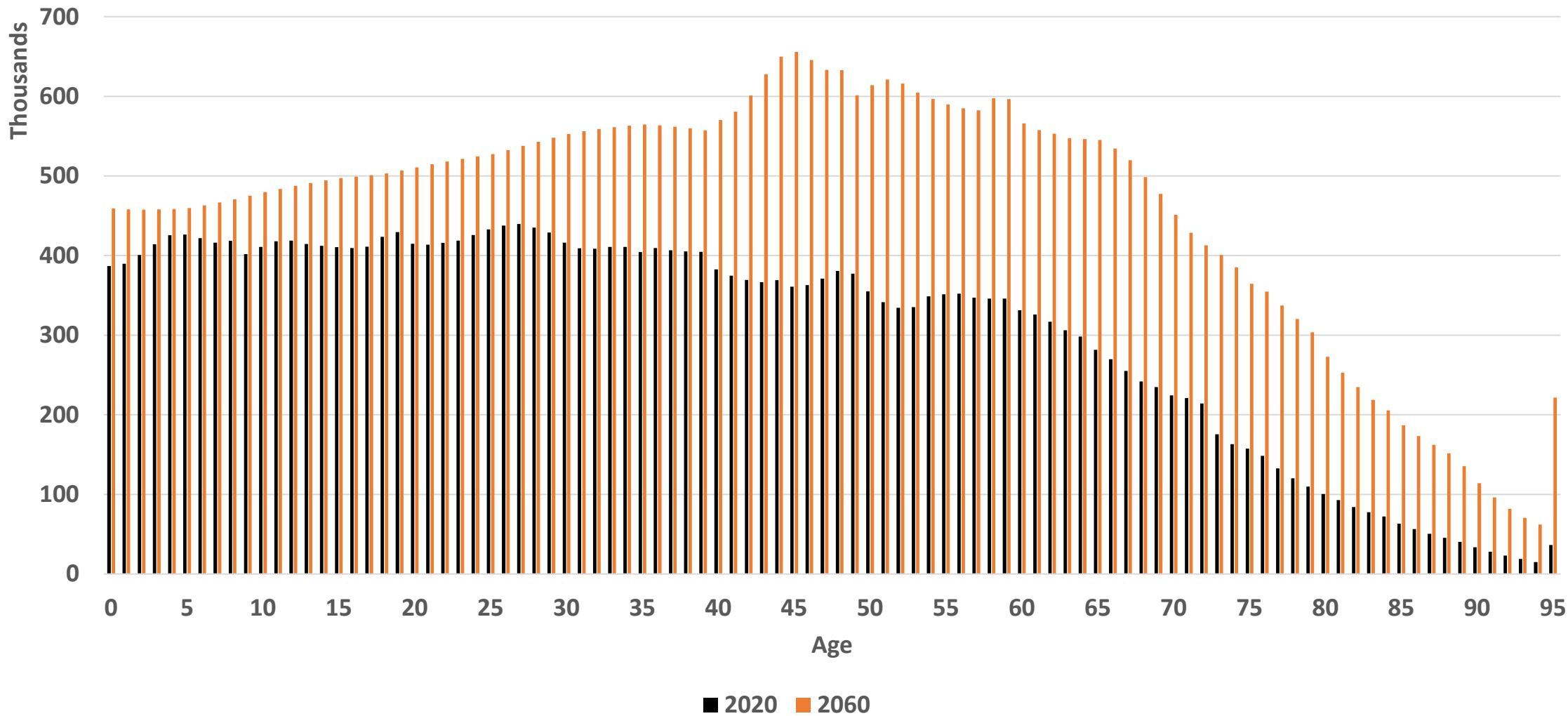
Projected Population Change, Texas Counties, 2020-2050

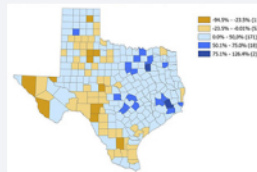

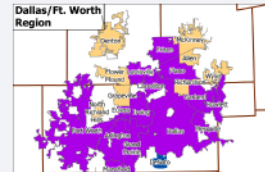

Who Contributed to Texas' Population Growth? 2010-2020

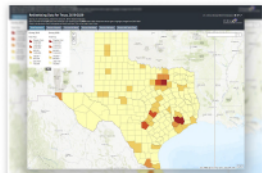


Population Change for Texas Counties, 2010-2020

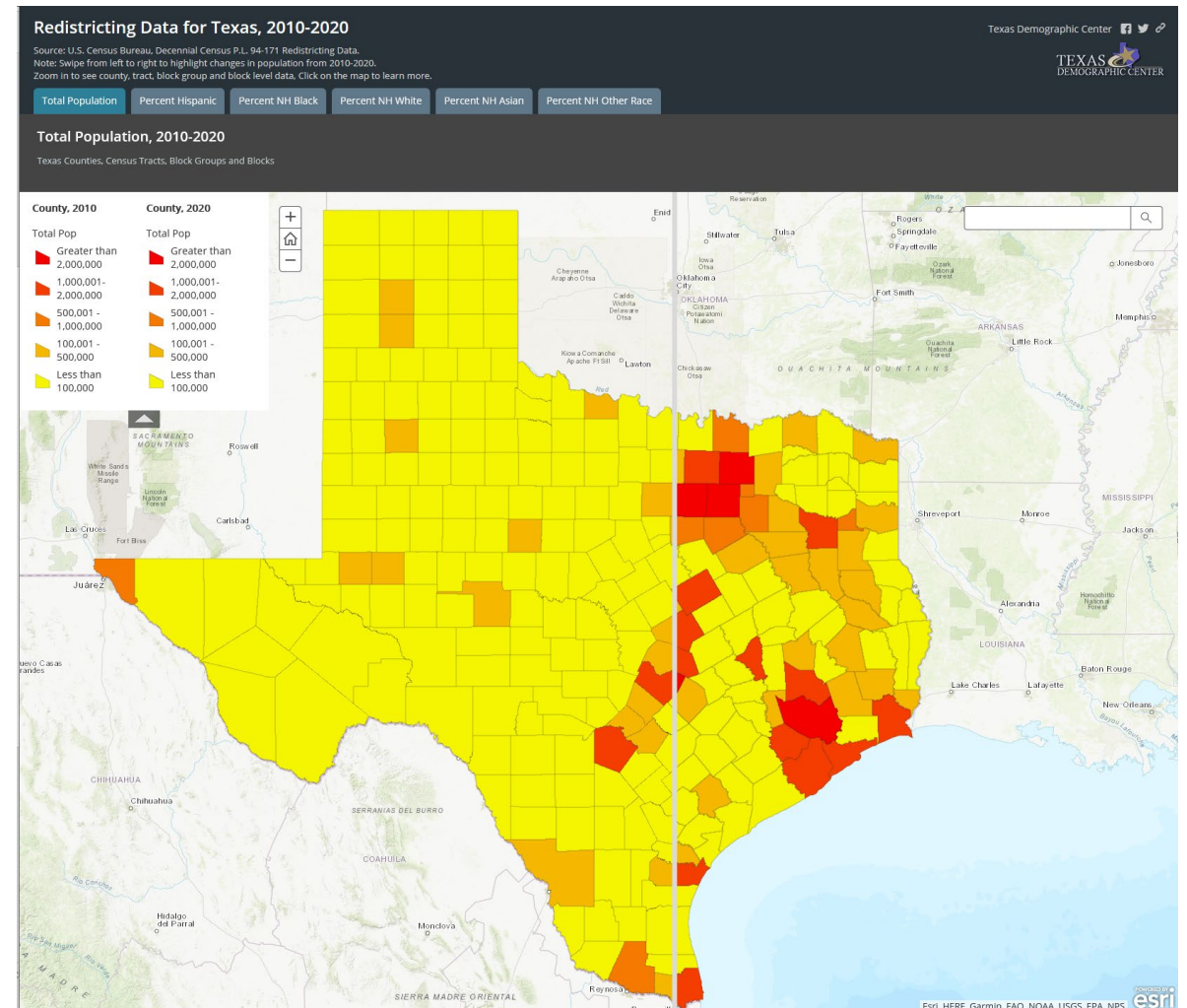

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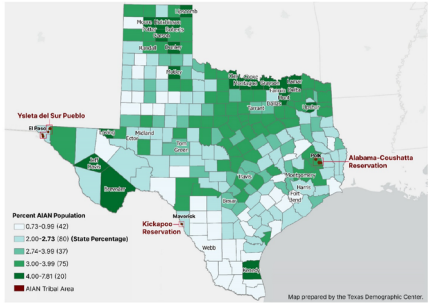

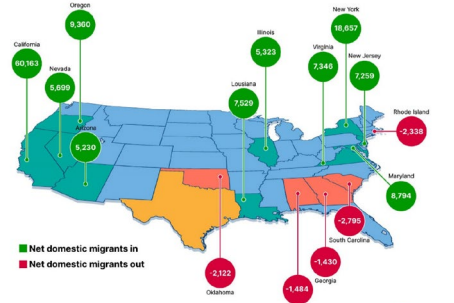
